## BRIEF BUT USEFUL RECIPES.

Restore Gilt Frames.—Rub with a  
sponge moistened with turpentine.

Drive Away Ants.—A little quick  
lime placed in the infested places.

Remove Tar from Cloth.—Rub it  
well with turpentine till every trace  
is removed.

Make Leather Waterproof.—Satur-  
ate it with castor oil; to stop shoes  
squaking, drive a peg into the middle  
of the sole.

Clean the Hair.—Wash well with a  
mixture of soft water, 1 pint; sal soda  
1 ounce; cream tartar ¼ ounce.

Egg Stains on Spoons.—Rub with  
common salt.

Fruit Stains on Hands.—Wash the  
hands in clear water, dry slightly and  
while still moist strike a sulphur  
match and hold your hands around the  
flame.

Clean Gloves.—Pour a little ben-  
zine into a basin and wash the gloves  
in it, rubbing and squeezing them un-  
til clean. If much soiled, they must  
be washed again through clean ben-  
zine and rinsed in a fresh supply.  
Hang in the air to dry.

Clean Hair Brushes.—Dissolve a lit-  
tle soda in warm water and pour in a  
small amount of ammonia. Hold the  
brushes with the bristles downward  
and avoid wetting the back as far as  
possible; shake until the grease is  
removed; then rinse in cold water and  
put in the air to dry.

Remove Stains from Linen.—Wet  
the part stained and lay on it some  
salt of wormwood; then rub without  
diluting it with more water.

How to Remove a Rusty Screw.—  
Apply a red hot iron to the head for  
a short time, the screw-driver being  
applied immediately while the screw  
is hot.

Remove Mildew from Cloth.—Put a  
teaspoonful of chloride of lime into a  
quart of water, strain it twice, then  
dip the mildewed places in this weak  
solution and lay in the sun. If not ef-  
fective the first time repeat.

Cure Mosquito Bites.—Put ten drops  
of refined carbolic acid into an ounce  
of rose water; shake well and apply.  
(If you hold your breath while a mos-  
quito has its bill in you it cannot  
withdraw it until you breathe again).

PROVINCE OF QUEBEC  
PREPARING FOR TOURISTS

Engineers Now at Work on the Road Between Montreal and  
the Laurentians—Highway from Fraserville to Edmund-  
ston is Also Being Surveyed and Will be Greatly Improved  
—Will Aid Lumber Interests of the Two Provinces.

(Montreal Star.)

The Province of Quebec is doing her  
spring housecleaning in the matter of  
roads for the tourist and will have a  
more attractive domicile to present to  
her visitors when they arrive this sea-  
son. Government engineers are now  
engaged in surveying the road be-  
tween Montreal and the Laurentian  
mountains district to St. Agathe.

This is being done with a view to  
opening up a provincial highway. Al-  
though this stretch of road will be only  
sixty miles in length, it will be one  
of the most important pieces of high-  
way constructed this season.

To the tourist it will add materially  
to the attractiveness of provincial dis-  
tricts that he may reach in his car by  
a good road. Than the Laurentian  
Mountain district as a summer resort  
there is none better in this part of the  
country, and the fact that poor high-  
ways led into it has always proved a  
stumbling block and strangled its de-  
velopment. Now with the opening up  
of the district all summer long, Great  
developments are anticipated in the  
Laurentians this season.

This road is not only of importance  
to the tourist from south of the bor-  
der and people from other provinces  
of Canada, but from the standpoint of  
the local motorist it is most interest-  
ing. Many Montreals already spend  
their summers in the Laurentian dis-  
trict and many more have been pre-  
vented from doing this because of the  
fact that they did not wish to risk a  
high priced car on the poor roads that  
lead into the district. This season  
they will be able to satisfy their de-  
sires. No road that has been built in  
years in this province is perhaps of  
more pecuniary interest to Montreal  
than the Montreal-St. Agathe highway,  
now being surveyed.

Government engineers are also en-  
gaged at the present time in a sur-  
vey of a highway between Fraserville,  
Que., and Edmundston, N. B., a dis-  
tance of seventy-five miles. This road  
will be built this summer if plans ma-  
terialize. This highway will be of  
much importance as a link bringing

the provinces of Quebec and New  
Brunswick closer together. The lum-  
ber interests of the two provinces are  
very closely allied. New Brunswick  
has a large number of people who  
speak the French tongue and there  
are many things in common between  
the two. Recent letters from New  
Brunswick indicate that the people of  
that province are very keen to see the  
proposed road constructed.

20 to 30 minutes.

Bread—Medium loaf, 40 to 60 min.  
Cake—Plain, 20 to 40 minutes.  
Biscuit—10 to 20 minutes.  
Sponge Cake—45 to 60 minutes.  
Chickens—3 to 4 lbs weight, 1 to  
one and a half hours.

Cookies—10 to 15 minutes.  
Custards—15 to 20 minutes.  
Duck (tame)—40 to 60 minutes.  
Fish—6 to 8 lbs., 1 hour.  
Gingerbread—20 to 30 minutes.  
Graham Gems—30 minutes.  
Lamb—Well done, per lb., 15 min.  
Mutton—Rare, per lb., 10 minutes,  
well done, per lb., 15 minutes.  
Pie crust—30 to 40 minutes.  
Pork—Well done, per lb., 30 min.  
Potatoes—30 to 45 minutes.  
Pudding—Bread, rice and tapioca,  
1 hour; plum, 2 to 3 hours.  
Rolls—10 to 15 minutes.  
Turkey—70 lbs., 3 hours.  
Veal—Well done, per lb., 20 minutes.
