STOLEN PROPERTY MUST BE RESTORED BY HUNS

Skull of the Sultan of Okawwawa to be Delivered to the British Government — The Rouher Papers Must be Restored to France—Were Stolen at the Time of the Franco-Prussian War Forty-five Years Ago.

New York, May 10.—In the Peace terms as submitted to the Germans, it is set forth that Germany must restore the Koran of the Caliph Othman taken from Medina to the King of Hedjaz must deliver the skull of the Sultan Okwawwa to the British government and must restore to France the flags which were taken in 1870 and particularly "certain documents belonging then to M. Rouher."

The Rouher papers are in the main correspondence which has passed between Rouher and various sovereigns and prime ministers of the South German States just before the Franco-Prussian war.

The book of Othman and the skull of Okwawwa are objects symbolic of the right to rule at Medina and in a portion of British Central Africa.

Bouher was the chief adviser to Napoleon III., and the most important statesman in his cabinet. He was Minister without portfolio and much of his service to his sovereign consisted of correspondence between him and various persons in the South German States.

Just before the end of the Franco-Prussian war all of the papers which it was not considered desirable for Prussian eyes to see were entrusted to Rouher, who removed them to his

chateau. The chateau was raided and the papers seized and they have been in Berlin ever since.

It was largely through what he learned from the papers that Bismarck was able to coerce some of the lesser German sovereigns into coming into the German Federation, or Empire, as it was up to a short time ago.

The Othman Koran and the copies taken from the Holy Moslem city by Enver Pasha and a force of Turks and Germans just before the arrival of the British, led by General Allenby.

It will go to the King of the Hedjaz, because he is deemed to be the political successor of Mohammed the prophet and founder of the Moslem religion.

The authentic text of the Koran is contained in the Medina version and three copies of it were made, one being kept in each of the metropolitan cities of Kufa, Basra and Damascus. They were written by Said Abu Thabit, who had been Ammanensis to the prophet and three of the Calif Othman, kinsman and son-in-law of Mohammed who began his caliphate in the year 644.

The Othman Koran and the copies were ordered written because of disputes that had arisen concerning several earlier versions of the Koran.

When it was complete it was decreed official and all preceding copies were burned.

Enver Pasha removed it from Medina because at the time he and the Kaiser had agreed that the Kaiser himself was to be the next caliph and Grand Sherief of Medina, and that any book or other object symbolic of that office belonged in Berlin.

In the same manner the skull of the Sultan Okwawwa, Enver Pasha caused to be removed from the territory where it was symbolic of rulership to German East Africa. As it was not so important a thing as the Koran of Othman, it was retained in East Africa instead of being dignified by transmission to Berlin, the Kaiser no doubt, feeling that it would be quite the right time for him to take charge of it when he came through Africa on an inspection trip after he was supreme and exalted ruler of all that part of the African continent lying between the Mediterranean and the Cape of Good Hope.

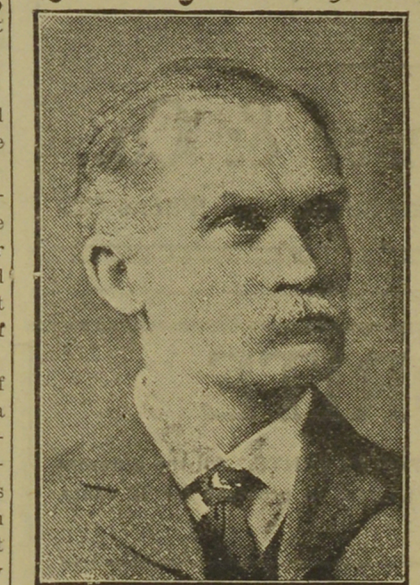

APPOINTED DIRECTOR OF FOOD SUPPLIES

Ottawa, May 10.—The appointment of Dr. J. W. Robertson, as Canadian director of food supplies, a position which has been created at the request of the supreme economic council of the allied governments was announced last night by Hon. T. A. Crean, minister of agriculture. Dr. Robertson's duties will relate only to the sale of Canadian agricultural products in Europe.

The statement is as follows: "The food situation in Europe has been engaging the close attention of the supreme economic council, which was created by the allies some time ago to supervise the economic and particularly the food conditions, in respect to relations with neutral and enemy countries. This council will have largely to do with the distribution of food supplies until conditions in Europe get back to a normal and stable basis.

"Canada's interest in this whole mat-

ter has been receiving the attention of Dr. J. W. Robertson, who has been in close consultation at all times with Sir Robert Borden. The prime minister has cabled that a short time ago a proposal was made that Canada should appoint a Canadian director of food supplies, who could keep closely in touch with the whole food situation. This proposal was agreed to and Canada was asked to appoint a representative, whose official title should be Canadian Director of Foodstuffs. This of course has reference only to the sale of Canadian agricultural products in Europe during the reconstruction period that Europe is now passing through.

"Dr. Robertson has been asked, and has agreed to accept this position, by which he becomes a member of the food section of the Supreme Economic Council and, in the absence of Sir George Foster, may take his place as a member of the Supreme Economic Council itself. This places Dr. Robertson in a position of equality with the other representatives of the allied countries in the food section of the economic council, and, as a result he will be able to keep intimately in touch with the sale and distribution of foodstuffs generally in Europe and look

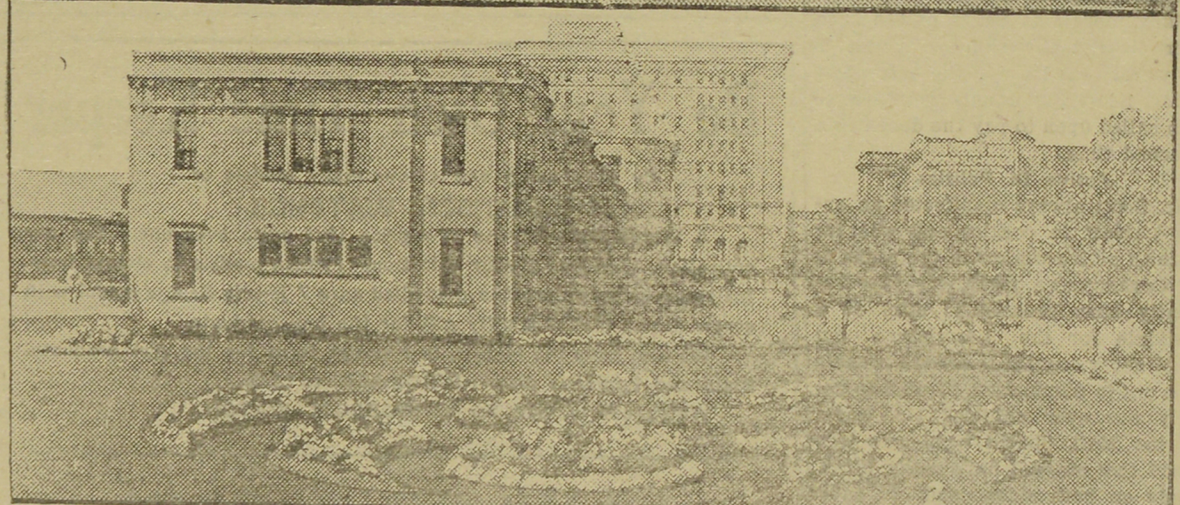
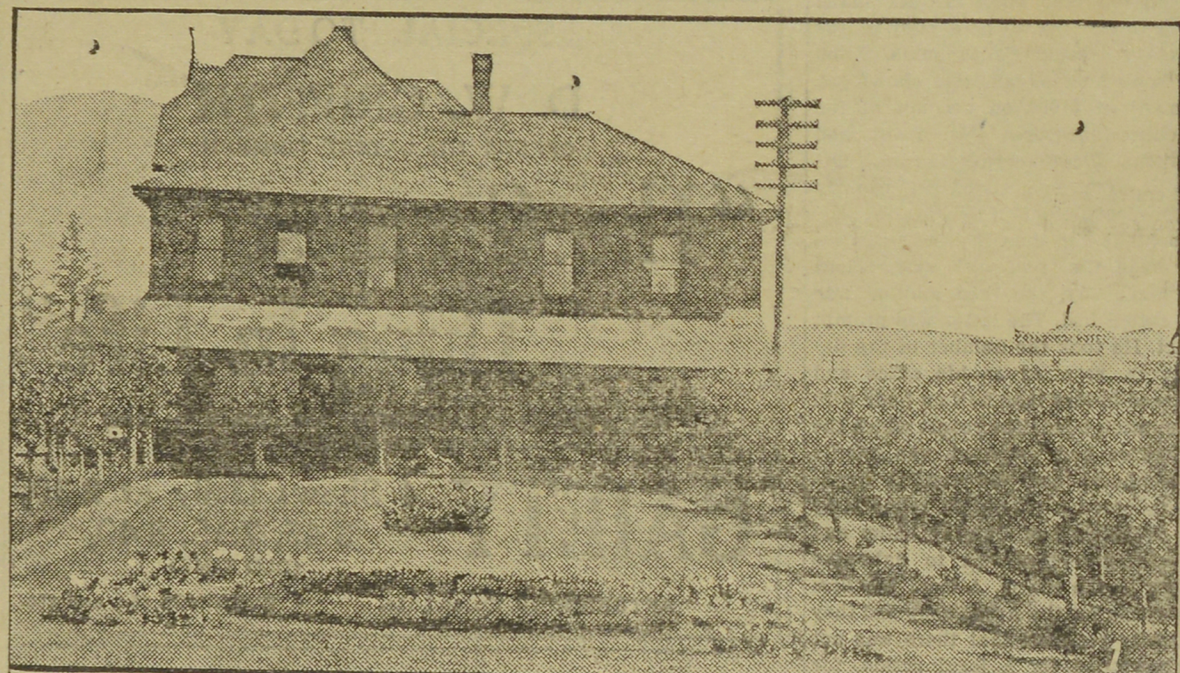

"It is felt that Dr. Robertson is exceptionally well qualified for this task. His knowledge of Europe generally, his acquaintanceship with all the leading men now associated with this work in Europe, and his ability will qualify him for this very important work. When in Europe last summer as the representative of the Department of Agriculture, he met and consulted with the leading officials in the British, French and Italian ministries of food. ROADS THAT ARE STREWN WITH FLOWERS



There are many who believe that all big corporations and industrial concerns only look to the material side of things and work machine-like for the production of wealth, regardless of the winter's snow and unheeding of the summer's bloom. This is often an erroneous idea, for it is generally realized that man does not altogether live by offices and pens and papers and engines and other accoutrements of labor—he requires trees and shrubs and flowers and the loveliness of nature.

The Canadian Pacific Railway has always paid considerable attention to the development of garden plots along its lines. It is just thirty years ago since a C.P.R. employee raised a few varieties of flower seeds in his own garden, and distributed them amongst his friends in the service of the company, with the object of promoting flower gardening at the various station plots of the railway. A vast advance has been made since then; and now the company possesses a Floral Department with headquarters at Windsor street Station, Montreal, and a Floral Committee which embraces members from the Eastern and Western lines. It is under the guidance of this department that the various station plots and other properties of the company are cleared up and beautified. Thousands of packages of flower seeds, bulbs, trees, and shrubs and large quantities of grass seeds and fertilizers have been distributed during the last few years to station agents, section foremen, caretakers of round houses, and all employees living on the property of the com-

pany. Travellers on the line observe the happy results achieved. The cultivation work is done in all cases by the employees themselves, who in most cases acquired the art of amateur gardening by taking their lessons from leaflets issued by the Floral Department. The best material is always provided. Amongst the varieties of trees supplied are: Maple, birch, beech, poplar and catalpa. Some of the shrubs are: weigelia, berberis, laurel leaf willow and sumac. Perennials distributed are: Oriental poppies, iris, phlox, veronica, gaillardia, larkspur, columbine, sweet william, and pinks. Bedding plants used include: geraniums, coleus, cannas, pansies, asters, verbenas, petunias, and castor oil plants. Standard seed packets sent out contain: Nasturtiums, alyssum, mignonette, sweet peas, phlox and kochia. Ferns and house plants are given to the larger stations. The establishment and main-
