### **OPERATING ONE HOUR EARLIER**

### Important Daylight Saving Change of Time at Two a.m. Sunday, March 30th, 1919.

All clocks and watches used in operation of Canadian National Railways will at 2 a. m. Sunday, March 30th, be advanced one hour. To prevent serious confusion and inconvenience o the public the attention of all concerned is directed to the ollowing conditions resulting from the important change of

If cities, towns, villages and other municipal bodies do not change their local time to correspond with the new railway time, all concerned should keep in mind that while trains continue to leave railway stations on present schedule, such sched ule will be operated one hour ahead of present local time.

Therefore, any municipality where local time is not changed to correspond with the new railway time, passengers must reach railway stations one hour earlier than shown in current folders and public time posters.

Where municipal time is changed to correspond with the new railway time, passengers will not experience difficulty growing out of the change.
