

8. That all unearned increment or idle or unproductive lands should be shared by the people whose toil and xpenditures were responsible for the increased values.

9. Believing that Canadian citizenship cannot achieve her ideals in any ommunity where racial or other



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
groups are permitted to establish communal settlements, in which their former customs, language and ideals are perpetuated, these communities tending to become insoluble lumps in our Canadian commonwealth, we declare ourselves in favor of legislation which will prevent the segregation of any racial groups or of any peculiar sect in any community, and will assure the organization of Canadian schools, the adoption of Canadian methods, and the understanding of Canadian social and business ideals. 10. Believing that our wives, mothers, daughters and sisters are equally interested in the development of our country, and equally capable of fulfilling the duties of citizenship we declare our belief that such citizenship should be extended to women on the same terms as men.
