

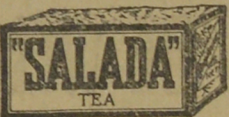

MANY BRITISH WOMEN WILL KEEP WAR JOBS

London, Jan. 14.—The number of women who will be thrown out of work by the ending of the war is not so great as is imagined. About one and a half million extra women have been employed in the United Kingdom since July, 1914, but the number of killed and disabled men amounts to about one million. Therefore there remain 500,000 women workers who will be displaced.

Their displacement will come gradually and they will not be thrown on the labor market at once, for one-third of the increase in women's labor consists of dilutees. Until the men come back they will remain at their jobs.

In the meantime many new spheres have sprung up for women. They will continue making tools and machinery, they will be employed in subsidiary shipbuilding industries, they will do their share in the chemical trades, and also there are two quite new branches of work open to women of the United Kingdom, the manufacture of pianos and toys, both of which in-

TRANSPORTS IN EXCHANGE FOR SUPPLIES

Paris, Monday, Jan. 15.—The economic terms approved by today's session of the Supreme War Council to be imposed for the extension of the armistice with Germany provides that Germany shall hand over to the Allies all her cargo steamers in German and other ports to enable the Allies to revictual Germany and such adjacent countries as may be decided upon. The terms also require the restitution of all manufacturing machinery, etc., taken from the invaded regions which it is possible to identify. This was decided upon in view that it would bring about a quicker revival of economic life than the payment of an equivalent in money. The financial clauses concern the gold reserve of the Reich Bank and the issue of money by Germany. Marshal Foch, when he meets the German armistice delegates, will make suggestions regarding the security of government monetary deposits and the means of issuing bank notes. Guarantees will be required regarding any removal of the Reich Bank's gold from Berlin in view of Bolshevik activities.

The naval conditions demand strict compliance with the requirements of the original armistice concerning the handing over of the submarines, which have not yet been complied with. No question was raised regarding the occupation of German ports by the Allies as had been reported.

The armistice question thus being settled, Marshal Foch left tonight for Treves where the German delegates will be received.

METHODISTS ADOPT SOME IMPORTANT RESOLUTIONS

Meeting of Executive Committee of the General Board of Evangelism and Social Service — A Great Responsibility Rests Upon the Shoulders of Canadians—All War Profits Should be Taken by the Government—Public Utilities Should be Operated in the Interests of the People.

The following report was unanimously adopted at a joint meeting of the Executive Committees of the General Board of Evangelism and Social Service and the Army and Navy Board of The Methodist Church, on December, 10th, 1918.

Having before us the reports adopted by the recent General Conference of the Methodist Church on "Evangelism and Social Service" and "The Church, The War and Patriotism," the Executive Committees of the General Board of Evangelism and Social Service and the Army and Navy Board in joint session with serious concern as to our responsibility as representing the Church and our duty as co-operating with those in authority, after faithful investigation of the conditions confronting our country; giving us some knowledge and appreciation of the magnitude and far-reaching influence of the social, economic, industrial and national problems that now demand constructive consideration and solution, we present the following resolutions:

1. That in view of the heroic spirit of the 419,000 sons of Canada who offered themselves to the Empire to fight the battles of democracy in government, and fraternity among nations and peoples, in behalf of righteousness and liberty and honor, of whom 50,000 paid the supreme sacrifice, and 213,000 were wounded, shell shocked, nerve wracked, and otherwise disabled, it is inconceivable that at home we should continue the selfish methods in our industrial political and economic activities which have characterized the social order of past years.

2. That in view of these services by our fellow citizens in khaki, our citizens at home must be ready to evidence the same courage and heroism

by acceptance of the same ideals and principles, and with unflinching purpose, even at great personal loss and sacrifice seek to secure the dominance of these ideals and principles in the new social order that must evolve with the coming of peace.

Value of Righteousness

3. That our present responsibility can be met only in a constructive way and by a recognition of the moral values of righteousness, liberty and fraternity.

4. That it is the duty of the Church State and Society in general to seek to establish the happy mean as between Bolshevistic methods and ideals on the one hand, and autocracy of government or capital on the other.

5. While commending the Government for the action already taken to claim war profits for the nation as a whole, we strongly urge such further investigation, action, and additional legislation as will more nearly equalize the financial sacrifices of those who served in khaki and those who remained at home. We affirm it is a sound principle that all war profits should be taken by the Government and applied to the payment of our war debt.

6. Believing that the public utilities of Canada, including all means of communication and transportation, should be operated with a view to service of all the people rather than profits for private companies or individuals, we declare ourselves in favor of the nationalization of these utilities wherever possible, and where such nationalization is not possible, that legislation be enacted which will eliminate watered, promotion, or merger stock and abnormal profits.

The Natural Resources

7. Believing that the mines, water powers, fisheries, forests, etc., of Canada, should be developed and operated for the benefit of all the people, especially to facilitate the rehabilitation of the returned soldiers, we declare ourselves in favor of the nationalization of natural resources.

8. That all unearned increment on idle or unproductive lands should be shared by the people whose toil and expenditures were responsible for the increased values.

9. Believing that Canadian citizenship cannot achieve her ideals in any community where racial or other groups are permitted to establish communal settlements, in which their former customs, language and ideals are perpetuated, these communities tending to become insoluble lumps in our Canadian commonwealth, we declare ourselves in favor of legislation which will prevent the segregation of any racial groups or of any peculiar sect in any community, and will assure the organization of Canadian schools, the adoption of Canadian methods, and the understanding of Canadian social and business ideals.

10. Believing that our wives, mothers, daughters and sisters are equally interested in the development of our country, and equally capable of fulfilling the duties of citizenship we declare our belief that such citizenship should be extended to women on the same terms as men.

11. That industrial democracy is the complement of political democracy and that Church, State and Society should join in evolving an industrialism having for its ideal co-operation and service rather than selfish profits

Land Settlement

12. That we hold the Government responsible to make possible the settlement of returning soldiers, who so desire, upon the lands at present unoccupied and unproductive, whether such lands be held by the Government or by private speculators, thus enabling settlement near present centres of population.

13. That the Government act upon the report of the Department of Scientific Research and begin immediately to develop our unlimited natural resources in mines, forests, fisheries, etc., and thus provide both labor and economic benefit for the people.

14. That while enthusiastically commending the proposal of the Federal Government to loan \$25,000,000 through Provincial and Municipal authorities to assist in building homes for the people we express our conviction that this money must be administered under such restrictions that the people shall receive the very full

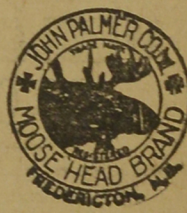
