## THE IMPERIAL PARLIAMENT PROROGUED BY THE KING

His Majesty Regrets That There is No Immediate Prospect of the Establishment of Constitutional Government in Russia—Visit of the Prince of Wales to Canada and the United States is Referred to.

London, Dec. 23.—The House of Commons was prorogued today until February 10. The session was formally closed by the King's speech of prorogation.

"I regret," said the King's speech, "that there is no improvement in the unhappy conditions prevailing in Russia and no immediate prospect in that country of the establishment of the constitutional government which alone can conduce to its permanent prosperity."

"My relations with my allies and associates in the great war remain of the most friendly character and I have every expectation that the close and intimate co-operation which led to the final victory will be long continued to the benefit of all."

"In August last my government concluded with the Persian government an agreement tending to cement the ties of friendship between the two countries which have so many interests in common and to promote the welfare and progress of Persia."

The King referred to the visit of the Prince of Wales to Canada and Newfoundland which he said "filled

my heart with feelings of pride and satisfaction." He subsequently continued the King, visited the United States of America, where he was greeted with a warmth and kindness which will, "I am confident, have the happiest effect upon the relations of the British Empire and that great republic."

Referring to India the speech said that a measure marking the first stage of the development of a responsible government in India has become a law. "I rely on all my subjects," continued the speech, "to work together for its success. In a proclamation which I am addressing to my viceroy and to the Princess and the people of India I am expressing my hope that a harmonious political life will steadily be built up on the foundations thus laid, and I am announcing my intention of sending the Prince of Wales to India to inaugurate the new constitution."

To the members of the House of Commons the King gave his thanks for their provision during the year for the public expenditure, which had continued abnormal largely exceeding the permanent and the temporary revenue and he trusted that next year, with the return of more normal conditions, he said, that the first steps would be taken toward the reduction of the national debt.

"The condition of our finances and the state of our credit continue to occupy the serious attention of my ministers," he went on. "Only by strict economy both in public and private expenditure and sustained by increased production can the country maintain its historic position in commerce and finance."

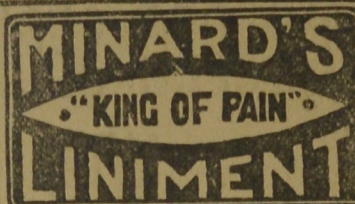

## VITAL STATISTICS

The service for the collection of Vital Statistics in New Brunswick, which goes into effect on the first day of January, 1920, is in consonance, so far as general principles and report forms are concerned, with those adopted by each of the other provinces of the Dominion.

The object sought to be obtained is that information relating to births, marriages and deaths received by this province should be, so far as may be, common with that obtained by every other province. These particulars will be transmitted to the Dominion Bureau of Statistics, Ottawa, where they will be collated, compiled and published. Such co-operation has been undertaken at the express request of the Dominion Bureau.

These compilations and publications will be of the greatest value to the public, not only with respect to the public health, but also the legal, racial and occupational status of every resident of Canada.
