

HEAVY PENALTY FOR ILLEGALLY KILLING MOOSE

CAUGHT IN RESTIGOUCHE
WITH FRESH CARCASS

**Fifty Dollar Fines for Two Men
—One Also Fined Thirty
Dollars for Trapping
Beaver.**

A heavy penalty was imposed this week at Charlo, Restigouche County, for the killing of a moose out of season. Ranger Russell discovered two men in the act of bringing a carcass of a freshly killed moose out of the woods. Information was laid against the two before a magistrate at Charlo and the Ranger prosecuted. A conviction was made and fines of fifty dollars each with costs were imposed.

One of the men also had been caught trapping beaver without a permit. He was prosecuted also for that and convicted and a fine of thirty dollars imposed.

Many Beaver Permits

A considerable number of permits for the trapping of beaver have been issued by the Department of Lands and Mines. The price of the beaver traps is up and there is great demand for the fur.
