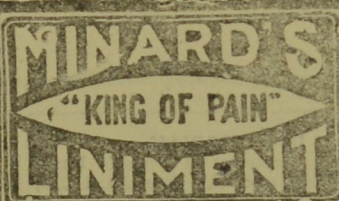

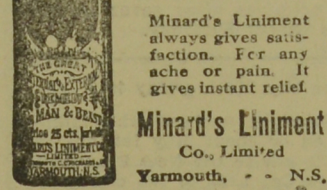

BILL FOR BETTER HOUSING BEFORE THE LEGISLATURE

Some Features of the Measure Provoked Considerable Discussion—Generally Approved in Principle—Money Borrowed from Federal Government for a Period of Twenty Years—
Mr. Potts Describes Housing Conditions in St. John.

When the bill to amend the Audit Act was under discussion in the Legislature on Tuesday,—

HON. MR. FOSTER said that \$30,000 surplus was shown on cash transactions in receipts and expenditures but not on the business of the year. It was the statement which at that time should not go out for it led to discussion and criticism which were not in accordance with facts. He could say that the books were not kept open and there was an account showing bills payable. The people should get an exact statement but could not get it if a statement were prepared at the

31st. The House meeting in the following December of January.

MR. BAXTER said they must discuss much older accounts.

HON. MR. FOSTER said he wanted an opportunity of looking into the measure and suggested that progress be reported and leave asked to sit again.

The Committee reported progress.

The Housing Bill

The committee took up the consideration of the bill to provide for better housing.

MR. BAXTER argued that there was no definite term for repayment of

end of the year. It was that which the Comptroller General wished to abolish. At first he had not taken in the true meaning of this section but that was the intention of it. There was no other province which published a cash statement 60 days after the close of the year. Such a statement was misleading for the report of the Comptroller General came out afterward and showed a difference.

MR. BAXTER said he did not know if ever he would understand this muddle of figures which got worse and worse each year. He had this to say about the publication of a statement at the end of the year. This revelation had come to the Premier and to the committee practically as the result of an accidental inquiry. It was not his province to offer advice to hon. gentlemen opposite but he might be able to show them the position in which they would place themselves before the people if they did this. The inference certainly would be drawn that the government was desirous of concealing something and they would have only themselves to blame. It might be that sometime in the future that the gentleman on the chairman's right would be on his left and would want the information which the present opposition desired. Year after year it had been a struggle of various governments to get the Comptroller General's report printed. This year had been no exception, the date of the opening of the Legislature being practically fixed by the printing of that report. And what happened after the report was received? After the lapse of a few hours the House plunged into the budget.

HON. MR. FOSTER—It was longer than that this year. It was almost a week.

MR. BAXTER continuing, said that a statement of some kind of the finances of the province was necessary. He was not disposed to be captious. If December 31st were not late enough another date should be selected. He did not say this in order that party newspapers might be set on the trail to make capital for either government or opposition, but there should be some time set for the House to meet after the publication of the report. There might be an interval of three or four weeks with which the members could familiarize themselves with the details. This would insure the people having proper information.

HON. MR. FOSTER said that in other provinces this difficulty was overcome by closing the fiscal year May

money borrowed from the Dominion. HON. MR. ROBINSON said that the term was supposed to be twenty years according to the memorandum furnished by the Dominion Government, but it was not adhered to closely because it was thought a change might be made.

MR. MURRAY (Kings) suggested that the Lieutenant-Governor-in-Council be authorized to borrow instead of the Provincial Secretary Treasurer.

An amendment to that effect was adopted.

HON. MR. ROBINSON said that under the Dominion regulations there was no authority to loan money to the Farm Settlement Board but a clause had been inserted on the possibility of such authority being given.

MR. BAXTER said that provisions in other provincial acts were to the effect that money borrowed from the Dominion could be devoted only to urban communities, but money obtained from other sources could be devoted to agricultural communities. In other words, the credit of the province could be extended to the municipalities to aid farmers. Recently while in Toronto he had conversed with Sir William Hearst on this subject. The Premier of Ontario felt that this would help in solving the rural labor problem as well as in the city. Both province and Dominion were on the eve of a large problem. In the main he agreed with remarks made by his hon. colleague from St. John on this matter but did not agree with him that the offer of the Dominion government was useless. Under its provisions people could obtain dwellings who otherwise could never own them. But the class which was in greatest need of social uplift, would not be benefitted and in saying that he did not wish to reflect on either provincial or Dominion legislation, Conditions undreamed of a few years ago confronted the world. It was the problem of the nations which had emerged victorious from the war and of this continent in particular to make industrial classes content. They must be brought up in neither ignorance nor filth. The war had emphasized the contrast between the man who had made his money easily and extensively and the man who in his whole life time could never hope to own his own home. This might be thought Bolshevism or whatever it was called, but it was the tendency of the times. Certain classes were beginning to realize their power and they must be well directed or they would use that power unwisely as they had already in some countries. At the risk of incurring heavy debt the public must go into the cities and towns and rip out the tenements which were unsuited, for the world at least owed a growing child decent surroundings. Under existing conditions a working man could not acquire his own dwelling so the community must give him part of his home or a low rent. This must be done to meet social conditions for the effects of the war were just beginning to be felt.

MR. CAMPBELL said he had not
