# THE S. S. OLYMPIC BROUGHT 5000 MEN FROM OVERSEAS

Reached Halifax Yesterday on What will be Her Last Trip as a Troop Ship—Hon. J. C. Doherty Among the Passengers—Gives His Views on the Peace Treaty—Considers the League of Nations a Great Boon.

Halifax, July 8—The White Star liner Olympic arrived this afternoon on what it is said to be her last trip with returned soldiers to this port. She brought more than 5,000 soldiers and there were on board besides a number of civilians. The men got away in good time, the Canadian National Railway having the trains all in readiness.

Asked for an opinion on the peace treaty, Hon. J. C. Doherty, minister of justice, who was aboard, said that the question was too large to be adequately dealt with within the limits of an interview.

"Such a convention could not of course," he said "be expected to meet entirely the views of any individual nor to satisfy to the full, the desires of any of the nations concerned. The treaty had been and would still be further subjected to adverse criticism. In some respects it doubtless fell short of the expectations of most. This much, however, he thought would be conceded—that it was the result of an earnest endeavor on the part of the leading statesmen responsible for it, to conciliate the frequently antagonistic views of the nations concerned to give fair consideration to the just aspirations of each of them, and lay to the basis for an enduring peace, that would secure to the world in the largest measure possible the fruits of the victory that had been so dearly bought."

### The League of Nations

Turning to the question of the league of nations, Mr. Doherty said: "That the league has been brought into existence is in itself a great boon it gives the world an organization looking to cooperation among the nations for the preservation of peace, and the establishment, and maintenance of justice in their relations with each other."

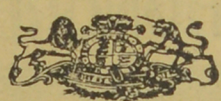

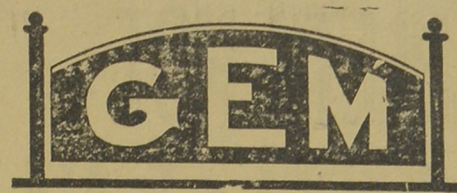

## RAIN HAS AIDED WHEAT CROP

Winnipeg, July 9.—Owing to good rainfalls during the past two weeks, it is now expected that the average yield of grain in southern Alberta and Saskatchewan will be fifteen bushels to the acre, according to information received by the land and development department of the Canadian Pacific Railway.

Reports to the Land and Resources department of the Canadian National Railways show that prospects for a good crop are excellent.

### SMALL MID-WEEK MARKET

Strawberries Drop in Price but Eggs Remain High.

The mid-week market this morning was small with buyers scarce. Prices still kept high although strawberries came down some. Eggs sold for 60 cents a dozen. The prices ruled as follows:—

Eggs, 55 and 60 cents per dozen.  
Butter, 45 cents per pound.  
Veal, 9 to 15 cents per pound.  
Beef, 11 to 16 cents per pound.  
Pork, 21 to 23 cents per pound.  
Chickens, 35 to 40 cents per pound.  
Fowl 35 cents per pound.  
Strawberries, 25 cents per box.  
Pickerel, 10 cents each.
