These included, The American Institute, Mining and Metallurgical Engineers, American Electro-Chemical Society, Technical Association of Pulp and Paper Industry and others.

The Government of Canada and the Province of Ontario, realizing the importance of this opportunity of telling abroad the story of our resources were represented by exhibits, and by some of their best men. The Canadian National Railways had an exhibit illustrating the mineral, forest wealth, water powers and raw materials of the country.

During the Exposition two addresses were delivered by C. Price-Green, Commissioner, Industrial & Resources Dept., Canadian National Railways, on Canadian National Resources and the great field afforded in Canada for enterprise and investment of Capital, which were widely reported in the American Press and many scientific publications.

Toronto, Nov. 12—Premier Drury announced that R. H. Grant member-elect for Carleton has accepted the portfolio of education in the Ontario cabinet now being formed. Mr. Drury also stated that he had wired W. F. Nickle, K. C. of Kingston offering him the portfolio of attorney-general.

Mr. Drury added that Mr. Nickle was expected in Toronto tonight and would then give him his final answer.

The Farmer's Sun which is regarded as the official mouthpiece of the premier gives today the following list of the new cabinet:

Premier E. C. Drury; minister of agriculture, Manning Doherty; education, R. H. Grant; lands and forests, Benjah Bowman; public works, F. C. Biggs; labor and health, W. R. Rollo; mines, H. Mills; provincial secretary, C. Nixon; provincial treasurer Peter Smith; attorney-general, W. F. Nickle. Without portfolio, Lieut.-Col. D. Carmichael, D. S. O. Messers Nickle and Smith have not finally accepted. The new cabinet will have a conference tomorrow.

FACES CHARGE OF MURDER

Quebec, Nov. 12—John Burke, also known under his French Canadian name, of Jean Bourque, of Jackman, Maine, was today given a preliminary hearing at Jackman on a charge of murder. He is held for the death of Nelson W. Bartley, owner of the Moose River House at Jackman, who was found murdered in the bush between the town of Jackman and the Canadian border.

Burke was the last person seen in company with Bartley. At today's hearing before a Magistrate he pleaded not guilty and was remanded.

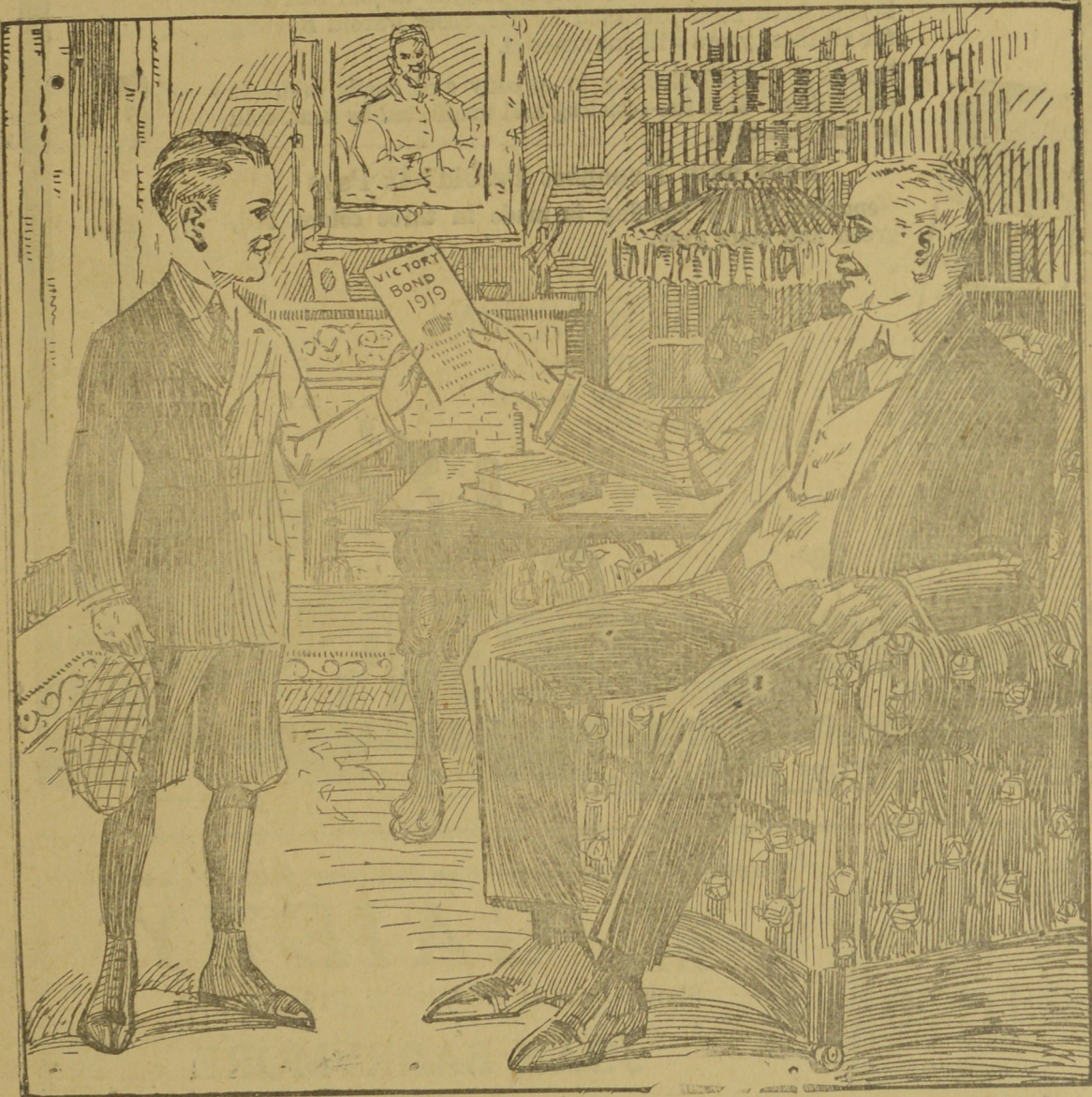

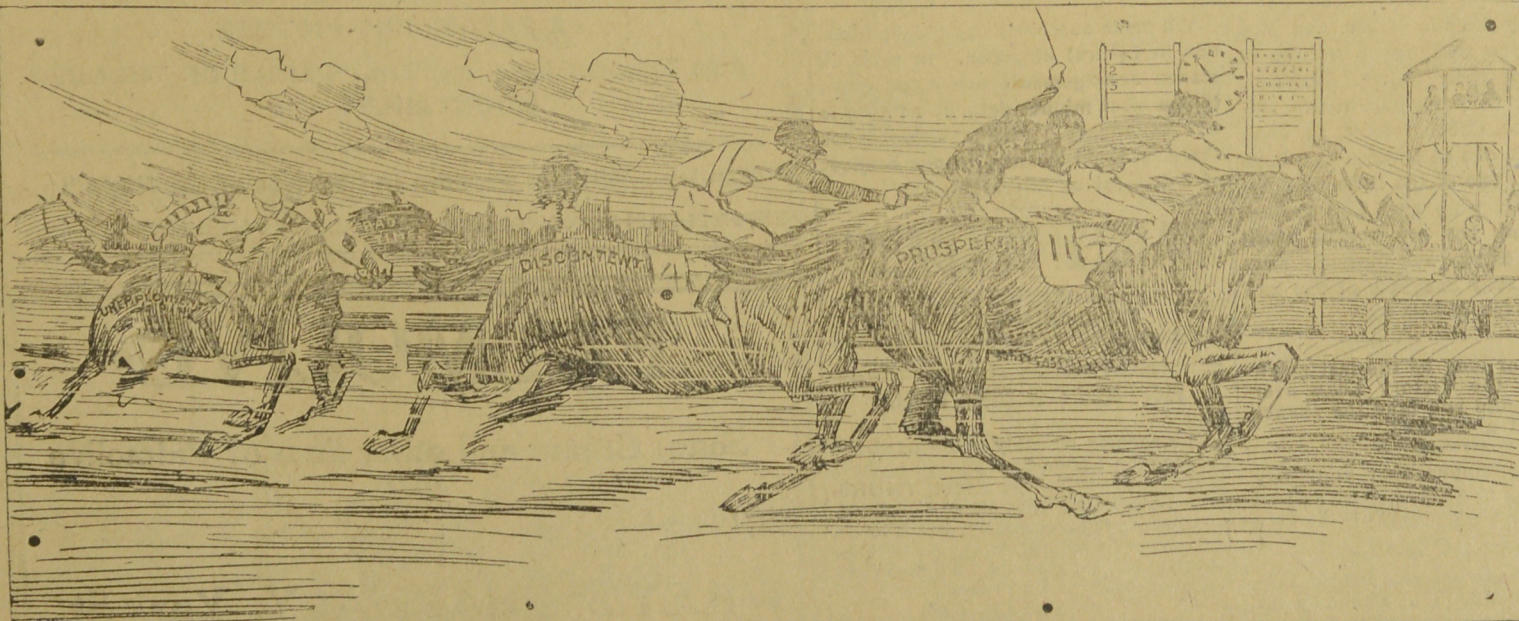
