SUGAR SHORTAGE MAY SOON END

New York, Nov. 7.—R. H. McLean,
secretary and treasurer of the St. Law-
rence Sugar Refineries of Canada,
which a few days ago offered for sale
at an excessive price 2,240,000 pounds
of sugar on ships in the harbor, called
upon Food Administrator Williams yester-
day and expressed his regret at the
complications caused by his firm's offer,
according to the New York World.
Mr. McLean, who on Wednesday put
this sugar on the market at a fair
price, added 280,000 pounds to his offer
yesterday. The price set by the sugar
equalization board will be about 11 cts.
a pound, Mr. Williams said. The sugar
shortage will end within a week or ten
days, Mr. Williams predicted.

AROUND THE CITY

The curbing constructed on Char-

RATE ON COAL FROM MINTO RATHER STIFF

Ottawa, Nov. 5.—The Board of Rail-
way Commissioners has given a sort of
interim decision on the complaint of
the Board of Trade of Woodstock, N.
B., against the rate charged by the
Canadian Pacific Railway on coal from
Minto. The municipality of Frederic-
ton has also complained against the
rate from Minto to Fredericton. The
rate from Minto to Woodstock was at-
tacked on the ground that it was un-
reasonably high and discriminatory,
the rate from Minto to St. John which
is about the same distance as to Wood-
stock, being \$1.10 per ton, while the
Woodstock rate was \$1.85.

The case of the rates on the road
in question have come under the con-
trol of the board, but tariffs have not
yet been filed. When this is done, the
matter will be gone into further and
if the rates are not satisfactory there
will be a further hearing of the case.
