Prices About the Same—Eggs Still High-Meats are Getting Low Prices-Chickens Plentiful.

A big market was collected this mor ning at Phoenix Square with a good variety of produce. Prices were low with the exception of eggs for which 70 and 75 cents were obtained. Chickens were plentiful selling for 35 and 40 cents a pound.

The ruling prices were as follows: Chickens, 35 to 40 cents per lb. Fowl, 30 to 35 cents per 4b. Veal, 9 to 15 cents per lb. Lamb, 17 to 24 cents per lb. Beef, 13 to 18 cents per 1b. Pork, 20 to 26 cents per 1b. Mutton, 13 to 18 cents per 1b. Carrots, \$1.00 per bbl. Turnips, 60 cents per barrel. Potatoes, \$2.75 to \$3.00 per barrel. Apples, \$1.50 to \$3.50 per barrel. Live pigs, \$3.50 to \$4.50 each. Pumpkin and Squash, 2 cents per lb.
