## PRE-WAR SHOES FAIL TO FIT WAR HEROES

(Buffalo News)

The shoe dealers of Buffalo are in a quandary. The trouble is not about the war, the price of leather or over the reconstruction problems. It is simply a matter of soldier's feet.

The majority of the men's footwear dealers are of the firm opinion that Uncle Sam, when he selected the big, broad-toed brogan for the doughboys and the fighters generally, he was destined to create havoc in the shoe business.

According to the shoeman, the soldiers and especially the doughboys, who have been on long hikes, have had an entire change of feet. Those who formerly wore a size six, now wear a broad size eight. In other words the big, clumsy army shoes, have made material changes in the size of soldier's feet.

To make matters worse it appears that the shoe manufacturers have not foreseen the change in feet situation as a result of the war and the shoe merchants are stocked with a large variety of pointed toe shoes. The demand for pointed toe shoes has in no way decreased, the shoe men complain but they are fashioned on along pre-war lines and returned soldiers find it difficult to squeeze their broadened foot into a pointed toe.

The shoemen further contend that it takes more time to sell shoes as the broad toed men have to try on a couple of dozen pairs before they find one that fits. While they are not cussing the deposed kaiser the shoe merchants are praying for a manufacturer to strike a happy medium in a shoe which will meet the demand created by the change in soldier's feet.

## "RANK OUTSIDER" WAS BRITISH AIR CHIEF

Odd Looking Aeroplane Attracted His Attention at Aeronautical Exposition in Madison Square Garden—Some Extravagant Claims Made by Braggart Booster—The Chief Tells of the Possibilities of Aviation—Some Wonderful Devices are Displayed at the Show.

New York, March 20.—An odd looking aeroplane attracted the attention of one of last night's visitors to the Aeronautical exposition in progress in Madison Square Garden.

The visitor was slim and almost boyish looking. He wore a dark business suit and a derby hat and tapped his foot incessantly with a light cane as he somewhat bashfully began to ask questions.

The aeroplane man assured him it was a wonderful machine, sprung several impressive technical terms in explaining its advantages, and mentioned it had flown circles around a certain famous air machine that was going "130 miles an hour."

The visitor brightened up and remarked that he would like to know where the famous machine made the record, 120 miles an hour being the best he ever heard of. The aeroplane man began to hedge.

Then the visitor began a polite and good natured cross-examination, in which he sprung a few technical terms of his own. Then he strolled away, leaving the aeroplane man marveling at the inside knowledge of a "rank outsider."

**A Wonderful Future.**

But the man need not have been surprised for the "outsider" was Gen. Guy Livingstone, chief of the British air service during the war.

Later, talking with newspaper men, Gen. Livingstone urged that extravagant claims in aviation be avoided "because the truth is wonderful enough." He said the aeroplane would not supplant existing methods of travel but would work in conjunction with them. He said he did not care whether an American or an Englishman flew across the Atlantic first, so long as the feat was accomplished, and expressed the opinion that aeronautics would be on a sound commercial basis in five years. He also hazarded the opinion that a "Secretary of the Air" in the President's cabinet would combine the present separate programme of army, navy, marines, post office and other organizations.

**Marvelous Devices.**

Many of the visitors think they would like to be aviators, but change their minds after a ride in the "orientator" that is part of the government's exhibit, showing in detail every step of the tests made to determine the qualifications of a candidate.

The "orientator" is a boxed-in seat like that of an aeroplane, set in bearings that enable to to buck several ways at one time. In one minute a passenger gets all the sensations of all the chute-the-chutes and switchbacks and rolipoly swings of Coney Island combined in one thrilling and usually sufficient ride. It is just like an aeroplane, only more so. It marks the end of the ambitions of many a would-be aviator, while the crowd looks on and howls with glee.

Wireless telephones have been installed in both the armory and Garden so visitors can talk back and forth and also can hear reports of the aviators who are to fly over the Garden every day.

Army men are kept busy explaining the marvellous devices which can be adjusted by turning a pointer to pick up messages from any given station, shutting out all others.

The pointer tunes the instrument to catch wireless waves of a certain length.

"Give me wave 365" orders the officer in charge and the operator, by setting his pointer, "tunes" the apparatus to catch only the messages from a sender whose instrument is keyed to wave 365.

Another remarkable device is the "moving picture machine gun," perfected to train military aviators in target work. Instead of bullets, the magazine of the gun is loaded with moving picture films. A camera attachment is put on and the aviator, high above the clouds, aims and fires the

## CANADA'S WAR APPROPRIATION NEXT FISCAL YEAR \$350,000,000

Ottawa, March 23.—Sir Thomas White has given notice of a resolution requiring a war appropriation for the next fiscal year of \$350,000,000 as compared with \$500,000,000 last year. The appropriation will be used among other things for the demobilization of the Canadian forces, the promotion of trade and industry and transportation facilities, and the carrying out of any measures deemed necessary or advisable by the government.

## DAYS OF WINDJAMMERS RECALLED WHEN CLIPPER SAILED FOR FRANCE

The glorious clipper ship days, when the windjammer was queen of the seas, were recalled when the big four-masted ship Valparaiso, under the French flag, hauled out of her berth at the foot of Dock street and started on her voyage down the Delaware for Nantes, France, with one of the largest and most valuable cargoes, valued at more than \$1,000,000, ever shipped across the Atlantic in a sailing vessel from this port. A rousing send-off was given this square rigged craft by the old-time salts who gathered at the pier to see the vessel sail. Passing steamships, tugs and ferryboats gave a parting salute with their whistles, and the dipping of their colors. The crew of the Valparaiso lined the decks and acknowledged the salutes with cheers. With its sister ship, the Atlantique, which is now here loading a similar cargo for France, the Valparaiso is noted for its fast sailing qualities. Years ago hundreds of these windjammers came to and sailed out of this port. Today only a few of these old time craft remain afloat. Another of these, the Severn, a three-masted sailing vessel of the old navy, has been chartered to load a general cargo at this port for France.

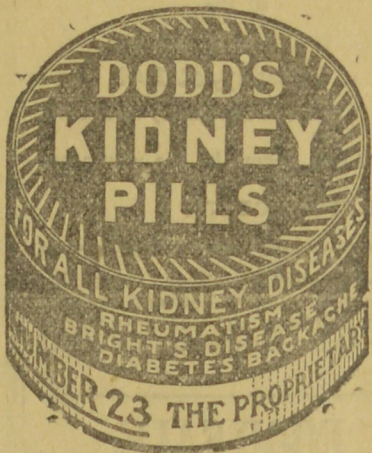
## WAREHOUSE FIRE IN CHICAGO
