## THE SITUATION IN POLAND CAUSING APPREHENSION

Disagreement of Members of the Peace Conference Over the Plans—Would Give Poland Access to the Sea by Means of Sixty Mile Corridor in East Prussia—This Would Place 1,500,000 Germans in the New Poland.

Paris, March 22—When the council of great powers met today, it was in an atmosphere of considerable apprehension over Poland, which is the chief subject of discussion. This is not on account of Poland itself but because of differences which have arisen affecting the fundamental question of nationality to which President Wilson has given his strong approval and also his thirteenth "point" which called for an independent Polish state with access to the sea.

This last clause has introduced an issue of which there is a wide divergence of views. A committee under the chairmanship of Jules Cambon with Sir William Tyrrell as the British member and Dr. Robert H. Lord as the American, has reached the plan of giving Poland this access to the sea, by means of a "corridor" sixty miles wide, running across east Prussia. But the effect of this concession is to place 1,500,000 Germans within the new Poland and to detach the easternmost part of Prussia from Germany.

Premier Lloyd George has taken the view that this denationalization of a large body of Germans would cause such discontent as would be likely to bring on another war, and it is understood President Wilson is not entirely satisfied with the proposal.

M. Cambon's committee, therefore, has just asked to revise the plan and this revision is now under discussion. The committee nevertheless wishes to adhere to its original plan for a wide corridor.

### Amendments to Plan

Paris, March 22—The peace conference commission on the league of nations at its meeting this afternoon under the chairmanship of President Wilson, completed consideration of eight articles of the league, and the changes being formal. The important amendments concerning the Monroe doctrine the Japanese amendment, and the French amendment relative to the creation of a general staff were deferred for consideration at the next meeting to be held Monday evening at 8.30 o'clock.

The Japanese amendment has been revised so as to be introduced into the preamble and recites the equality of nationals of the states belonging to the league.

The official statement of the meetings says:

"The commission on the league of nations met this afternoon under the chairmanship of President Wilson. This was the first meeting of the commission since the draft of the covenant was presented to the plenary session of the conference on Feb. 14.

"A discussion took place on a number of amendments suggested by the members of the commission as a result here of recent exchanges of views with the representatives of neutral states of the constructive criticism to which the covenant has been generally submitted.

"The commission will resume its examination of the covenant on Monday evening at 8.30."

### The German View

Copenhagen, March 22—At a meeting of the armistice commission on Thursday, General Baron Von Hammerstein, according to the despatch from Berlin, transmitted a note to General Nudant, Marshal Foch's representative, saying that the German government could in no case permit Polish troops to land at Danzig and pass through the country "as it would lead to an attempt to bloody oppress the undoubted German majority in West Prussia."

The note said that the government also refused to permit allied and Pol-

ish officers to travel unrestrictedly without supervision in the territories east of the Vistula.

General Nudant remarking that the note categorically rejected all the proposals and demands of the associated governments, said he would transmit it to Marshal Foch.

### Brussels Case for Capital

Paris, March 22—The official request of the Belgian delegation to the chief of the delegations of the five powers, that Brussels be selected as the capital of the league of nations is the first offer of the kind to be made officially to the peace conference. There has been talk of Versailles, Berne, Geneva and the Hague as the possible seat of the league, but Versailles and Brussels appear to be the favorites.

After mentioning the concrete argument offered by Belgium in the shape of the donation to the league of the Egmont Palace, formerly the property of the Duke D'Arenburg, as the seat of the league, M. Rolin-Jaquemyns, general secretary of the Belgian association said to the Associated Press:

"We have the greatest respect for the claim of neutrals in this matter and do not wish to make our application in behalf of Brussels stand merely on sentimental grounds, but on the practical advantages. As far as America is concerned, direct communications by wireless between Belgium and America would be assured. Our department of public works already is at work in an effort to tack a loop on one of the former German cables, in order to permit Ostend or Bruges to communicate direct with New York without a relay in England.

"In addition we are establishing a powerful wireless station in Belgium on a site particularly adapted to such a purpose and are permitting the erection of a station which will be able to be heard at any and all points along the American-Atlantic seaboard. Also in the event of a future war an attacking country might demur from violating Belgium when that country has the seat of the capital of the league of nations.

"I intended to refrain from mentioning the sentimental side of the question, but must ask whether you do not think that Belgium does not fully deserve the honor. In the war just ended she has been just the real incarnation of right and she fought with the object of fulfilling her international obligations. In the choice of Brussels as the seat of the league of nations, there would be a high moral compensation which would touch deeply the whole Belgian nation."

### Death of Mrs. Ada Tabor

The death of Mrs. Ada Tabor occurred at her residence in this city on Sunday in the eighty-first year of her age, after a lingering illness. Mrs. Tabor was a well known resident of the city and highly regarded and many in the province will hear of her death with regret. She was the widow of Charles Clifton Tabor, of the 15th Regiment and the youngest daughter of the late Hon. John R. Partlow. Two daughters and six sons are left to mourn their loss. The daughters are Miss Ada C. Tabor, of Fredericton, and Mrs. G. R. MacDonald, of Fresno, California; and two sons, Frank and Arthur, of Epzikom, Alberta; George of Fresno, California; Lee of Chicago; Aubrey, of the National Trans-continental railway, and Douglas of Pittsburgh. The funeral will take place on Tuesday afternoon leaving the house at three o'clock. Service will be held at Christchurch Cathedral by Very Rev. Dean Neales. Interment will be made at the Old Burying Ground.
