

Notice of Assignment and Meeting of Creditors.

NOTICE is hereby given, that Samuel B. Hatheway, of Kingsclear, in the County of York and Province of New Brunswick, Farmer, on the 11th day of February, A.D. 1919, and pursuant to the provisions of Chapter 141 of the Consolidated Statutes of New Brunswick, 1903, intitled respecting assignments and preferences of insolvent persons, and amending acts, did make a general assignment of all his personal property which may be seized and sold under execution, and of all his real estate, credits and effects for the benefit of his creditors to the undersigned John B. MORE TROOPS HAVE ARRIVED AT ARCHANGEL

Archangel, Feb. 19.—An Arctic Journey of probably the greatest magnitude since the famous Klondyke gold rush has brought additional British troops to the Archangel front to reinforce the greatly outnumbered troops fighting the Bolshevik. Hundreds of sleighs, driving in single file over frozen ground and along roads cut through pine forests, complete the most difficult part of their three hundred mile trip in twelve days.

The trip was planned and directed by members of Sir Ernest H. Shackleton's anti-Artic expedition, including Dr. Macklin.

Sir Ernest himself, although not participating in the journey to the front arrived at Archangel on an ice-breaker with the first detachment of reinforcing troops.

VIKING RULE IN SEATTLE

Seattle, Wash., Feb. 19.—It so happens that Ole Hanson, who claims to be a lineal descendant of the ancient Vikings, is now mayor of the city of Seattle. When, on Saturday last, he was formally notified by the I. W. W. strike leaders that the calling out of the 75,000 industrial workers of the city spelled a replica of the Bolshevik revolution in Russia, with the same destructive intent, this modern Viking harked back to the drastic methods of his forbears. He mobilized an extra force of trusted policemen, armed them with rifles and shotguns and ordered them to shoot on sight anyone causing disorder.

As the result, the Mayor was enabled to announce that "the Bolsheviks knew that we meant business and they started no trouble."

"The revolution did not get to first base," he remarked. It would appear that Viking Hanson has not only isolated the germ of the I. W. W. disease, but has discovered an effective preventive serum. Incidentally he has demonstrated the value of the factor known as "backbone" in managing the affairs of a great industrial city.

THE PREMIER OF BAVARIA SHOT DEAD

London, Feb. 21.—Kurt Eisner, the Premier of Bavaria, has been shot and killed.

The shooting took place this morning, according to a Munich despatch received in Amsterdam, by Lieutenant Count Arcovall. The Count was wounded severely by a guard and is reported to be dying.

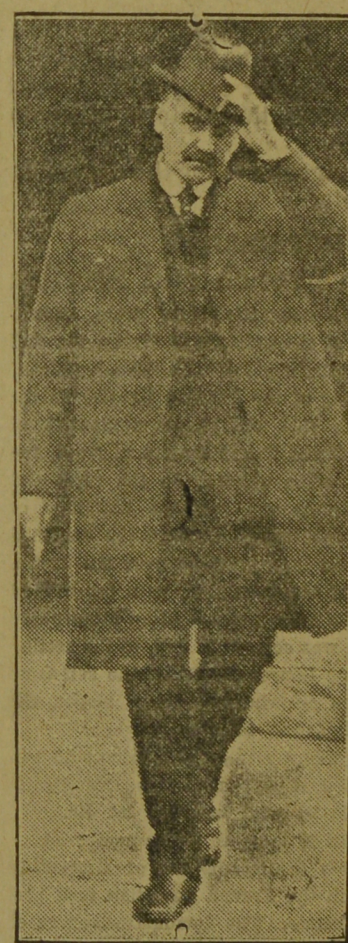

ALIENS TO BE DEPORTED

Vernon, B. C., Feb. 21.—The first contingent of interned aliens to be deported from the Vernon camp left yesterday. There were one hundred of these prisoners, principally Germans and Austrians of the laboring class, who went out yesterday afternoon under charge of an officer and guard of twenty men.

It is stated that fifty will go direct to England and from there be deported to their homes, while the other fifty will remain for some time in an eastern internment camp. This leaves about 250 prisoners still interned here.
