## THE TARIFF IS A TAX.

In commenting on the tariff resolution adopted by the National Liberal Convention, the Chatham World says: "The high cost of living, as everybody knows, is not due to the tariff. We had the same tariff when the cost of living was only half as high as it is now. Tariff changes cannot reduce it five cents a day for the average family."

With all due respect to our old friend Commodore Stewart, we beg to differ with him. The tariff may be the same now as when the cost of living was less, but the consumer pays a great deal more in duties under the ad valorem rate because of enhanced values. To cite a case, we would point out that the rate of duty on clothing is 35 per cent, and a man who imported a \$20 suit in the old days paid \$7 in duty on the same. The same suit purchased today would cost at least \$40, which means that the purchaser would have to dig down and pay \$14 in duty. The same rule applies to boots and shoes. The rate of duty is 30 per cent, but as a pair of boots which a few years ago could have been bought for \$4 now cost \$8, the purchaser must pay \$2.40 in duty where he formerly paid but \$1.20. The tariff may not be responsible for the high cost of living, but it certainly does not help matters any. A reduction in the tariff on food-stuffs might not be much of a benefit to our friend the Commodore, but any man with a family to support would not be long in seeing a difference.

## CABINET CHANGES.

Sir J. D. Hazen does not appear to be in any hurry to let go the office of Chief Justice of New Brunswick to accept a portfolio in the Union government. It is now said that the position has been offered to Mr. S. E. Elkin, M. P., with the understanding that should he decline, Sir Douglas will be pressed into service. The Ottawa Citizen does not approve of the proposal to transfer Sir J. D. Hazen from the bench to the political arena. Discussing the matter, it says:

"Mr. Elkin would assuredly be preferable to the return of Mr. J. D. Hazen from the Chief Justiceship of the Supreme Court in New Brunswick to active Federal politics. It is sometimes said that the American system of electing the judiciary is undignified, as it tends to introduce politics into the courts of justice. But straightforward election would seem to be quite as dignified and somewhat less disconcerting than some of the exchanges of highly judicial offices made for the political convenience of the Federal government in recent years."

## A GREAT PHILANTHROPIST.

The late Mr. Andrew Carnegie, the Steel King, whose death was announced yesterday, was probably the world's greatest philanthropist. He was a Scotchman by birth and started life the proverbial poor boy. He amassed a fortune which ran into hundreds of millions of dollars. Some years ago, after the organization of the United States Steel Corporation, he announced his intention of giving away the bulk of his fortune in the promotion of educational and philanthropic work. He devoted many millions of dollars to the founding of public libraries, edu-

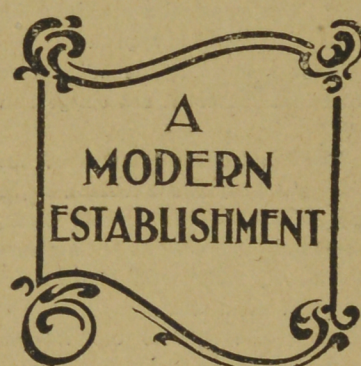
