GRAIN HARVEST STARTS
THIS WEEK SOME PLACES

14 Cents Dressed Weight is
Being Paid for Beef—A
Light Demand for
Small Pigs.

Encouraging reports with regard to the crops continue to come from the majority of the counties of New Brunswick. The regular reports of the District Representatives as combined in the weekly report of the New Brunswick Department of Agriculture is as follows:

In many districts, haying is practically completed. In others, and particularly in the Eastern part of the province, a considerable quantity remains to be cut. From this section comes the report that owing to farm labor being scarce and the weather unfavorable, much hay will be too old before cutting to make the best fodder.

High prices of clover and grass seed are encouraging more farmers to save seed for their own use and to sell. There is more clover and timothy being saved for seed than has been for some years. Clover is seeding exceptionally well and gives promise of a good yield.

Oat-Harvest Starting

Grain crops are ripening in some counties. Some barley has been cut in Carleton County. Oat-Harvest will start this week in that county, although it will not be general until next week. In the Northern and Eastern Counties the crops are about ten days later. Generally speaking the grain crops look well and will be up to the average. Local storms have done damage in some districts to the crop.

No Potato Blight

Potatoes have been benefited by recent rains and are continuing to make growth. No blight has been reported up to the present, although some Irish Cobbler fields are showing the effect of the wilt. The crop generally can be said to be well up to the average for the time of year, taking the province as a whole. In some sections they are slightly below while in others they are above.

Livestock Situation

Under Livestock it is stated that there seems to be very little demand for young pigs, while the market for pork continues strong. Beef is quoted at 14 cents dressed weight. A report from Victoria County states that ten car-loads of calves and young stock have been shipped out of that county during the week. These were purchased largely by Jewish buyers. No price was given but it was stated that it
