AMERICAN SOCIAL SEASON IS OPENED AT COBLENZ

All Germans are Excluded from Participation — Grand Ball Held at Which All the American Girls in the Vicinity were Present, but Outnumbered by Officers, 8 to 1—Tremendous Competition and Wild Scrambling for Partners—Wall Flowers were Unknown.

A special cable to the New York World says:

The social season, with all Germans excluded, was formally opened at the Third Army headquarters in Coblenz with the officers' club first hop on New Year's day. The historic grand ballroom of the fashionable Coblenz Casino has been pre-empted by the military authorities.

In the vast marble hall, garish with red hangings, Teuton mural decorations and crystal chandeliers, where Coblenz's four hundred were wont to pay homage and entertain visiting royalties and princes in the old, unoccupied days, you saw two American major generals, five brigadier generals, swarms of mere colonels and majors and hundreds of captains and "shave-tails" competing in terms of the most absolute democracy and equality, enthusiastically and frantically, for dances with telephone girls, former chorus girls, nurses, amateur entertainers and typists—all the American girls which a great "round up" in the American area was able to yield in the way of female war workers and dancing talent.

Girls Outnumbered 8 to 1.

About 100 American girls were mobilized for the first military dance, many coming long distances in the generals' staff cars, or even in motor trucks and ambulances. One of the liveliest and most persistent dancers was Maj. Gen. J. B. Dickman, com-

mander of the Third Army, who showed to great advantage dancing with Rita Gould, a former New York Winter Garden beauty, doing every one of the fourteen dances with innumerable extras.

General Dickman led the grand march with Miss Polly Ellis, a nurse of New Orleans, followed by Major General Hines, Brigadier General Campbell, King, Mitchell, Marshall, McLaughlin and Kilburn, and many other American officers. The odds of these to the dancing girls, which included gray-haired dowagers, were nearly eight to one. There was tremendous competition and wild scrambling for girls and frantic cutting in, half a dozen ballroom queens changing hands ten or twelve times in the course of a single dance, while even the average looking or homely war girls had half a dozen generals and lesser lights competing for their favor.

Gen. Kilburn Loses Out.

One of the typical features was when General Kilburn, a congressional medalist, had his girl stolen by a mere Red Cross lieutenant, while a nervy subaltern who tried to cut out General Dickman, nearly succeeded; but he quickly retreated when he caught sight of the general's two stars on his shoulder strap.

The dancing continued until nearly morning. A mystery surrounding missing refreshments resulted in the startling disclosure that some salad

When 16 of these have been purchased they may be exchanged for a War Savings Stamp. With the first Thrift Stamp purchased goes a Thrift Card, to which the Stamps should be fixed as soon as received.

After the 16 Thrift Stamps have been exchanged for a War Savings Stamp, the person doing so should start in again to buy Thrift Stamps.

THOUGHTLESS PAPA.

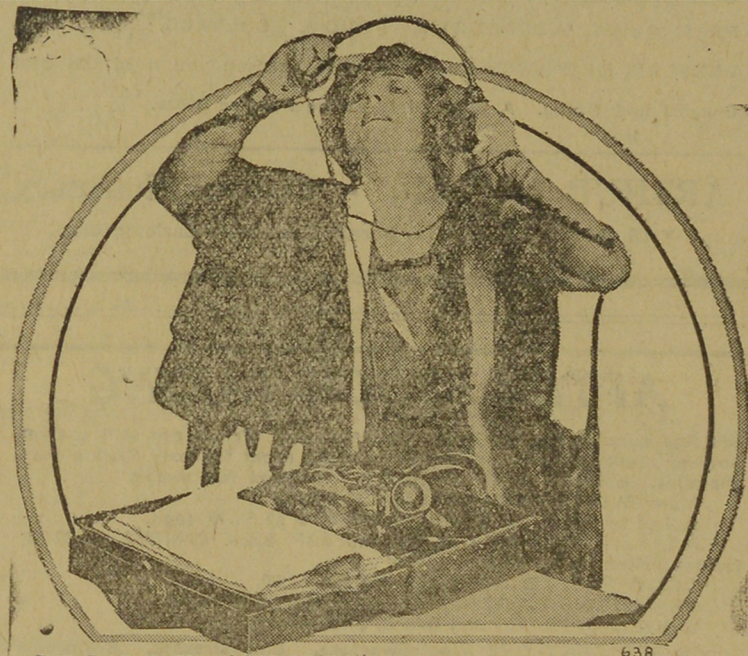
A young bridegroom, after the wedding was over and the bride's father had gone to his club, began to search excitedly among the wedding gifts.
