THE LATE EDWARD MOORE LEFT A VALUABLE ESTATE

Was Reputed to be One of the Wealthiest Men in the County of York—Had Large Interest in Linen Mills in Belfast, Ireland—Said to Have Had Money on Deposit in Every Local Bank—Once Loaned \$20,000 to City of Fredericton.

Ex-Ald. Edward Moore who passed away at his home here a few days ago was generally reputed to be one of the wealthiest men in the County of York. Indeed it is said by those in a position to know that while there were many other men who had larger property interests there were few if any in the province who had at their disposal so much ready cash as the late Mr. Moore. Naturally enough their is considerable speculation as to the size of the estate left by Mr. Moore and to the disposition he has made of it in his will.

The Moore Fortune

Mr. Moore's fortune was inherited from his mother, the late Mrs. Cherry Moore of Fredericton Junction, who was formerly a Miss Carlisle of Belfast, Ireland. It seems that she married and came to this country when quite young and did not keep in close touch with her father's family. She inherited the Carlisle fortune upon the death of her brother in Belfast, Ire-

land. While the yield from the estate is said to have varied somewhat it was always fairly substantial. The property has no doubt greatly increased in value in the past thirty years.

While the late Mr. Moore was very generous with his money he lived carefully and displayed remarkable business acumen in making investments. He saved a good portion of his income each year and it is said that he died possessed of property exclusive of his interest in the Belfast estate valued at from \$100,000 to \$150,000. It is known that he has provided liberally for his widow and that he arranged prior to his death to equip and furnish the new hospital here at a cost of \$10,000.

Mr. Moore was at one time the chief stockholder in the Hartt Boot and Shoe Company here, but some time ago he disposed of his interest in that company, retaining only sufficient stock to qualify him for the Board of Directors.

Loaned Money to City

As far as the records show the late Mr. Moore was the only man who was ever called upon to make a short term loan to the city of Fredericton. It was during the financial panic of 1907 that the deal was made. The city was then "hard up" to use a familiar expression and the condition of the money market was such that bonds could be floated only at a sacrifice. Mr. Moore was appealed to and at once advanced the sum of \$20,000 in cash. The money was restored to him the following year.

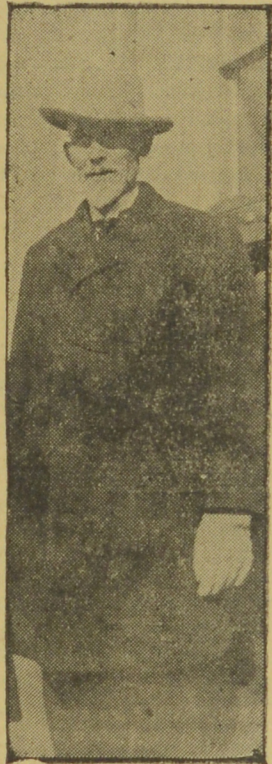
Cash in Local Banks

It is said that the late Mr. Moore had money on deposit in about every chartered bank in the city. When the Bank of New Brunswick moved into its new building on Queen Street a few years ago, he was the first man on hand to make a deposit. He was also one of the first to deposit money in the branch of the Bank of Commerce when it started business here.

The contents of Mr. Moore's will cannot of course be made public until it passes through the probate court.

Mr. R. W. McLellan of this city was for over twenty years Mr. Moore's legal adviser, and accompanied him on several business trips to the old country. He is the solicitor for the estate and Mr. Alex. Mott of Rustagornish, a brother-in-law of the deceased is one of the executors.

It is likely that the estate will contribute a fairly generous sum to the provincial treasury in the form of succession duties.

land, in the early nineties and was not long in coming into possession of it. Two of her sons, one of whom was the late Edward Moore paid a visit to Belfast, and after submitting the necessary proofs secured the title to the property for their mother, Mrs. Moore being then well advanced in years, passed away two years later. Her estate was probated at about one million dollars, which she bequeathed to her sons and daughters. It was divided into equal shares, two of which was bequeathed to each son and one to each of the daughters. One of the sons who lived at Lowell, Mass. died soon afterwards, and as he was without issue the bulk of his estate went to the late Mr. Edward Moore.

Property in Belfast

The property which consisted largely of an extensive linen mill located at Belfast, was kept intact and the income from it paid over to the heirs.

VETERAN OF THE WAR DIES SUDDENLY

Lieut. Geo. R. McCord, Well Known Lawyer, Dies at Sackville—Had Fine War Record.

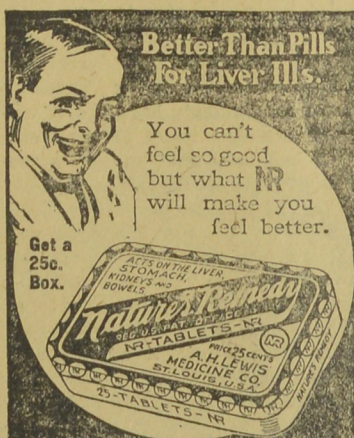
Sackville, N. B., Feb. 2.—The tragic death of George Rankin McCord, barrister, occurred about 12 o'clock last night. He was as well as usual yesterday and there was nothing to suggest that the end was near.

He left his office for home about 11 o'clock. An hour later his lifeless body was found on Lansdowne street a few hundred yards from his home. Three college boys, who discovered his body, conveyed it to the residence of Prof. Desbarres, who summoned Dr. Calkin, but life had fled, heart failure being the cause of death.

Deceased was a son of the late Geo. C. McCord and Henrietta Bowser McCord. He leaves his wife, formerly Marjorie Carter, Westmorland Point; his mother, who lives in East Pepperell; two brothers, Robert of Montreal, and Edward of East Pepperell, and one sister, Mrs. Burton H. Ford, of Sackville. He was forty-five years old. Deceased was a graduate of M. Allison and Harvard and spent three years at the front. He won his commission of Lieutenant and the Military Cross on the field and was recognized as being a real soldier, loved by his associates who knew McCord to be a fearless, dauntless and faithful friend. Since returning from overseas deceased had been successfully practicing law in partnership with A. B. Copp, M.P.

He was one of the best informed men in the Maritime Provinces and a lawyer who could hold his own against all comers. His sudden death comes as a great loss to his hosts of friends. The funeral will be held on Wednesday afternoon.
