**LIFE ON THE RHINE DULL AND YANKS LONG TO RETURN HOME**

Doughboys Not Having a Bad Time, but They Went Overseas for Action and Now That the Fighting is Over They Want to Get Back—Hadn't any Heart for New Year Celebration.

Coblentz, Jan. 2.—One month ago yesterday the American army entered Germany. In that time the Americans have ministered the affairs of some million Germans, living in an area of 5,000 square miles, without friction or disturbance. There has been not one untoward incident.

Coming among people naturally hostile, the Americans, by their good behaviour and moderate policy, have earned regard for themselves, so now it is no exaggeration to say our soldiers are popular along the Rhine. The army of occupation has started the new year with a resolve to keep on wishing to go home until it gets there. There was not a man in the American army who wanted to go home before November 11. I know of none who has not wanted to go home ever since then.

The men are not having a bad time along the Rhine, but it is very dull and that does not suit the doughboy. He came overseas for action and when affairs reached the stage where there is no action, he wanted a ticket home to the United States. He has resigned himself now to staying here until peace is consummated, but it is going to be a disappointed contingent that is ordered to do any police work after the peace.

To get the American soldier's viewpoint one must realize that he is not, as a rule a professional soldier. He does not take much stock in soldiering when there is no fighting going on.

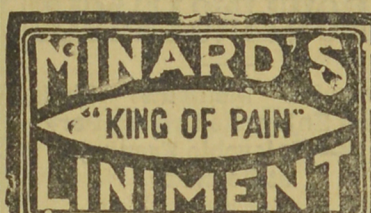
Many of the men gave up good positions at home when they joined the army. Many have families which have been undergoing sacrifices so that the men could go and help defeat Germany. Now these men want to go home and the government cannot take them any too quickly for their wishes.

That is how the Third Army feels this New Year's. As for the soldiers' celebration, it was a very mild affair. Cafes all over the sector had to stop selling drinks at 7 o'clock in the evening, which means that they closed soon after.

The pent-up gaiety of our boys is sort of being saved until they reach home to add to the general jubilation they are planning for that great and notable occasion which is in the minds of every one of them.

I took a ride around yesterday and everywhere from every one I met the oft-repeated query, "Can't you find out when they are going to let us go home?"

There is no grief in the world more profound and genuine than that of a small boy who finally realizes that Christmas is really over.

**PRESS LED ALL TRADE GROUPS**
