THE PEOPLE OF MONS ARE GRATEFUL TO CANADIANS

Letter of Thanks Sent to Sir Arthur Currie for Liberating the City from the Yoke of Prussianism—Canadians Warmly Congratulated on Their Splendid Work—Horrors of Hun Occupation Described.

Ottawa, Jan. 10.—Copies have been received in Ottawa of La Liberté, a newspaper published in Mons dated November 20, 1918. This issue contained under the title "Official thanks an interesting letter addressed by the college burgomasters and aldermen of the city to Lieut. General Sir Arthur Currie, commanding the Canadian Army Corps, in addition to expressing the thanks of the city for its liberation the letter contains an interesting comparison between the German methods of fighting and those followed by the British army, as viewed from the point of view of the civilian inhabitants. The letter is as follows:

To Monsieur le General—

"The City Council, which meets to-day, 13th November, 1918, for the first time since the liberating of this city considers it its duty to tell you of its admiration and to express its deep gratitude to the British army, and particularly to the Canadian corps. The taking of Mons by your soldiers on the 11th of November was more than a brilliant 'Fait de guerre', it was a chivalrous action.

"The Germans, according to their

usual habits, had put machine-guns in inhabited private houses, thus sheltering themselves behind innocent civilians, as they had done in 1914 when they first attacked the city.

Canadians Fine Work

"The Canadians with a view to sparing the town and saving the inhabitants, abstained from shelling these houses, and at the risk of their own lives took them by storm, chasing the enemy in a hand-to-hand struggle. When the Canadians entered the re-conquered place all the inhabitants acclaimed them, none having been killed or wounded in the course of the battle. It was a great feat, and your army, thus terminating the war, covered itself with unsurpassed glory. The enemy's army on the contrary, terminated as cowards a war commenced in crime.

"The whole world must know Monsieur le General, that on the 23rd of August, 1914, the German army entered Mons, after having burnt the village of Nimy which forms almost a suburb of the city. But in order to avoid injury by the Allied armies which were retreating fighting vigorously, they marched before them a crowd of

innocent inhabitants hardly clothed, who served as a shield. The burgomaster of Mons was forced to take the head of the hostage procession, in order to avoid worse cruelties for the city and his compatriots.

"When the British infantry opened fire on the Germans, and as the mass of civilians tried to take shelter, the German soldiers, who were following fired at close range, killing four and wounding a large number. This is their only brave action at Mons.

Horrors of Hun Occupation

"What the German occupation was for our city, history will tell later. Commenced in terror and crime, it was continued by most brutal and insolent oppression and cynicism. Violence and humiliation were used lavishly. Workers were deported and treated as slaves, and if they refused to work they had to suffer martyrdom. A number of our citizens were imprisoned or deported without conviction or after a trial that was only a farce and a parody on justice. The most extraordinary demands were imposed upon us; money was extorted for various reasons under cover of judicial farce; our industries were devastated, and we can say that to individual pillage from the soldier was added methodical pillage ordered by the German administration. We were witnesses of knavish tricks of all sorts shameful scenes of pillage and thieving specially marked the last days of fighting. It is not astonishing to see today Prussian militarism miserably crumbling.

Everlasting Gratefulness

"The glorious allied armies have since 1914 made a heroic struggle for Right against Barbarism, and today Right is triumphant and Liberty reigns. In the darkest hours of our long suffering we never doubted that it could be otherwise.

"Fed with false news, surrounded with laborious and complicated lies, invincible hope never abandoned us. We knew that we could count on the

A person does not need to have \$4 in cash in order to take the first steps towards purchasing a War Savings Stamp. Thrift Stamps, which sell at 25 cents each, have been provided. When 16 of these have been purchased they may be exchanged for a War Savings Stamp. With the first Thrift Stamp purchased goes a Thrift Card, to which the Stamps should be fixed as soon as received.

After the 16 Thrift Stamps have been exchanged for a War Savings Stamp, the person doing so should start in again to buy Thrift Stamps,

TRANSPORT WILL BE SAVED

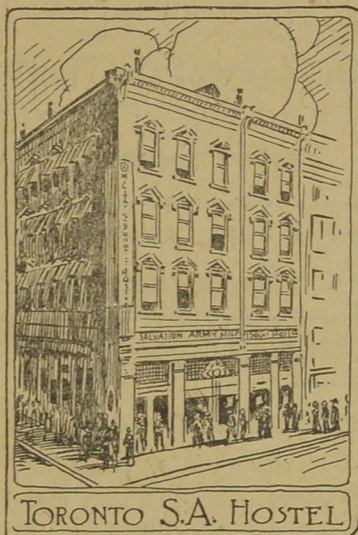

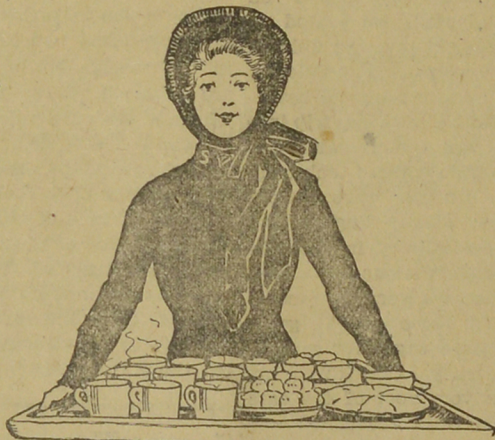

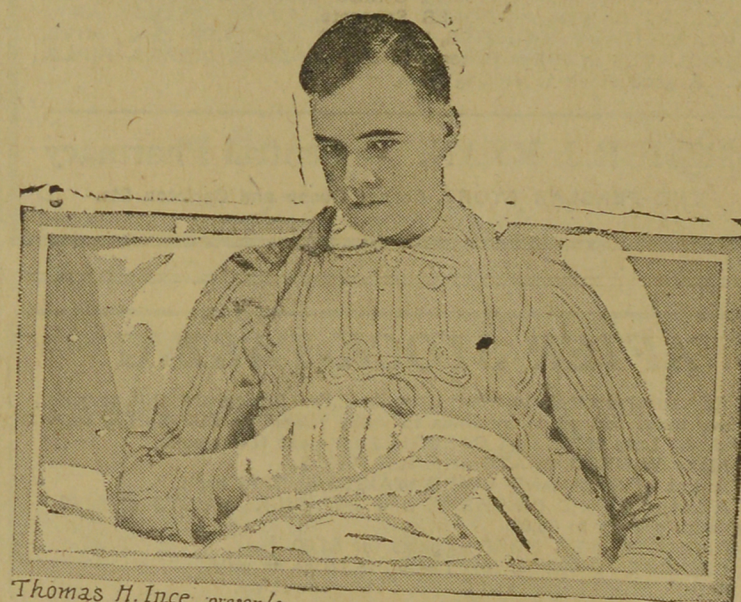
