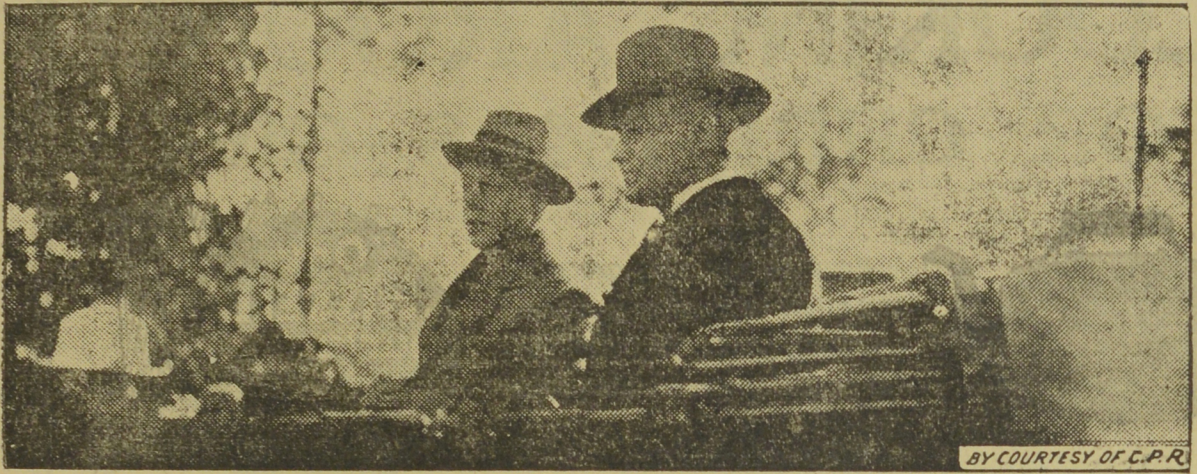

New Yorker Surprises Association of Teachers With This News.

Philadelphia, Dec. 6.—There is after all, very little difference between Beethoven's moonlight sonata and a succulent sirloin steak. Both are enjoyed primarily through the medium of the stomach.

With that statement Fledrick Schlieder, formerly president of the New York State Music Teachers' Association, delivered a collective body blow as it were, to nearly 200 members of the Philadelphia Music Teachers' Association, who gathered to listen to him in the Presser Auditorium. Mr. Schlieder failed to mention, however, whether music had sufficient nourishment to sustain life in these days of great expense.

"The consciousness of the basic tone of the scale is felt in the solar plexus," said Mr. Schlieder. He said it by way of an explanation. But what did it mean? The 108 professionals did not know.

After the meeting groups of men and women musicians were seen talking together. Some were holding their ears; others had their hands on their hearts. Mr. Schlieder had more to say. "The fifth tone of the scale (g)" he announced, "is felt in the forehead. The third tone (e) is felt in the neck."

MASONIC MANDATE ON GERMAN

Deposed Master in New Jersey Asks for Injunction from Court of Chancery—"Unmasonic."

Asserting that he was within his "legal and masonic" rights when he refused to obey the mandate of the Grand Lodge of New Jersey against the use of the German language in its rituals, John J. Plemenik deposed Master of Schiller Lodge, No. 66, Free and Accepted Masons, yesterday asked the Court of Chancery to enjoin the Grand Lodge from "interfering with the complainant in the exercise of his rights and in the performance of his duties as Master of Schiller Lodge and from enforcing or attempting to enforce the resolution complained of" adopted April 18, 1918.

"It is a fundamental and necessary principle of Free Masonry, according to the bill filed without which it would not exist, as is known to all masons, that it was instituted to establish peace on earth by allaying all fanaticism and hatred on account of language, race, creed or even color. Furthermore unlimited fraternity among all men, who will recognize the fatherhood of God, the brotherhood of man, the moral law, the golden rule, and the hope of a life everlasting is and always has been proclaimed by it to be its distinguishing and essential characteristic. It goes on to say that the resolution adopted by the Grand Lodge of New Jersey barring the use of the German language in so-called German lodges contravenes 'the fundamental and essential principles of Masonry.'"

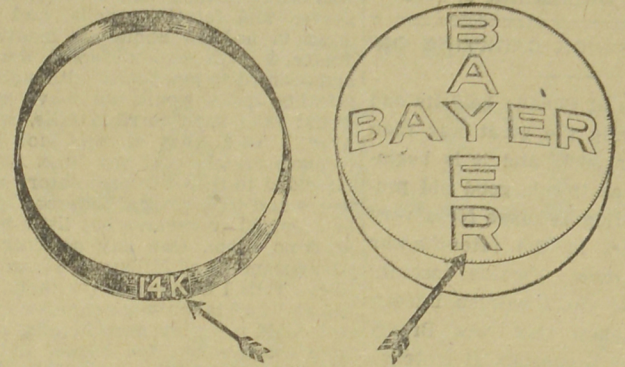

WEIGHS EARTH WITH A TINY QUARTZ THREAD

Boston, Dec. 4.—The earth weighs 6,000,000,000,000,000,000 tons. The Massachusetts Institute of Technology department of physics, headed by Prof. Louis E. Dorr, is authority for the assertion, the expert having just made the deduction for the enlightenment of his students.

At M. I. T. they attached two small spheres weighed to the finest degree to the end of a short rod. The spheres were "freely suspended," that is they might be swayed in any direction, and were hung from threads made of quartz draws to a thickness one-twelfth of a human hair.

The investigators next brought into the proximity of these balls two other large lead balls weighing about ten pounds each. The lead balls, because of their superior weight immediately made their presence felt on the smaller ones. The latter moved appreciably from the former position.

The force that did this was but equal to the weight of a bit of human hair 1-10,000th of an inch in length.

The professor knew the weight of the hanging and of the leaden balls; he had ascertained the force which the leaden balls exercised over the suspended ones. He knew of course the power of the earth's attraction upon the leaden balls—which is their weight. The matter of ascertaining the earth's weight then was simply a problem in proportions.
