WHISKEY OWNERS IN U.S. FACE A LOSS OF MILLIONS OF DOLLARS

70,000,000 Gallens in Bonded Warehouses Waiting for the Termination of War-Time Prohibition, Which Does Not See mto Terminate-An Economic Problem for Which a Solution Must be Found-President will be Appealed to and Congress May be Asked to Grant Compensation.

"Even should war time prohibition be terminated tomorrow it would be impossible for the dealers and distributors to dispose of their stock by January 16," Mr. Leopold said. probably would take from four to five months to dispose of the supply now on hand. The longer the ban exists the less become the chances of the dealers warding off this disastrous loss.

These dealers have millions of dollars tied up in the stock. It is money lying idle. They already have suffered heavy losses and now are confronted with the possibility, I should say probability, of losing it entirely. Unless something is done immediately they will not recover a penny of it."

While it virtually is impossible to ascertain the exact amount of whiskey now held in bonded warehouses, because of the process of evaporation continuously going on, Mr. Leopold gave 0,000,000 gallons as a conservative estimate. Before the Volstead law became operative whiskey was selling for approximately \$12 a gallon, of which \$6.40 represented the government tax. Therefore the whiskey now bonded is worth nearly iginal home of boxing overseas. \$840,000,000, more than half of which would be the government's revenue if it were placed on the market for sale.
