Already the government had derived a profit of \$50,000 on the transaction. The Municipal Council had memoralized the government for 500 acres of land, for which they were willing to pay \$1 per acre, which was twenty-five cents more than the land cost the government. Hon, members opposite complained of the government throwing burdens upon the municipality, but the Bill before the House would have an opposite effect, yet which had cost large sums of money to suppress. Quite recently two municipalities had been called upon to pay sums of \$23,000 and \$19,000 respectively. He considered it his duty under the Public Health Act to take action with a view of suppressing the disease.
