SMALLPOX WAS UNDER DISCUSSION IN THE HOUSE

Important Amendment
to Public Health
Act.

LUMBERMEN MUST BE VACCINATED

Will Result in Stamping
Out a Dread Dis-
ease.

The Legislature, on Wednesday eve-
ning passed a bill to enable the gov-
ernment to sell Crown Land to Muni-
cipalities, to be used in connection
with municipal honors. It was pro-
posed by the bill to give the muni-
cipalities the right to purchase 500
acres, but opposition developed to the
bill and it was finally reduced to 250
acres.

MR. TAYLOR on the Committee re-
sumed after recess said it was hardly
fair to compare Municipal Homes with
Hospitals, as the latter had to struggle
for existence and often needed help.
The Bill looked to him like discrimi-
nating legislation. He thought it would
be better to make a grant to all the
counties of the province, as only those
adjacent to Crown Lands could take
advantage of the terms of the Bill. He
agreed with the hon. member for Nor-
thumberland that wood could be pur-
chased cheaper by Municipal Homes
than the cost of carrying on their own
operations. In his own county there
was no Crown Land available and the
same was probably true of St. John,
Albert and York Counties. He did not
think the legislation was needed at
the present time.

MR. TILLEY moved an amendment
that the land grant be reduced to 200
acres.

HON. MR. TWEEDDALE said that
to facilitate the passage of the Bill he
would make it 300.

MR. SMITH (Carleton) enquired as
to the location of the Municipal Home
in Victoria county.

HON. MR. TWEEDDALE said that
it was at Trout Brook, on the Tobique
River, and directly opposite to the
Blue Bell Tract. The Home had a care-
taker who was the owner of a team
and could assist in getting out the
wood. He (Tweeddale) together with
a former colleague (Mr. Burgess) had
been instrumental in inducing the old
Government to purchase the Blue Bell
tract. It consisted of 50,000 acres, and
had been purchased for 75 cents
an acre. Already the government had
derived a profit of \$50,000 on the trans-
action. The Municipal Council had
memorialized the government for 500
acres of land, for which they were will-
ing to pay \$1 per acre, which was
twenty-five cents more than the land
cost the government. Hon. members
opposite complained of the govern-
ment throwing burdens upon the muni-
cipality, but the Bill before the House
would have an opposite effect, yet
they were opposing it. The Municipal
Home authorities would be able to
save considerable money on their
wood. The Bill was a new departure
and would enable the county to sup-
port the unfortunates in the Home
more in accord with the principles of
civilization.

MR. SUTTON thought that 500 acres
of land would be too much for the pur-
pose required. He knew of farms of
less than 200 acres which in addition
to supplying wood for the owners en-
abled them to sell as high as fifty
cords a year in the town of Woodstock.
He believed in safeguarding the in-
terests of the province and would vote
for granting 250 acres or more.

HON. MR. TWEEDDALE said that
if the hon. member for St. John would
make his amendment read 300 acres
he would accept it.

MR. TILLEY said he would meet
him on a 50-50 basis and make the
amendment 250 acres.

HON. MR. TWEEDDALE said that
in order to avoid further discussion of
the Bill he would accept the amend-
ment.

HON. MR. MURRAY said he did
not approve of the amendment of the
hon. member for St. John. Because the
Governor-in-Council was given author-
ity to grant 500 acres, it did not follow
that the whole amount would be grant-
ed. Even were the entire 500 acres
handed over, it might be that only
half of it would be good woodland.

A Motion to adopt the bill as amend-
ed was put by the Chairman and car-
ried.

MR. MURRAY (Kings) thought the
Chairman had acted hastily in putting
the motion, as both the hon. Minister of
secretary and Mr. Potts had risen to
speak to it.

MR. Potts said that he knew what
were his rights and he did not propose
to be shut off. He wanted to say that
he was just as familiar with most of
the questions which came before the
House as was the hon. Minister of
Agriculture. He objected to the Bill on
the ground that it would only benefit
a few counties. The land which it was
proposed to hand over would require
somebody to operate it and in the end
would be a charge on the municipali-
ty. He had seen no delegation ask-
ing for the legislation. He thought the
Bill could stand over for another year.

The Bill was agreed to.
The Committee next went into con-
sideration of a bill to amend an Act
to establish electoral districts and sub-
districts.

HON. MR. TWEEDDALE submitted
an amendment creating a new polling
district at Aroostook Junction in the
Parish of Andover.

MR. PINDER submitted an amend-
ment creating a polling place at Mil-
ville for voters living in the Parish of

The Bill was agreed to as was also a
Bill to erect parts of the parishes of
Northfield, Sunbury County, and Can-
ning, Queens County, into a police dis-
trict.

MR. BURCHILL presented the re-
port of the Committee on Corporations.
MR. LE BLANC presented the re-
port of the Committee on Municipalities.

HON. MR. ROBINSON moved that
the order for third reading of the Bill
relating to the early closing of shops
be discharged, and the Bill referred
back to a Committee of the whole
House.

The Public Accounts Committee was
granted permission to hold meetings
while the House was in Session.

The House again went into Commit-
tee, with Mr. eger (West) in the Chair
and took up consideration of a Bill re-
lating to witnesses and evidence.

HON. MR. ROBERTS explained that
the Bill was to legalize certificates of
marriage issued under the Public Health
Act, and also to confirm and legal-
ize action taken by municipalities and
Boards of Health during the late epi-
demic of Influenza.

The Bill was agreed to.
The Public Health.

The Committee next went into con-
sideration of a Bill to amend the Pub-
lic Health Act.

HON. DR. ROBERTS said that the
province had had many outbreaks of
smallpox, which had cost large sums
of money to suppress. Quite recently
two municipalities had been called up-
on to pay sums of \$23,000 and \$19,000
respectively. He considered it his duty
under the Public Health Act to take
action with a view of suppressing the
disease. One plan would be to make
vaccination compulsory throughout the
province, but that was considered too
expensive. It was deemed advisable to
get at the source of the disease, usu-
ally lumber camps and mills, and vac-
cinate the employees. To do that it
was proposed to make employers re-
sponsible for employees who were not
vaccinated. It was well known that
vaccination was the only method by
which smallpox could be avoided. He
thought if close relations were estab-
lished with the Health authorities in
Maine and Quebec that the province
would soon have no more smallpox.

The registration of births was also
amended slightly in accordance with
the action of Federal authorities, from
whom the vital Statistics Branch
would receive a substantial grant.

MR. MERSEREAU said that the un-
dertaker should not be penalized for
failure to report deaths.

HON. MR. ROBERTS said that such
provision was in the Act already. If
penalties were not provided the Act
would not be enforceable.

MR. MERSEREAU objected that the
country undertaker often had to go
into remote settlements, and it was
not fair to hold him responsible for
reporting a death, when in all proba-
bility a physician had been in atten-
