That Company had surrendered its lease in 1913 and had since done nothing. The government had since tried to dispose of the lumber but without success. A large percent age of lumber on the lot was fir and had suffered greatly during late year from the ravages of the bud worm Some of that lumber was lying down and if not soon dsposed of would be totally wasted.
