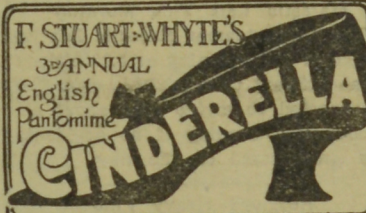

## THE "LICKER" LIMIT IS THREE SPOONS DAILY

Engineers' Club, Philadelphia, Hears, Through Smiles and  
Tears, a Noted Scientist Tell How John Barleycorn Might  
Have Lived if Men Had Stayed "Normal" — Only Small  
Quantity of Alcohol is Really Necessary.

And here at last is the truth about  
"licker."

It isn't any use to you, none at all.  
But if you are normal, it won't harm  
you.

But to be normal means you don't  
want more than an ounce of it in  
twenty-four hours, never, no never  
more than an ounce.

That's the truth as related in a  
booze requiem held today at the En-  
gineers' Club where Dr. Henry Leff-  
mann, state chemist, stripped John  
Barleycorn of all his romance and  
glory and devilry and legend and  
made him merely a chemical reac-  
tion.

"I have had fifty years' experience—  
external experience only, I assure  
you—with liquors," said Doctor Leff-  
mann, "and I find that there is no  
proof physiologically or clinically that  
alcohol is needed for human nutrition.  
It is not a necessary ingredient of our  
diet. Foods satiate, but alcoholic be-  
verages lead only to excess."

"But by experience it has been  
shown that a small amount of alcohol  
can be burnt up in the human system.  
It produces only heat. It will not build  
tissue. In the normal human being  
it can be taken in moderate quantities  
of say an ounce in twenty-four hours  
without showing any injury."

"But unfortunately there are a great  
many individuals who are not normal  
and also there are very few human be-  
ings who have the will power to limit  
themselves to the two or three spoon-  
fuls of liquor a day that will not do  
harm."

The community must step in and  
control its use."

It was a truth-telling day for Doc-  
tor Leffmann in more things than in  
exposing John Barleycorn. He denied  
that sugar is ever made of sand or  
that milk is ever composed of water  
and chalk, and asserted that the only  
way liquors are ever adulterated is  
by the addition of water and prune  
juice.

"You do not find in the blind tigers  
any adulteration of liquors," he said.  
"The liquor is chiefly water and alco-  
hol. And it is not limited to the pro-  
hibitionists."

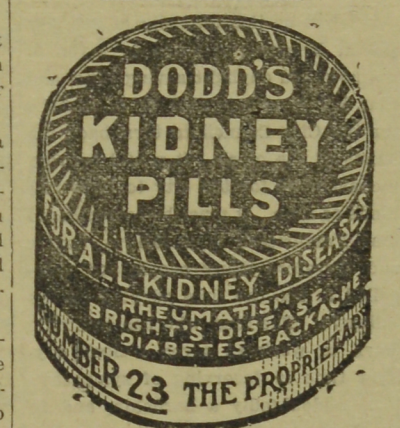
"Undoubtedly there is a difference  
of effect from the use of beer and  
wines and whisky. This is directly  
related to the amount of alcohol in-  
volved."

"I feel that it were better if the pro-  
hibition law were not so drastic and  
allowed some minor drinks, but the  
measure is drastic just because of the  
unwillingness of the liquor dealers to  
meet public sentiment halfway."

He denied the well-known belief  
that aging of liquor makes it more  
mellow and less harmful. "There is no  
change in alcoholic content in old  
liquors," he said "There is an added  
aroma but the alcoholic content re-  
mains the same."

He was not at all optimistic that the  
liquor lovers would find prohibition  
laws ineffective, "If the law is backed

by public sentiment and enforced by  
the officials, I feel that it will per-  
manently eradicate liquors from our  
life."
