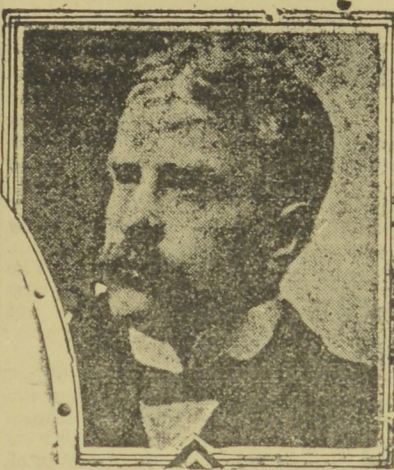
SIR R. L. BORDEN MAY BE RAISED TO THE PEERAGE

A Report at Ottawa That the Premier Will Take the Title of Baron of Grand Pre—Parliament Adjourns for the Easter Vacation — Would Compel Newspapers to Disclose the Names of Their Owners.

Ottawa, April 16—Parliament has adjourned for Easter. It was a typical getaway day with discussions on flax growing, scientific research civil service reform and the ownership of news papers. As added features there were the return of Hon. Frank Cochrane to the capital, and his appearance in the house for the first time this session, and the rumor that in recognition of his services to the empire during the war, Sir Robert Borden, prime Minister of Canada would be elevated to the peerage and would take the title of Baron Grand Pre. Grand Pre (N. S.) is his native place.

In calling for legislation to compel the newspapers of Canada to disclose the names of their owners, Hon. Rodolphe Lemieux repeated the grave charge which was flung about so recklessly at the last general election that the Liberal journals of Canada were bought. If not, he asked why did they at a given moment transfer their allegiance from the Liberal to the Tory party?

Those full page advertisements paid for by friends of the government and

some of them by the government itself looked very bad. The Montreal Herald for years a sturdy advocate of Liberalism, had been secretly bought by Lord Atholstan, owner of the Montreal Star, and Mr. Briery, who posed as the owner of the paper was only a mask. The Liberals of Montreal were shocked when the sensational news leaked out, for the Montreal Herald continued to pretend that it was a Liberal newspaper even after it passed into the control of Conservative newspaper Baron.

Change Postal Laws

Mr. Lemieux's idea was to amend the postal laws to prevent the press from sailing under false colors. The honest papers he said, desired to be beacons and not false lights. If his proposal were adopted it would give public journals the stamp of respectability. The question will be discussed at great length after Easter, when the post office estimates are under consideration.

It being the last day of the session for private members, a large number of laudable resolutions and some that were not so laudable were jettisoned so that after getting rid of the unmerchandiseable cargo and lying up over

Easter for repairs the ship of state will point her prow towards what are regarded by many as the shoals of tariff reduction.

Civil Service Reform

A fair amount of business was transacted during the afternoon, however, Dr. Michael Steele of South Perth, succeeded in securing from Hon. A. K. MacLean a pledge that a committee will be appointed with a view to weeding out agitators and incompetents from the civil service, and R. H. Butts the genial Cape Breton Irishman managed to get in a word or two on behalf of the "under dog." It seems that when Sir Wilfrid Laurier died the last parliamentarian passed off the scene who was in the house when Mr. Tylor on the government side of the chamber assumed office thirty-nine years ago, and, according to Mr. Butts this faithful old servant who saved many lives when the Parliament buildings burned down, is still in receipt of the princely salary he got when he first came to the capital. The only difference is that he used to ride from his home in Picton, N. S., on a half-fare ticket and now has to pay full fare. The warm hearted Irishman thought it would be well if a few of these old servants of the public were remembered when salary increases are being handed out.

Before adjournment a resolution introduced by Hume Croyne, of London was passed calling for the appointment of a special committee to further the development of scientific research.

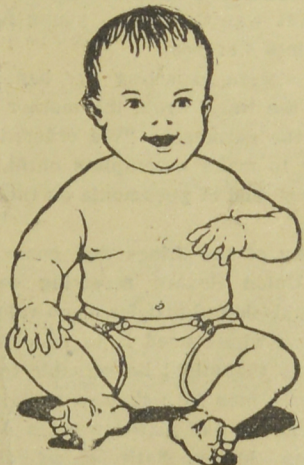

STANLEY HAS NO PHYSICIAN AT PRESENT

Stanley, April 15th—The regular meeting of the Stanley Board of Trade was held in the Committee room of the new hall Tuesday evening. In the absence of the president Mr. Laghlan the vice president occupied the chair. Very encouraging reports were received regarding the extension of the York & Carleton Railway. A proposition was presented as to the advisability of adopting the Daylight Saving Time. This was heartily supported by a number of the leading business men, but was vigorously opposed by the farmers. The decision was deferred until the next meeting. The serious illness of Dr. Folkins was deeply regretted by the Board and the situation of the Village and surrounding county deprived of medical treatment, as it is at present, was discussed at some length with the result that Mr. George Dunham was appointed to present the case to the Board of Health and in any way possible endeavor to procure the services of a doctor. A committee was appointed to assist the inspector of the Board of Health in his efforts to prevent untidy surroundings and the dumping of unsightly refuse along the edges of the streets.

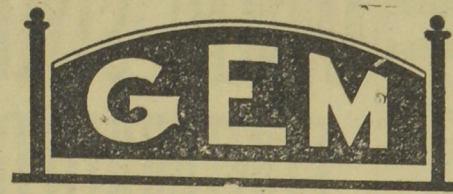
