In the absence of the president Mr. Laghlan the vice president occupied the chair. Very encouraging reports were received regarding the extension of the York & Carleton Railway. A proposition was presented as to the advisability of adopting the Daylight Saving Time This was heartily supported by a number of the leading business men, but was vigorously opposed by the farmers. The decision was deferred until the next meeting. 
