PERVERSION OF JUSTICE
IN CASE OF THOMAS MOONEY

Sensational Disclosures Made in Report of Special Agent of the
Department of Labor, Appointed to Investigate the Case for
the Government—Says That There was Perjury at the Trial
of Mooney at San Francisco.

Washington, July 23—Charges of al-
leged injustice done Thomas J. Moon-
ey, during his trial at San Francisco
on the charge of bomb-throwing at
a Preparedness Parade are made in
the report of John B. Densmore,
special agent of the Department of
Labor, who made a secret investiga-
tion of the case for the Government.

Densmore points to several inci-
dents as indicating the trial was a
"frame-up" to discredit union labor.
The report was sent to the House
today by Secretary Wilson in re-
sponse to requests for information on
the case by the House resolution re-
cently passed.

"The plain truth" said Densmore in

his report, which is dated November
1, 1918, "is that there is nothing about
the case to produce a feeling of con-
fidence that the dignity and majesty
of the law have been upheld.

"There is nowhere anything resem-
bling consistency the effect being that
of patchwork of incongruous make-
shifts and often of desperate expedi-
ency."

Attorney is Involved

The report indicates that Dens-
more for several months, had a dicta-
phone in the office of Charles M.
Fickert, San Francisco district attor-
ney and obtained much of his informa-
tion in that manner.

"The reading of the testimony in
the case is apt to cause one to won-
der at many things" the report says.

The report then enumerates the fol-
lowing objections to methods used at
the trial:

"The apparent failure of the Dis-
trict Attorney's office to conduct a
real investigation at the scene of the
crime; the easy adaptability of some
of the star witnesses; the irregular
method pursued by the prosecution in
identifying various defendants; the
sorry type of men and women brought
forward to prove essential matters of
fact in a case of gravest importance;
the seeming inefficiency of a well-
established alibi; the sangroid with
which the prosecution occasionally
adopted an untenable theory and then
changed to another not quite so pre-
posterous; the refusal of the public
prosecutor to call witnesses who ac-
tually saw the falling of the bomb.

"In short the general flimsiness
and improbability of the testimony
adduced together with a total absence
of anything that looks like a genuine
effort to arrive at the facts in the case

"These things are calculated to
cause in the minds of the most biase
a decided mental rebellion."

Direct Perjury Charge

The report declares the testimony
of Frank G. Oxman, star prosecution
witness, was proven perjury and that
the presiding judge at the trial and
the Attorney General of the state,
asked a new trial for mooney Fickert
who had previously agreed to the new
trial, Densmore said, then changed
and refused to agree to it.

"There are excellent grounds for
the belief that the prosecuting at-
torney's sudden change of attitude
was prompted by emissaries from

some of the corporate interests most

At the end of the report were more
than one hundred closely typewritten
pages of conversations with Fickert,
said to have been obtained through
the dictaphone placed in his office by
Densmore.

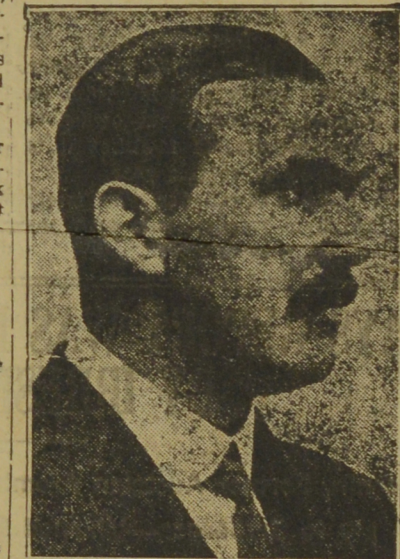
Two or more persons heard all the
records of conversation offered, the
report alleged.

The placing of the dictaphone in
the office was a most difficult task,
Densmore said, as the office was
heavily guarded all the time.

He did not state just how this was
accomplished.

WAR SAVINGS
WORK IN THE
BRITISH ISLES

Sir Robert Kindersley, K. B. E., the
chairman of the National War Savings
Committee of the United Kingdom, has
had remarkable success with his or-
ganization. Indeed, among a series of
notable achievements during the war
that of this committee stands out pro-
minently. He brought to his work all

in financial circles in Great Britain,

of England, a Governor of the Hudson

Chairman National War Savings
Committee of the United
Kingdom.

Being forty-seven years of age, he
is in the prime of life and undoubtedly
has ahead of him many years of
life in the public service. He received
his Knighthood in 1917.

The success of the campaign con-
ducted by the National War Savings
Committee has been of a very striking
character. After a discouraging start,
when war saving was universally un-
popular, the campaign succeeded be-
yond the highest expectations. On the
1st of January, 1919, there were in
Great Britain over 2,000 War Savings
committees, flourishing and active self
governing bodies, so distributed that
there was one within easy reach of
every inhabitant. They supervised
over 50,000 War Savings societies. The
total number of War Savings Certifi-
cates sold exceeded £270,000,000 and
less than 10,000,000 had been cashed.
Something over £200,000,000 had been
contributed through War Savings cer-
tificates and at least one-third of the
45,000,000 inhabitants of Great Britain
had become holders of government se-
curities.

The success of the War Savings
Committee was such that in January
1917 it was called on to place its or-
ganization at the disposal of the Treas-
ury for conducting the campaign for
the War Loan of January and Febru-
ary, 1917, when close on £1,000,000,
000 was subscribed.

The savings movement is being con-
tinued in the British Isles as a peace
effort and with every prospect of con-
tinued success.
