HOW TO VOTE

The voter shall use the official bal-
lot and shall strike out the words
"For Daylight Saving" or the words
"Against Daylight Saving," in accord-
ance with his desire to vote against
or for the same, as the case may be.

Not more than one elector shall at
any one time enter the polling place,
and such elector, upon entering, shall
declare his name, surname and addi-
tion, and if the name of such elector
is found on the list of voters, he shall
receive from the presiding officer an
ungummed envelope, on the back of
which the presiding officer shall write
with a pencil of black lead or with pen
and ink, his initials, in the presence of
the voter.

The elector, on receiving the enve-
lope, shall forthwith proceed within
the screened compartment, and shall
there, having marked his ballot, or
having previously done so, replace his
ballot within the envelope handed to
him by the presiding officer, and shall,
without any delay, hand the envelope
containing his ballot, unsealed, to the
presiding officer, who shall ascertain
by examining his initials that it is the
same with which he had furnished the
voter, and if so satisfied shall immedi-
ately and in the presence of the voter
place the envelope containing the bal-
lot in the ballot box, and the voter
shall immediately leave the polling
place. No such ballot shall be received
by the presiding officer until the voter
has proceeded to the screened
compartment within the polling place,
and while there placed his ballot in
the envelope furnished him by the
presiding officer.

The poll clerk shall, under the di-
rection of the presiding officer, then
enter the name of the voter on the
check list.

THE AMERICAN
DOUGHBOYS WILL
BE MISSED

Paris, March 30.—By no one will
the departure of the Aerimcan sold-
iers from Paris be more keenly felt
than by the humble "megottiers" the
pickers-up of cigar stubs and cigar-
ette ends. This has been a golden time
for them, and "Papa Cinquante" who
is the recognized boss of the trade and
employs some thirty pickers replies
disdainfully when folks grumble to
him about the scarcity of tobacco.

"There's always tobacco where Amer-
ican's are," he says. "My men follow
them up, fine fellows: They smoke
good stuff, and, what's better, they
just chew their cigars and throw them
away half used. That's where we gather
in our little harvest. The quality of
'my tobacco' has gone up several de-
grees," and he grinned.

He went on. "People are beginning to sit
outside the cafes again, and my men
pick up all the fag ends on the side-
walk. Another squad cleans up the
music hall lounges early in the morn-
ing. People smoke more than ever."

Out in the Latin quarter, Papa Cin-
quante has a drying and sorting shed,
where the cigar stubs are cut up and
made into pipe mixture, and the cigar-
ette ends are sifted and turned into
new smokes. He pays from 85 cents to
\$1.25 a pound for the raw material,
"according to quality," he says.
