Unique Answers of Students in Germantown, Pa., School to
Questions on Popular Knowledge — Methuselah Credited
With the Founding of Methodism — and H. M. S. Said to
Stand for "Home Missionary Society."

In the answers boys and girls of
the Germantown school gave in the re-
cent annual information tests, the
army of occupation is described as

workers should get a minimum wage
of \$20 per week for a forty hour week.

HEREDITARY TITLES ARE TO BE ABOLISHED

Ottawa, April 30.—When the spe-
cial committee of the House of Com-
mons which is considering the mat-
ter of titles resumed its deliberations
this morning, the minutes of the first
meeting, at which it was decided to
recommend that no more hereditary
titles be conferred and that those in
existence cease with the death of the
present holders of such titles, was
concluded in.

Dr. Cowan, of Regina, claimed that
in connection with the debate on titles
at the next session of the House, the
attitude of Sir Robert Borden had
been misrepresented. He said that
the order-in-council, the details of
which the Prime Minister then an-
nounced, covered exactly the same
ground as the recommendation decid-
ed upon by the committee in regard
to hereditary titles.

Mr. Duncan Ross and other mem-
bers of the committee thought that
there was at least a slight distinction.
The order-in-council did not specify
the time at which these titles should
cease and this was covered in the re-
commendation made by the commit-
tee.

Sir Herbert Ames said that to cut
off the giving of titles immediately
and without warning at the present
time would be unjust. With the war
conditions a thing of the past, the
shutting off of titles would not matter
much. Sir Herbert referred to the
recently issued Order of the British
Empire. He thought it would be un-
fair to prohibit Canadians from par-
ticipating in those honors.

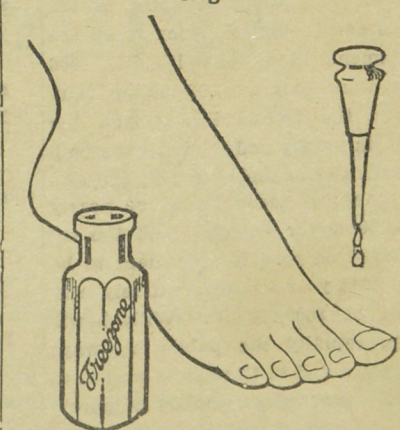
Hon. Rodolph Lemieux was also op-
posed to a continuation of the giving
of titles. Making complimentary re-
ference to Sir Herbert Ames, he de-
clared that "it did not require a title
to cause him to be recognized as a
great public servant."

The granting of knighthoods and
distinctions in Canada, he said, cre-
ates a spirit of flunkeyism. We should
do as the French people did in 1789
and abolish all titles.
