## DISHWASHING

Often Looked Upon as the Greatest  
Drudgery and Bugbear of  
the Household.

What is the greatest drudgery in housework?

You answer that question and the chances are that you will answer it as nine housewives out of ten always do—dishwashing—the eternal aftermath of three meals for 365 days out of every year.

There are dishwashing machines, to be sure, but they have not as yet been brought within the reach of the average housewife. And there are those who use paper plates and even wooden dishes that can be destroyed after each meal, but that plan has not yet become actually practical, being rather too far from economy. So the only thing to do is to make the work of dishwashing as easy as possible.

To begin with, the kitchen or pantry ought to be light, with plenty of sunshine streaming over the sink. If it is dark, the matter cannot be helped and you cannot expect an ideal kitchen. Every housekeeper with a bright kitchen should appreciate her blessings.

## Plenty of Hot Water.

The next requisite to happy dishwashing is something with which every dishwasher can provide herself—plenty of hot water.

If you have no hot water on tap, keep a big kettle or a small boiler of water always on the stove—not for tea (water for tea should always be freshly boiled); but keep it on hand so you will have plenty, not just one or two painful at dishwashing time.

Dishes washed or rinsed in very hot water need little drying if they are thoroughly drained. There is a wire dish drainer which costs very little and helps a great deal.

A long handled mop, made of string and a wire soap shaker make it possible to handle very hot water without blistering or reddening the skin.

## The Towels.

Next in importance to the supplies and implements which make dishwashing and draining of dishes easy, comes a good supply of towels for drying them. Whether they be made of linen or cotton, or whether or not the same kind of towels be used for glass and silver as are used for dishes and pots and pans, they should be plentifully supplied and spotlessly clean.

However often the towels are washed, they should be boiled once a week to bleach and purify them.

Put them over the fire in a basin of lukewarm water to which borax is added in the proportion of a tablespoonful to every two quarts of water. Boil them half an hour, rinse them in hot and then in cool water, and dry them out of doors.

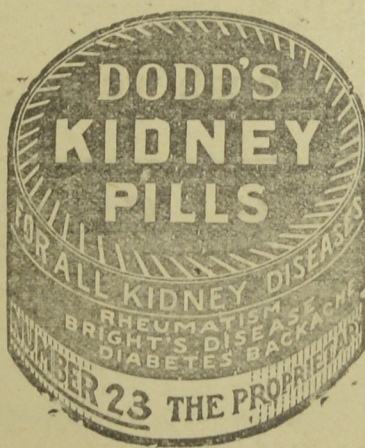
## RANDOM REMINDERS.

When frying ham or bacon, add half a teaspoonful of dark syrup to the fat and the meat will fry an even brown and not look too hard.

A pleasing kitchen plant can be secured by planting a lemon seed in a pot. The leaves can be used for flavoring. A few of the leaves tied in a cloth and added to the apple sauce will improve it.

If flannels have shrunk and become hard, soak them in gasoline and they will be restored to their former softness.

You will save fuel and have a better heated oven if the coal does not reach above the top of the linings in the grate of the kitchen range.

SALARIES OF  
SODA EXPERTS

## BRIEF BUT USEFUL RECIPES.

Restore Gilt Frames.—Rub with a sponge moistened with turpentine.

Drive Away Ants.—A little quicklime placed in the infested places.

Kill Insect Life.—Burn sulphur in a tightly closed room. It will kill almost all insect life and their eggs and larvae.

Make Leather Waterproof.—Saturate it with castor oil; to stop shoes squeaking, drive a peg into the middle of the sole.

Clean the Hair.—Wash well with a mixture of soft water, 1 pint; sal soda 1 ounce; cream tartar ¼ ounce.

Remove Tar from Cloth.—Rub it well with turpentine till every trace is removed.

Egg Stains on Spoons.—Rub with common salt.

Fruit Stains on Hands.—Wash the hands in clear water, dry slightly and while still moist strike a sulphur match and hold your hands around the flame.

Clean Gloves.—Pour a little benzine into a basin and wash the gloves in it, rubbing and squeezing them until clean. If much soiled, they must be washed again through clean benzine and rinsed in a fresh supply.

Hang in the air to dry.

Clean Hair Brushes.—Dissolve a little soda in warm water and pour in a small amount of ammonia. Hold the brushes with the bristles downward and avoid wetting the back as far as possible; shake until the grease is removed; then rinse in cold water and put in the air to dry.

Remove Stains from Linen.—Wet the part stained and lay on it some salt of wormwood; then rub without diluting it with more water.

How to Remove a Rusty Screw.—Apply a red hot iron to the head for a short time, the screw-driver being applied immediately while the screw is hot.

Remove Mildew from Cloth.—Put a teaspoonful of chloride of lime into a quart of water, strain it twice, then dip the mildewed places in this weak solution and lay in the sun. If not effective the first time repeat.

Cure Mosquito Bites.—Put ten drops of refined carbolic acid into an ounce of rose water; shake well and apply. (If you hold your breath while a mosquito has its bill in you it cannot withdraw it until you breathe again).
