

CO-OPERATIVE SELLING OF LAMBS ON NORTH SHORE

DEPUTY MINISTER BRADT
RETURNS FROM THERE

Crops Look Well— Hay Situation Not So Bad as First Reported—To Improve Sheep.

Mr. E. P. Bradt, Deputy Minister of Agriculture, has returned from the North Shore, where he spent several days last week on departmental work. Mr. Bradt states that the general state of the hay crop throughout the province is better than it was thought a few weeks ago, hay being cut in good condition in all sections. On the North Shore where a light crop was expected, old meadows did not produce much but new fields cut well. Potatoes and grain also looked well in that section.

Cooperative Marketing of Lambs

Mr. Bradt was in Gloucester as well as Northumberland County and on Thursday attended a meeting of farmers at South Tete-a-Gouche which was held for the purpose of organizing for cooperative shipment and sale of lambs. The meeting decided to cooperate to sell three carloads of lambs at the Montreal stockyards and also to send a representative to Ontario to purchase a carload of pure-bred rams on a cooperative basis. The Federal Agricultural Department is under agreement to pay the expenses of representatives who make purchases of this nature.

Wheat Acreage Reduced

Wheat acreage in the province shows a reduction of about twenty percent from last year, but the crop is looking well. Oats are everywhere in good condition. Labor conditions are improving.

Moved to Halifax

Mr. and Mrs. W. D. MacKay formerly of this city who have been residing in Truro, N. S. for some years, have removed from that place to Halifax.

Receipts From License Renewals

Up to Saturday at noon the receipts at the Department of Lands and Mines for renewals of timber licenses, dating August 1st, totalled about \$332,000. There will be a further increase.

Harvest Excursions

Contrary to original announcement the C. P. R. will run farm laborers' excursions from New Brunswick points to Winnipeg. The Canadian National Railways will do the same, for the first time in their history.

Leaves the Service

Major Guy R. Turner, who is attached to the Royal Canadian Engineers, has resigned and it is stated that Captain Charles B. Bate, C.E., will succeed him. Major Turner is well known in Fredericton.

Capt. E. J. Mooney, of St. John who has been A. P. M. at Halifax for some time has resigned. He was made the recipient of a handsome loving cup by the Halifax military police before leaving the service. He went overseas with the 6th C. M. R. He was in Fredericton for a time with the 236th MacLean Highlanders.

MEDICAL INSPECTION IN SCHOOLS

PHYSICIANS APPOINTED
BY YORK COUNTY BOARD

Department of Public Health
Engaged in Organization re
Vaccination and In-
spection.

Preparations for medical inspection in the schools of York County in accordance with the provisions of the Public Health Act have been made and inspection will begin with the new school term at the close of the present month. The Department of Public Health has been engaged for some time upon organization for the enforcement of health regulations in the schools of the province, both in regard to inspection and vaccination previous to entrance to school. In some of the cities and towns the regulation with regard to vaccination had been enforced but in the majority there was no attempt to enforce it.

Medical Inspectors in County

Medical inspectors for the schools of York County as appointed by the York County Sub-district Board of Health are as follows: Dr. B. M. Mullin, Parishes of St. Mary's and New Maryland, and Towns of Devon and Marysville; Dr. D. R. Moore, Parish of Stanley; Dr. O. E. Morehouse, Parish of Douglas and School Districts 6, 7, 7½, 8 and 9 in Parish of Bright; Dr. D. W. Robertson, remainder of Parish of Bright and Parish of Kings clear; Dr. W. A. Mackenzie, Parishes of Prince William and Queensbury; Dr. M. L. Jewett, Parish of Southampton; Dr. B. H. Dougan, Parish of Manners-Sutton; Dr. J. G. Owen, Parish of Dumfries and Polling District No. 12, Parish of Canterbury; Dr. Wright, remainder of Parish of Canterbury and Parish of North Lake; Dr. A. E. Gardner, Parish of McAdam.

Dr. M. V. Coffyn has been named by the Fredericton Sub-district Board of Health is medical inspector for the schools of the city.

DR. W. J. IRVINE INJURED IN A MOTOR SMASH

CAR TURNED OVER NEAR
THE OROMOCTO RESERVE

Tendon of the Right Thumb
Severed—Injury May be
Permanent—J. Wiseley
Not Injured.

Dr. Walter J. Irvine of this city was seriously injured in a motoring accident yesterday afternoon when his car turned over. He was thrown through the windshield and had his right wrist badly cut, arteries being severed. Jack Wsely, telegraph operator for J. M. Robinson & Son, was also in the accident but escaped serious injury.

The accident happened at Oromocto near the Indian Reservation, when an attempt was made to turn the car after driving it into the ditch it was driven up the opposite bank and turned completely over. Both men were thrown from the car and Dr. Irvine went through the wind shield sustaining injuries on both arms. His right wrist was badly lacerated and in all three arteries were severed. The tendon of his right thumb was completely severed and will probably remain rigid.

Taken to Hospital

Dr. D. W. Ross was called to attend the patient and found him bleeding freely. As a result of the accident the patient was semi-delirious and for some time the attending physician found some difficulty in treating him. Dr. W. H. Irvine, the brother of the injured man was called and the patient was bandaged and tourniquets were applied to stop the flow of the blood. He was then taken to the Victoria Public Hospital where he was operated upon. Today he is reported to be resting easier having passed a comfortable night. Some fear was expressed that the patient might lose his hand as a result of the accident while it was stated that he would lose the use of several of his fingers.

Mr. Wsely was not seriously hurt but was badly shaken up by the accident. He was able to proceed to work this morning.

This is the second serious motor accident to happen at Oromocto within the last week or so.
