LUMBERMEN MAY COME
UNDER COMPENSATION ACT

Negotiations Now Being Carried on With That End in View—

Important Announcement Made in the Legislature—Mr.
Tilley Set Right by Premier Foster—Hon. Mr. Smith Ex-
plains the Bill to Establish a Game Refuge.

The Legislature on Friday afternoon
passed the remaining items of supply
and afterwards disposed of a number
of important bills. Following is the
conclusion of the official report
MR. CAMPBELL on the item of
\$24,700 for school books said he not-
iced by the Comptroller General's re-
port that in 1918 receipts had amount-
ed to \$22,034 and expenditures \$28,062
and yet a loss of \$4,238 was shown for
the year.

HON. MR. FOSTER said that stock
on hand at the end of the year would
have to be taken into consideration
and there also was the important fact
that although the cost price of school
books had advanced the price charged

by the Province to the public had not
MR. TILLEY on the item of \$7,000
for "Unforeseen Expenses, including
Commission to Investigate" said that
the expense on investigations had been
unnecessary. The point he wished to
make was that \$7,000 of the people's
money was to be spent which might
have been saved by another procedure
which would have met every desire
of the House. At the last session a
Committee had been appointed from
both sides of the House to act during
recess in regard to an investigation of
the Jordan Memorial Sanatorium. That
Committee had done its work and
brought in a report at a total cost to
the Province of \$115. He presumed
that the investigations referred to by
the item were on the Currie charges
and Patriotic Potatoes. Such investi-
gations could be conducted by a Com-
mittee of five members of the House
and an honest verdict obtained. He
would respectfully suggest that if any
further similar investigations were
considered necessary that they be con-
ducted by Committees of the House.

HON. MR. FOSTER said surely the
hon. member for St. John City (Tilley)
did not wish to place a misinterpre-
tation upon the item. It was not all
for investigation but also for unfor-
seen expenses. He might point out that
in 1915 a similar item was passed and
that last year \$4,500 had been voted.
He quite agreed with the hon. member
that the expense of the commissions
had been heavy but he also must point
out that this was not the only Govern-
ment which had appointed commis-
sion. In 1916 nearly \$13,000 had been
spent.

MR. YOUNG asked concerning the
item of \$15,000 for land for returned
soldiers.

HON. MR. TWEEDDALE explained
that this was to be expended under the
Bill which had been introduced.

MR. PINDER asked concerning the
item of \$4,200 for "Water Power In-
vestigation."

HON. MR. FOSTER replied that this
was for the commission which the
Province had appointed last year to
act in cooperation with the Water
Powers Branch of the Conservation
Commission. A chief engineer had
been furnished by the Dominion and
considerable work had been done in re-
gard to estimating drainage areas,
water flow, etc. Valuable information
would be obtained by the Commission
information which every other Prov-
ince possessed already. He would be
able to give more information concern-
ing this matter next week.

Further consideration of supply was
made the Order of the day for Tuesday
next.

MR. SWEENEY rose to a question
of personal privilege. During discus-
sion on a St. John Bill the day before
he had referred to the fact that there
was a considerable coasting trade be-
tween the counties of Albert and West-
morland and the City of St. John. At
the time some doubt seemed to be
cast upon his statement, but he not-
iced by one of the St. John papers that
the Albert County Ports were open
and that the first vessel of the season
had reached Moncton. The an-
nouncement about the Albert County
Ports might be news to the hon. mem-
bers from Albert County. This item
supported his contention with regard
to coasting trade.

HON. MR. VENIOT said he wished
to draw attention to a Bill promoted
by the Nashwaak Pulp & Paper Co.
Ltd. under which it sought drastic
powers with regard to the roads of
the Province which it or no other
Company should have. He wished to
serve notice that he would fight that
Bill to a finish. It had been introduced
by the Senior member for York (Pin-
der) and he wished that hon. member
to call the Company's attention to his
announcement in order that it may
be represented.

Being six o'clock hon. Mr. Speaker
left the Chair to resume at 8 P. M.

The House on resuming at 8 o'clock
resolved itself into committee and took
up consideration of a Bill Relating to
St. Andrews Church St. John.

MR. CAMPBELL explained that the
Bill asked authority to sell certain
property bequeathed by Sarah J. Fer-
guson and to change the method of
electing Trustees.

The Bill was agreed to as was
also a Bill relating to the Town of
Woodstock.

The Committee next went into con-
sideration of a Bill to Amend the
Church of England Act.

MR. BURCHILL explained that the
Bill had been placed in his hands by
the Diocesan Synod. It asked authority
to allow women to vote at elections
for Vestrymen and Church Wardens.

MR. TILLEY said that he noticed
that the Bill while it gave women the
right to vote, did not make them elig-
ible for the positions of Church Ward-
ens and Vestrymen. He wanted to
know why there had been discrimina-
tion.

MR. BURCHILL replied that he did
not assume responsibility for the Bill
as it merely had been placed in his
hands to lay before the House. It was
based on a resolution adopted by the
Synod. The hon. member from St.
John was a member of the Synod and
had probably voted for it.

MR. TILLEY—I was attending to
my legislative duties at the time.

HON. MR. SMITH said that if the
hon. member from St. John would
move to amend the Bill along the line
he had indicated, he would have pleas-
ure in seconding it.

MR. TILLEY said that he would be

MR. BURCHILL—You had better

The Bill was agreed to.

The Committee also agreed to Bills
relating to the Town of Newcastle, to
Civic Elections in the City of St. John,
to enable the Town of Bathurst to
borrow temporarily, to amend the Act
relating to the Government of the city
of St. John by an Elective Commission
to Vest Certain Property Devised by
Alexander McLagan in the Presby-
tery of the Miramichi, and an Act re-
lating to the Town of Sackville, to an
act relating to Marshlands in the Par-
ish of Hopewell and to a bill to amend
an act relating to the Regents of
Mount Allison.

The bills were reported.

The House went into committee with
Mr. Leger (West.) in the chair, and
agreed to bills for the sale of various
short lines of railway in the province
of New Brunswick, to amend the act
respecting Motor Vehicles, to amend
the New Brunswick Railway Act, to
establish the New Brunswick Game
refuge.

HON. MR. VENIOT moved minor
amendments to the bill relating to the
various short lines of Railways which
were passed, and also moved an am-
endment to the act relating to Motor
Vehicles which was passed. This am-
endment provided that tags for motor
trucks should be marked with the let-
ter X before the registered number.
He explained that this precaution was
taken because it was reported to the
Department of Public Works that
owners of Ford cars registered as
touring cars were using them as trucks
also and were thus avoiding taking out
a second licence.

MR. TILLEY expressed the opinion
that the farmer who displayed enough
genius to make this dual use of a
car should be allowed to do it.

HON. MR. VENIOT replied that it
was not the farmer but the city man
who was reported as doing this.

HON. MR. ROBINSON asked in
what city.

HON. MR. VENIOT replied Mon-
cton and St. John.

MR. BAXTER speaking to the bill
to amend the Workmen's Compensation
Act said he certainly had no ob-
jection to the amendment which would
meet cases which had arisen before
the existing Act came into effect. He
intended to move an amendment which
would cover a certain case which had
come to his attention and similar cases
although they might not be numerous.

It was the case of an employee of the
St. John Ferry service who had been
injured and who had been paid pro-
ceeds of an accident policy while under
treatment and had signed a discharge.
Later a tubercular trouble had devel-
oped, physicians said from the injury,
and his death ensued. A widow was
left who had no relatives to whom
she could look for help. He proposed
an amendment to meet the case which
would leave it discretionary with the
Compensation Board to make pay-
ment.

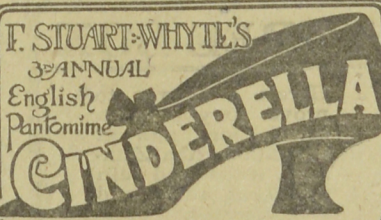
HON. MR. BYRNE said that circum-

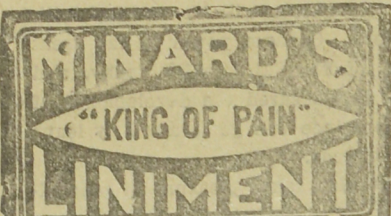
