QUIETNESS NOW PREVAILS THROUGHOUT EGYPT

Reports Today are of a Reassuring Nature—An Attempt to Tamper With a Railway Resulted in Five Arrests—British Soldiers Murdered in Alexandria—A Mob Seeking the Blood of Armenians.

Cairo, April 12—An official statement issued at the headquarters of General Allenby, special high commissioner for Egypt and the Soudan today reads:

"Since noon yesterday quiet has prevailed throughout Egypt. An attempt on Thursday to tamper with a railway resulted in five arrests, while attempts to interfere with telegraphic communications resulted in the village of Beni-Sabil being surrounded and given three days in which to produce the guilty persons. On Friday two rioters were killed and one was wounded when they were caught cutting telephone wires near Quesna.

"A deputation of prominent Alexandrian citizens has cabled the commanding officer deploring disorders on Thursday and expressing appreciation of the forbearance of the troops. Four hundred persons have been arrested here recently.

London, April 12—British forces have occupied Trebizond, Asiatic Turkey, according to a Constantinople despatch under date of Thursday to the Exchange Telegraph Company.

Cairo, Egypt, April 13—In two days of rioting here, ended at noon on Saturday, thirty-eight persons were killed and 100 wounded it is announced in today's official communique. Armenians were chiefly the object of the mob's attacks, and seven of those killed were of that nationality.

In rioting at Alexandria three persons were killed and six seriously injured Saturday morning while a continuation of attacks on the troops resulted in the killing of seventeen other persons during the afternoon.

The text of the statement reads:

"There was further rioting in Cairo yesterday. The mob, armed with knives and hatchets, made attempts largely directed at Armenians. The police report thirty-eight killed and 100 wounded during the forty-eight hours ended at noon yesterday. The killed include several Armenians and four Greeks. Military measures were enforced and the night passed off quietly.

"Disturbances occurred in Alexandria yesterday. There was a collision in the morning between troops and rioters in the Kamus quarter in which three were killed and six wounded seriously. In an Armenian disturbance in the afternoon the mob persistently attacked the troops, who were obliged to fire killing seventeen and wounded a number of others. The public are warned to be in their houses by 8 o'clock in the evening.

"Five British soldiers, including two unarmed Indians, were murdered on Wednesday. The troops were greatly affected but showed admirable patience. On Wednesday night the Kasr-El-Ain hospital, Cairo, reported receiving twenty-two killed and forty-seven wounded civilians. A large proportion of these casualties were due to mob outrages. Disorderly crowds composed of the worst elements began operations in the quarters from which the military patrols had been withdrawn at the request of the civil authorities. They murdered and carried out looting operations on small shops until troops stopped the excesses. The rioters systematically canvassed the houses for Armenians as was done in the massacres at Constantinople and held up pedestrians, forcing them to prove their identity. The terror-stricken

Armenians took refuge in the Cairo suburb of Helopolis which is almost entirely European, where upon the local policemen and watchmen abandoned their posts, apparently shirking responsibility.

"The Egyptian ministry (newly appointed on April 9) has not yet formally met."

"The reinstatement of the civil authorities in the provinces is almost everywhere complete."

2500 Armenians Protected

London, April 13—A Reuter despatch from Cairo dated April 11 states that many Armenians were massacred during the rioting on Wednesday and Thursday. It is said that 2,500 Armenians were collected there on Friday night and lodged in various buildings under military protection.

Warning Issued

Cairo, Egypt, April 9—An official statement today in referring to collisions in various parts of the city on Monday and Tuesday because of demonstrations who attacked British soldiers, two of whom were murdered, and to numerous demonstrations of hostility towards Europeans says:

"Thanks, however, to the order of General Allenby to avoid bloodshed as much as possible it has been possible up to this time to control the situation without recourse to severe measures, but lawlessness cannot be tolerated. Any continuance of the present disturbances entails the application of force in which the innocent must suffer with the guilty."

The situation in the provinces is unchanged, the statement says.

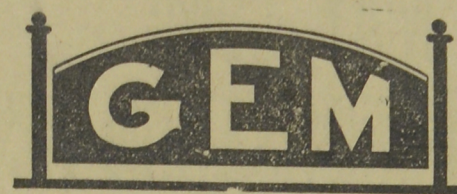
Death of W. H. Jonah

Berlin, April 13—A Dresden despatch to the 'Vossische Zeitung' says that an assault by Soviet forces on the Citadel in the Neustadt section of the city on the right bank of the Elbe, is expected. Frontier troops and soldiers from Pirna, eleven miles southeast of Dresden have established themselves near the Catholic church to defend the northern end of the Friedrich Augustus Bridge.

Some of the Jaeger and Grenadier troops are reported to be unreliable, their arms having been distributed among the insurgents.
