DAYLIGHT SAVING IS OPPOSED

FACTORIES WILL HAVE TO RUN ON OLD TIME

Some Aldermen Not Agreeable to Change—General Public Adopted New Time Easily.

Daylight Saving went into effect in Fredericton at midnight Sunday in accordance with the proclamation of His Worship Mayor Hanson. All public clocks were advanced one hour. There was a slight "hitch" in regard to the City Hall clock but after the mayor's proclamation was published Saturday Ald. Cooper chairman of the City Hall Committee, issued instructions to Janitor Biggs to set the clock ahead.

Council Not All Agreeable

It is understood that all the members of the City Council are not willing to have the Daylight Saving time adopted and take the ground that Mayor Hanson had no right to issue proclamation particularly after the council had decided that no action would be taken until the early part of May.

Labor Men Opposed

Members of the Fredericton Labor Council which decided by a close vote against Daylight Saving, are still opposed to the change, and state that they will protest. Several factories ran on Daylight Saving today and others on the old time. The employees of the John Palmer Company in Fredericton and the Canadian Cottons Limited in Marysville have expressed an opinion against the new time. This morning a petition signed by nine-tenths of the employees of the John Palmer Co. asking for a restoration of the old time was presented and it is probable that the factory will run again on the old time tomorrow as the employees have practically refused to work on Daylight Saving time. The Marysville cotton mill is not running on the new time and there is no prospect of it introducing the new time as the employees are generally opposed. At the factory of the Palmer-McLellan Shoeapack Company this morning a vote of the employees was two to one against Daylight Saving and the old time will be retained. The Hart Boot and Shoe factory adopted Daylight Saving this morning and as no protest has been made it is expected to remain in force. The trouble with factory hands is that Daylight Saving at this time of the year compels them to get up in the dark. Had the introduction been delayed a

ST. JOHN RIVER RISING RAPIDLY; BOOMS IN PLACE

DRIVING ON NAPUDOGAN BEGAN YESTERDAY

To Begin on Nashwaak Tomorrow—Fraser Drives All Doing Well—Drift Drive Starts Tomorrow.

The water in the St. John River has risen rapidly during the last two or three days and this morning was eleven feet above summer level. The booming of the St. John River Log Driving Company is being carried on successfully and the Mitchell boom was completed today and the river sealed. The river at Kingsclear will according to report, be sealed by tomorrow night.

The drift drive will be started from the Mitchell boom, eight miles below the city, tomorrow morning. The tug Latona which was laid up for the winter at the old Gibson wharf in Devon was floated Saturday evening and was at work on Sunday.

On Nashwaak Waters

The Nashwaak Pulp & Paper Company started driving yesterday on the Napudogan, and so far things are moving well. The drive on the main Nashwaak has been held up on account of low water but with the water rising a crew is being put on tomorrow night. There is still plenty of snow and ice on the Nashwaak headwaters and as they melt the river will rise making prospects very good for the drive. It is expected that about twelve or thirteen million feet of new logs besides those on the Napudogan will be brought out.

The Fraser Drives

Mr. J. S. Scott announced today that the Fraser operations were coming along well. The drives on both Yohos and the Dunbar are out and that on the Tay is coming along well. The drive on Swan Creek is now in safe waters and a crew is being sent in on Eel River, York County tonight.


