CANADA'S WAR DEBT CLOSE TO TWO BILLION DOLLARS

Is Almost as Large as Was the Debt of the United States After
the Close of the Civil War—Americans Established a One
Per Cent. Sinking Fund—Debt of the United States, is Now
Thirty Billion Dollars.

Canada's public debt at the ter-
mination of the war, by which term
is meant the payment of expenses
due to the conflict, with, of course, the
exception of pensions, will be, rough-
ly, two billion dollars. The conflict
will have cost us about 1½ billion
dollars. It is possible our debt will
be greater but the sum stated may
be taken as reasonable.

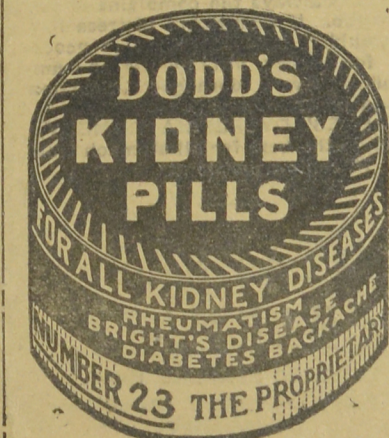
In this connection, and in view of
the recent budget speech, which was
concerned wholly with the raising of
funds for our immediate needs, it is
of interest to ascertain the plan pur-
sued by the republic to wipe out its
war debt contracted during the Civil
War, particularly since the amounts
are practically the same. The United
States' debt was two billion, three
hundred million, when Lee surren-
dered. At the beginning of the conflict
the whole American debt was less
than one-fourth that of Canada at the
beginning of the war in 1914, amount-
ing to 90 millions, against our 365 mil-
lions or thereabouts. The Civil War
therefore cost the United States more
than the European war has cost us,
both in money and in human life, and
is saddled the country with a debt that
appeared appalling in those days when
a million dollars commanded more re-
spect than ten times that sum does
today.

After the war the federal admin-
istration established a 1 per cent.
sinking fund, and maintained for a
decade a tax revenue equal to the
annual average during the war it-
self. That was a drastic remedy, but
its results were astonishing. In less
than twenty-five years the debt was
reduced to one billion dollars. In
twenty-seven years it was down to
less than \$600,000,000. In 1889 the
prospects looked so bright for the
total redemption by the government
of the whole issue of 4 per cent bonds
that the price of these securities rose
to 129.

Discussing the possible methods of
attacking the present American war
debt of roughly some 30 billion dol-
lars Senator Smoot, in an interesting
article in the New York Sun, asserts
that the problem is not one to cause
worry. One-third the debt is already
offset by advances to foreign countries,
so that the real question concerns the
wiping out within a certain number of
years of the remaining 20 billions.
This, he thinks can be best affected by
an annual sinking fund of 1½ per cent
of the total debt. This would require
\$450,000,000 annually and would ex-
tinguish the debt in 1951. The Civil
War debt was wiped out in practically
the same length of time, but the po-
pulation during the period was about
one third to one half what it is now.

Pie crust—30 to 40 minutes.
Pork—Well done, per lb., 30 min.
Potatoes—30 to 45 minutes.
Pudding—Bread, rice and tapioca,
1 hour; plum, 2 to 3 hours.
Rolls—10 to 15 minutes.
Turkey—70 lbs., 3 hours.
Veal—Well done, per lb., 20 minutes.

New York, June 14.—The alertness
of an elderly bank messenger, who
pursued six hold-up men down the
stairway of an uptown Manhattan ele-
vated station and followed one of them
with a fusillade of shots from his re-
volver, frustrated a daring attempt at
daylight robbery here yesterday. The
robber who was shot was carrying a
bag containing \$100,000 in securities
taken from David Ryan, the messen-
ger who did the shooting, and Harry
Boydland, employees of the Colonial
Bank, who were taking the funds to
the Federal reserve bank.

The robbers appeared suddenly on
the elevated stairway and put Boyd-
land out of business by pressing a wad
of cotton saturated with chloroform to
his face, while Ryan was stunned with
a blow from a blackjack.

However, as the thugs ran toward
the street Ryan leaped after them and
fired four shots at the group. The
man with the bag collapsed, releasing
his hold on the container of the secu-
rities, and while his companions
were carrying him to a waiting auto-
mobile, Ryan retrieved the valuables.

LUCKY STRIKE IN OIL FIELDS NEAR MONCTON

Moncton, June 14.—The New Bruns-
wick Gas and Oil Fields, Ltd., in the
Stoney Creek field at Well No. 18,
about eight and a half miles from
Moncton, in their deepening progress
have struck the most prolific and the
deepest oil sands yet found in this
field, at a depth of 2,622 feet. The oil
came with such a gush that it flowed
intermittently to the top of the derrick,
a height of seventy feet above the
ground. This is the first gusher
struck in this field.
