OUR FUTURE RULER.

The wonderful magnetism of the Prince of Wales extends even to his pictures on the screen, and its potency is by no means confined to the borders of Canada, says Toronto Saturday Night. In Detroit, for instance, pictures of incidents in connection with his tour of Eastern Canada have been displayed in the movie theatres and, according to a Detroit paper every glimpse of him is greeted with storms of applause. Audiences which have been educated to regard royalty as effete, and the citizens of countries under monarchical forms of government as unfortunate victims of outworn forms, greet his shadow with wild acclaim.

Genuine appreciation for Canada's valor of course plays some part in these scenes of enthusiasm, for at Detroit the apex of enthusiasm was reached when he was shown presenting a stand of colors to a Canadian regiment at Halifax. Nevertheless it is quite evident that great popular affection surrounds the personality of the Prince himself. New York acquaintances are of the opinion that the scenes in that metropolis, when he goes there late in October to receive the freedom of the city, will come near to equalling any ovation of the past, and will even surpass the great receptions he has received in Canada. All of which goes to show that the sentiment which surrounds royalty, illogical as it may seem in the twentieth century, is a more tangible thing with the masses than cold political theorists would be willing to admit. Of course it all depends on how royalty behaves itself; its divinity is exploded, but when its behaviour is princely it seems to satisfy some deep-rooted instinct in the human mass.

Mr. W. E. McMonagle, whom the St. John Standard describes as "the young Irish lawyer from Grand Falls," presided at the Unionist convention at Woodstock on Thursday. Mr. McMonagle is a former member of the Standard staff, and is a new arrival in the constituency. According to the Standard, he is "one of the candidates selected by the local opposition in Victoria for the next general election." The Tories of Carleton-Victoria are playing the game, but it is such a transparent one that even a blind man can see through it.

The estate of the late United States Senator Isaac Stephenson, of Marinette, Wis., totals \$7,224,241, according to the inventory filed with the tax commission by John Harrington, inheritance tax agent, last week. The late Senator Stephenson, who was a prominent figure in the middle west, was a native of Mauderville, New Brunswick, and started life without a dollar. He went west when a young man and engaged in lumbering, which he followed with remarkable success.

When women get the habit of offering themselves as candidates for the Federal Parliament, some changes in the election law may be necessary. For instance, there can be no particular objection to a lady candidate publishing an extended biography telling of good old days past and gone, but it is scarcely the right thing for her to attempt to foist on the electorate a picture of herself made from a twenty-five or thirty-year-old photograph.

Living costs will fall soon, Attorney General Palmer of the United States declares. "Prices have dropped in all parts of the country," he said. "Throughout the United States the cost of foods has fallen almost twenty-five per cent. Beef on the hoof has gone down so low in some localities that the producers are protesting." We wish the Attorney General could be translated to Canada for a season.

The Federal Department of the Interior has issued a pamphlet giving a list of the unoccupied and uncultivated lands in the Province of New Brunswick. The publication is made for the benefit of intending settlers. The number of acres vacant in York is given at 15,119.

ONTARIO DRY ELECTIONS TAKE PLACE MONDAY

Toronto, Oct. 18.—Sunday promises to be a day of vigorous campaigning throughout the province of Ontario as the result of the very active part many church organizations are taking in the Ontario temperance act referendum, which will be a direct issue for the people to decide at the polling booths on Monday, when they vote at the same time in the general elections for the Ontario Legislature.

The churches having adopted the referendum questions as a moral issue, a large number of the church services will be along that line. In addition there will be many public meetings also advocating the "Four No's" on the referendum ballot, in the effort to "keep Ontario dry."

Good Variety of Produce on Hand—Eggs and Butter Show Tendency to Rise in Price.

A good variety of produce was on hand at the country market this morning with buyers numerous. The market was a big one reaching some distance down Queen Street. Eggs and butter which have been at 60 cents went up to 65 and 70 cents was asked for them in some cases.

The ruling prices were as follows: Butter, 60 to 65 cents per lb. Eggs 60 to 65 cents per dozen. Cabbage, 75 cents to \$1 per dozen. Chicken, 35 to 40 cents per lb. Fowl, 35 to 40 cents per lb. Beef, 12 to 16 cents per lb. Veal, 9 to 15 cents per lb. Lamb, 15 to 25 cents per lb. Mutton, 12 to 18 cents per lb. Pork, 20 to 28 cents per lb. Turnips \$1 per barrel. Carrots, \$1 per barrel. Potatoes, \$2.50 per barrel. Apples, \$1.50 to \$3.00 per barrel. Live pigs, \$3.50 to \$4.50 each. Squash and pumpkin, 2 cents per lb.

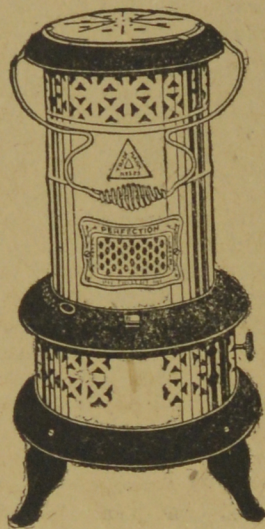

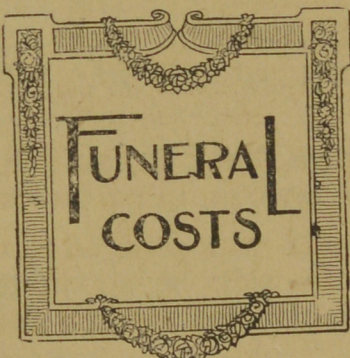

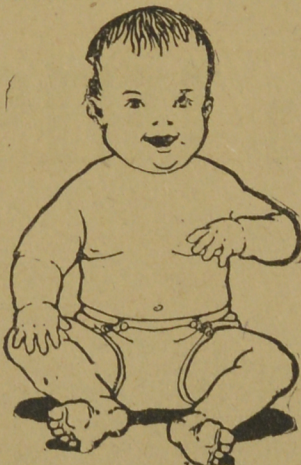
