GRAND TRUNK LEGISLATION MAY COME UP WEDNESDAY

The Federal Government in No Hurry to Launch Its Prohibitory Legislation—Liberal Caucus Being Held Today—Mr. Lapointe's Campaign in Quebec East—Visits of Ministers to the Old Country Came High.

Ottawa, Oct. 13—There is to be no "undue haste" on the part of the government in launching on their legislative course its prohibition bill and its prospective measure dealing with the report of the parliamentary committee on the problems arising from the demand of soldiers for increased gratuities. It is semi-officially intimated that these important pieces of legislation "cannot be reached this week." The presence of Sir William Hearst Ontario's provincial premier in the capital today is very generally commented upon as "synchronizing" with the intimation to members that these contentious measures will not be submitted to the house for discussion until after the provincial polling day.

Liberal Caucus Today

Parliament will probably "mark time" tomorrow, and prepare to take up the Grand Trunk legislation on Wednesday.

The Liberal opposition has called a caucus for the morning to consider the government proposals. The principle of public ownership is finding friends among many of the members, according to reports and there will likely be vigorous opposition in the caucus to any plan to place parliamentary Liberalism in record as against this policy. If an amendment is submitted to the government proposals it is most likely to take the form of insistence that the report of the board of arbitrators appointed to determine the price and apportion the stock, shall be placed before parliament for approval before it becomes effective.

Ernest Lapointe, who returned to Ottawa from Quebec today, will formally place his resignation as representative of the constituency of Kamouraska in the hands of the speaker on Wednesday. He will cease to be a member of the house of commons before he enters the campaign as Liberal candidate for the riding of East Quebec next Monday. He told the Globe that it was not his purpose to endeavor to represent two constituencies.

It may be definitely stated that Mr. Lapointe's decision to seek election is Sir Wilfrid Laurier's old riding is due largely to the prospective candidature of Armand Lavergne. With the death of the "Old Chief" the Nationalists have renewed plans for the political control of Quebec province and proposed to auspiciously inaugurate their new campaign by electing Lavergne to succeed Laurier. It is to checkmate this scheme that Lapointe and the band of progressive young Liberals of which he is the leader have taken action. Their move has somewhat upset the calculations of the followers of Henri Bourassa and it is now doubtful whether Lavergne will care to enter the lists with Lapointe as an opponent. In any event he has decided to take counsel with Le Matre before finally announcing his intentions.

\$52,624.38 for Visits

Ottawa, Oct. 13—So far as known trips by cabinet ministers to England during the great war up to September 1, have cost the country \$52,624.38. It cost more. How much more it is impossible to say because the department of public works was obliged to return the following memo as an answer to the request for information as to how much the Hon. Robert Rogers spent during his visit to England. "No information in the department since it is not customary for ministers of the crown to submit vouchers except the Hon. A. K. MacLean, who had not returned to Canada before September 1 last, and whose expenses therefore would not be included in the above amount. There is no record of the expenses of Sir George Foster during his last trip to England and France as the trade and commerce department informs parliament that the trip lasting from November 8, 1919, just before the armistice, to June 21, 1919, will cost Canada nothing as the expenses of Sir George were paid by the British government. This was not the case with any of the other ministers who went overseas with Sir Robert Borden in connection with the peace conference and in view of the fact that in the month preceding the armistice the whole gossip in Ottawa regarding reconstruction turned on the probable retirement of Sir George and a few others one is forced irresistibly to the conclusion that somehow the oracle was worked on behalf of the wily Conservative politician and

knight. The post office department has also no information regarding the expenses of the postmaster general in Europe for the very good reason that "Colonel Blondin did not go to Europe as a minister of the crown, but as a lieutenant-colonel in the army." When twenty-three trips were made, one would have supposed that every minister could have had one. Sixteen did go but somebody had to stay at home all the time. The Hon. J. D. Reid, for instance, has made one of his spheres of usefulness and willingness to work and fill in while his colleagues were overseas.

How It Went

Naturally among so many ministers ideas varied considerably as to just how much money it was necessary to spend to maintain in their persons, the glory and dignity of the dominion. Sir Sam Hughes led the van with four trips to England costing in all \$20,654.47, his trip in October, 1914 costing \$3,500; in July, 1915, \$4,866.67; in March, 1916, \$3,365 and in July 1916, \$8,922. Following Sir Sam after a suitable interval comes Hon. A. L. Sifton with a bill of \$10,253.25, the last peace conference trip making up \$9,000 of this amount. Though first minister, Sir Robert Borden took third place in this contest. He spent \$7,593.55 in two trips. For himself and staff, \$2,795.04 for his first trip from May 24 to August 24, 1918, and \$4,798.51 for the peace conference trip from November 8, 1918 to May 26, 1919. In order of precedence based on the size of their expense accounts follow the other ministers, Sir Thomas White, minister of finance, one trip from October 20 to December 9, 1916, \$2,800; Sir George E. Foster minister of trade and commerce \$2,776.62 for two trips at Canada's expense, one from May 27 to August 19, 1916, at \$1,525.39, and a second from December 1916 to January, 1917 at \$1,251.23. The third peace conference trip being paid for by the Imperial government; Hon. C. J. Doherty, minister of justice, one trip to the peace conference, \$2,279.01; Major General S. C. Mewburn, minister of militia, one trip, \$1,338.47; Hon. J. A. Calder, minister of immigration and colonization, one trip, \$1,223.75; Hon. N. W. Rowell, president of the privy council for himself and private secretary for one trip \$906.66; Hon. G. C. Ballantyne, minister of marine and fisheries, one trip, \$871.60; Hon. Arthur Meighen, minister of the interior one trip \$827; Sir Edward Kemp, one trip while acting minister of militia, \$500; Sir J. D. Hazen, former minister of marine, one trip, \$500; and Hon. Robert Rogers, former minister of public works, an unknown amount because he did not submit vouchers.

Tonita C., Driven by Fourteen-Year-Old Driver, Won the Free-for-All.

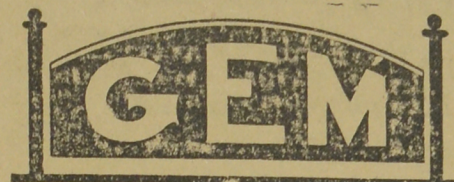

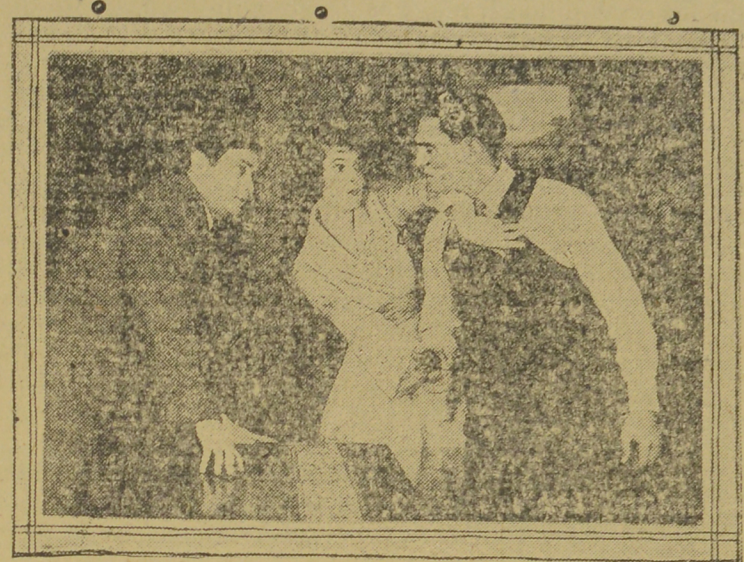
