ONE HUNDRED AND  
FORTY DOLLARS IN FINES

Liquor Inspector Had One Case  
for Having Liquor in Pos-  
session—Charges of  
Drunkenness.

Some six drunks were rounded up over the week-end and Monday and with two other arrests including a prohibition case and a motor vehicle violation deposits amounting to about \$140 were taken in by Sitting Magistrate E. Allison McKay this morning in the Fredericton Police Court.

A party of four drunks who were arrested on King Street for making too much noise and two others arrested for being intoxicated appeared before the Sitting Magistrate this morning and were fined \$8 each. They paid their fines and were allowed to go. A man charged with driving a motor vehicle under the influence of liquor \$140 were taken in by Sitting Magistrate. He was fined \$25 and costs.

**Liquor in Possession**  
A young man who left this city this morning to witness the Woodstock races was arrested yesterday in an uptown livery stable with liquor in his possession and his case was heard in court this morning. He was found guilty of a violation of the Intoxicating Liquor Act, 1916 and was fined \$50 and costs.

At ten o'clock yesterday morning the Fredericton firemen were called out to extinguish a small roof fire at the Fanjoy house on George Street. At 12.15 p. m. yesterday a still alarm was sent in from Mrs. Dell Gunter's residence, Brunswick Street. The fire was a small chimney blaze which was soon extinguished. A chimney fire in Jaffrey Street, Devon, at the residence of Mr. Robert Currie called out the Devon firemen last night.

## PATRIOTIC FUND CHANGES TO BE DISCUSSED

FREDERICTON DISTRICT  
NOT UNDER NEW SYSTEM

Some Opposition—Not Desired  
That Provincial Headquar-  
ters Will Decide Local  
Matters.

A meeting of the general committee of the Fredericton District Patriotic Fund will be held at the Board of Trade rooms tomorrow evening to consider the matter of re-organization.

**Change Was Made**  
In the early part of September a change was made with regard to the Provincial Patriotic Funds. Previous to that time the secretaries of the local branches of the fund had referred any matters in connection with the fund to the Dominion headquarters at Ottawa and had issued all their own cheques. Under the new arrangement the local branches are affiliated with headquarters at St. John. Local branches must send their information referring to matters in connection with the fund to St. John where they are either forwarded to Ottawa or annulled. Thus the local branches can perform no business without higher authority except the granting of emergency cheques. These run from \$15 to \$50 and can be granted to any family on the fund whose need at the time is very great.

**To Consider Change**  
The local secretary, R. H. Simonds has, under the orders of the General Committee of the local fund, been working under the old fund directions. The meeting tomorrow evening is to consider whether or not the local branch will work under the new system. It has been stated by those in authority that the new order is not as satisfactory as the old.

Mr. Joseph Cameron of Grand Falls a former resident of Devon is revisiting his former home and spending some days with friends. Mr. Cameron has been farming near Grand Falls for a number of years.
