TORIES PREDOMINATE IN THE UNION CABINET

They Number Eleven as Against Eight Liberals—Sir Douglas Hazen Who is Now at Ottawa, Will Probably Succeed Hon. Mr. Carvell—Sir Robert's 50-50 Pledge Has Never Been Carried Out.

Ottawa, Aug. 28—As it is believed here that a successor to Hon. Mr. Carvell in the cabinet is about to be appointed, and as there is a growing conviction that a Conservative has been selected by Sir Robert Borden though he may not become minister of public works, observers are studying the personnel and the political complexion of the cabinet as it now stands.

Leaving out the public works portfolio, there are now eleven Conservatives in the ministry and eight Liberals, and if Sir Douglas Hazen should enter the government, as is thought increasingly probable, the count would stand twelve to eight, although Liberals say than an equal division as between parties was agreed upon in 1917.

It is asserted that Sir Robert Borden has never been able to carry out that pledge because of the stiff objections of the high protectionist wing of his party and it is pointed out that the time has gone by for that cure of the situation inasmuch as shrewd observers on both sides are convinced that the country will demand with increasing force a dissolution of the ministry and an appeal to the electors in order that a fresh House of Commons may be elected and a new ministry formed in accordance with public sentiment as expressed at the polls.

Liberals are saying that further Liberal additions to the ministry of the day would mean nothing because in matters like the tariff the Liberals would have to give way, and so stultify themselves, or the tariff discussion and tariff changes would have to be postponed indefinitely, a plan in regard to which the country would not be long in expressing its marked hostility.

Will Not Oppose Farmers

Ottawa, Aug. 28—It would not appear to be the policy of the opposition in the pending federal by-elections to place candidates in seats where representatives of the United Farmers or Grain Growers are nominated. This is fairly clearly indicated by the attitude taken by the Liberal convention held at Alexandria in the County of Glengarry, on Tuesday evening. At that convention a resolution was placed before the meeting tendering the Liberal nomination to Hon. W. L. MacKenzie King, but before the resolution was put to vote the secretary S. H. Cline, read a letter received from Mr. King on August 12th last. In this letter Mr. King referred to a meeting of the Liberal executive held that day and at which the unanimous desire had been expressed that he should be tendered the nomination as representative of the county.

In his letter Mr. King thanked the executive but declared that this choice must be with the convention which would later be called. He further said however, "I notice in the press reference to a farmers' convention to be held in Alexandria on Wednesday, the 10th inst., for the purpose of selecting candidates for the federal parliament and the provincial by-elections. I do not know whether this convention is called with reference in any way to the existing vacancy in Glengarry or whether it is primarily for the purpose of selecting candidates for the general elections. The policy of the Liberal Party is laid down at the national convention just concluded is so akin in essentials to the policy of the United Farmers, as set forth in their platform, that contests at this time between a Liberal candidate and a farmers' candidate could not, in my humble judgment, prove other than detrimental to the interests of both.

Its only effect so far as I am able to see, would be to create such a division in the forces which are naturally opposed to the reactionary policy of the government in power as to afford the government just the opportunity it would like to have at the present moment. As leader of the Liberal party I should feel that I was placing both myself and the party in a false position were I to consider any nomination which would have the effect at this time of placing me in an attitude of apparent antagonism to the farmers of our province. Such a position would be unjust to my own feelings, as it would be unfair to the aim and purpose of the Liberal party as expressed in the platform adopted at the recent convention. I hope, therefore, that in any mention which may be made of my name at the convention of Liberals on August 26 account will be taken of this all important consideration.

As a consequence of this letter the convention moved a vote of confidence in Mr. King and adjourned without nominating anyone. It is generally believed here that the same policy will be followed in connection with all seats where bona fide United Farmers' candidates stand for election during the coming contests.

Chicago, Aug. 28—The \$15 hog, \$1.50 nearer the slender purse of the high cost of living victim, made its appearance in the Chicago stockyards today. His advent was immediately followed by a slump in provisions and grain as well as live cattle, and sheep. The drop in hog prices was the greatest since 1907, and traders who look for still lower figures pointed out that eastern storage houses are believed to be already crowded with meat products, leaving only a domestic outlet.

London, Aug. 28—Some idea of the magnitude of the job of clothing Great Britain's army may be gained from the report of Andrew Weir, in charge of the Army Clothing Department. The department, the figures show, has supplied the army with 40,500,000 jackets, 37,250,000 trousers, 12,250,000 overcoats, 29,000,000 caps and 64,000,000 shirts among other things.
