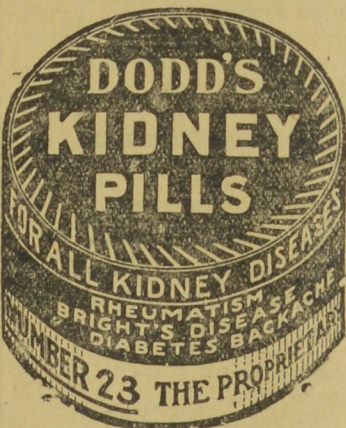
## WAR SAVINGS STAMPS GOOD INVESTMENT

Make Saving Easy and Pay the Investor Over 4½ per cent Interest, Compounded Half-yearly.

The paying of \$4 now for a War Savings Stamp and getting \$5 for it from the government in January, 1924, is a method of investing that appeals quite strongly to the average person. Nor is this surprising, for the money thus invested yields a little over 4½ per cent, compounded half-yearly. With a War Savings Stamp goes a War Savings Certificate to which the stamps are attached.

Obviously this is an excellent return when the nature of the security is taken into account. There is nothing safer in the world than Canada, and these stamps are backed by all the resources of the Dominion.

A person does not need to have \$4 in cash in order to take the first steps towards purchasing a War Savings Stamp. Thrift Stamps, which sell at 25 cents each, have been provided. When 16 of these have been purchased they may be exchanged for a War Savings Stamp. With the first Thrift Stamp purchased goes a Thrift Card to which the Stamps should be fixed



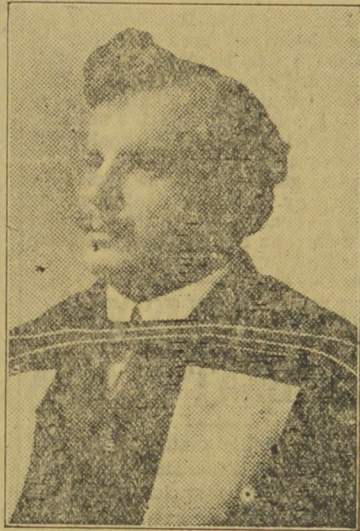
## DR. C. C. JONES OF THE U. N. B. FAVORS THRIFT

Declares it will Enable Canada to Recover Quickly From the Effects of the Great War.

In a recent statement, Chancellor Jones of the University of New Brunswick, recommended the War Savings plan as follows

"The war has taught Canadians at least one valuable lesson. We were undoubtedly an extravagant people—not so much perhaps in the sense of squandering large sums of money, although even in that we might plead guilty, but we were habitually careless. It is true that we were ready to admit the necessity for conservation of our raw materials and our surplus production, yet in practice we were exceedingly wasteful. Even our money was freely given to finance schemes of the most transparent wild-cat variety. What we did not waste directly we allowed others to waste for us.

"The war brought home to us the necessity for saving. In at least one particular—food—economy became vital. Our good judgment of the value of conservation became fixed because

of the appreciation of its necessity in order to win the war. We became a fairly economical people.

"In a real sense, however, people feel that "to save" means "to save money" Here again necessity became our teacher. Money had to be procured to meet the enormous demand for war expenditure. Furthermore, it had to be procured from the pockets of our own people. Through two successful Victory Loan campaigns the need was largely met. These campaigns, however, were temporary and failed to a considerable extent to reach the whole community.

"Our financial success depends upon the support of the whole country. The War Savings and Thrift Campaign thus meets a vital need. It aims to provide a safe and profitable investment for all the people and to furnish capital for readjustment of Canadian conditions. Every true Canadian should do his part by advice and example. He should obtain a Thrift Card and War Savings Certificate without delay and consistently invest his spare change in this way. Even those who feel that such an incentive to saving is personally unnecessary should join in making the movement a general success. Many a "quarter"—possibly a surprisingly large number—may thus be deflected from a useless expenditure—and "many nickles make a muckle."

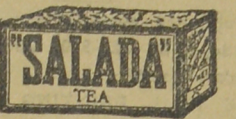
"A general movement of this kind will do much to enable Canada to "carry on" and to make a quick recovery from the effects of the war.

"France, after 1871, gave us a remarkable example of recovery from a disastrous military campaign. The universal testimony of economists is that she was enabled to do so because of the thrift of her people. Canada's military achievements have warmed the blood of every citizen. We look forward with abundant hope to the future. Nothing will help more to make our most optimistic dreams come true than the inculcation of the general habit of thrift among the people."
