NO RAY OF HOPE.

Colonel Henry Watterson, the veteran editor of the St. Louis Courier-Journal, contributes an article to the New York Herald in which he roundly condemns the prohibition amendment to the constitution. In conclusion he hands out this warning to his fellow-countrymen:

"Have a care! I give it you straight! There are no flies on this writing. I claim to be the only son of the seventh daughter of the seventh son in a straight line from Brian Boru, the Scottish prophet—or was he Irish—and I know everything that ever has been, or ever will be, and I tell you confidentially, of course—that the world is on its last legs that, having gone into collapse and eclipse twice already, it is headed for a third descent into the vortex that yawns before it; the process being as simple and easy as falling off a log; Woodrow to get back home with his gospel of sweetness and light; Marconi, with his wireless to get in touch with Mars; some fool to explode from the top of the Washington monument a bomb which will stifle the universe and destroy all living things, including the fantastical profiteers of Miami and the horsey girls over at Palm Beach. I am not pessimistic. Dear me, no, but I am neither blind nor deaf, and I refuse to be dumb. Even as it is, the world upside down; England in ferment, Germany in flames; Florida and Hell-for-Sartin given over to the bolshevik of prohibition, where shall we look for a ray of hope?"

Now that the war is over, London merchants are making a strong bid for the trade of American tourists. The following is an extract from a London jewellery firm's announcement which lately appeared in a New York paper: "The Goldsmiths and Silversmiths Co. have the honor to greet their vast American clientele with whom they have through recent disturbances been temporarily estranged. They wish to take this opportunity of expressing their congratulations on the result of the world conflict and cordially welcome a revival of former business relations." Evidently the doctrine of "no truck or trade with the Yankees" is unknown in the old country.

Now that war purchasing commissions have gone out of business, food products are beginning to get back within the reach of the ordinary individual. Pork products, including hams, bacon and lard, have all dropped in price, and the end is not yet. Butter in New York has declined 25 cents a pound. The continued mild weather has started hens laying a month earlier than usual, and already there has been a big drop in the price of eggs.

A large block of New Brunswick 5½ per cent. bonds was recently sold to a Toronto brokerage firm at a slight advance on par. It is announced that American interests have taken a large portion of the issue. The financial men of the continent have evidently been made aware of the fact that the province is no longer ruled by potato politicians.

Brooklyn Eagle: "In the somewhat confused news that the world has received of serious disturbances caused by strikes in various parts of Great Britain—disturbances that are unquestionably compelling the attention of a puzzled government—most of the strikes have not been ordered or countenanced by the bodies that have been supposed to command such loyalty. In a special sense these are anarchical strikes, and because of their irregularity are the greater menace."

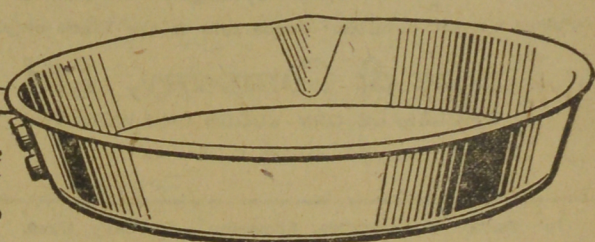

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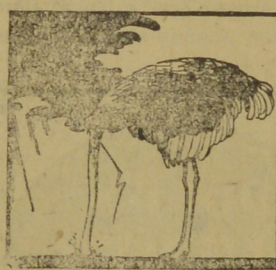
