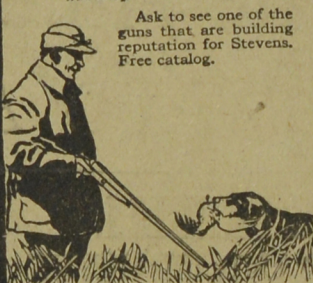

FURTHER REPORT TO BE
GIVEN ON SOLDIERS' TAXES

Assessment Appeals Committee to Consider Matter—Tenders
for Construction of Extension of Coagulating Basin to be
Called for—Further Action This Year Not Likely—Special
Committee to Report on Matter of Grant for Private Road
Near New Maryland Road.

The City Council at its regular
monthly meeting last night referred
the matter of the taxation of returned
soldiers to the Assessment Appeals
Committee to report at the next meet-
ing. A statement of the City Clerk on
the authority of Chamberlain Lingley
of the City of St. John was to the ef-
fect that St. John imposed both poll
and income tax upon returned sol-
diers, the tax being imposed immedi-
ately upon the men resuming civilian
life.

The matter of granting money to be
expended upon a right-of-way in
Queens Ward between New Maryland
Road and the University property for
the benefit of a number of residents of
the locality, was referred to a special
committee which will report back.

The preparation of plans and spec-
ifications of an extension of the Co-
agulating Basin of the Filtration Plant
was ordered, also the calling of ten-
ders for the construction of the same.
There was opposition to proceeding
with this work and it is hardly likely
that it will be undertaken before next
season.

In the absence of Mayor Hanson
who has gone to Winnipeg Deputy
Mayor McKay occupied the chair.
Others in attendance were Ald. Bur-
pee, Ald. Cooper, Ald. Baxter, Ald.
Wilkinson, Ald. Davidson, Ald. Young
and Ald. Reid.

Tax Collections

Ald. Reid for the Finance Commit-
tee reported on tax collections as fol-
lows:

August, 1919, \$110,578.36; August,
1919, \$117,042.11.

Grant for Road Asked for

J. B. Dickson appeared on behalf
of residents of Queens Ward dwelling
east of New Maryland Road, and
asked for a grant of \$200 for improve-
ment of a road on condition that the
residents provide a like amount for
the same purpose. He said he had
gone over the ground with Ald. Mc-
Kay City Clerk Perkins and City En-
gineer McDowell.

The City Engineer reported that the
street could be made of satisfactory
width by removing an outbuilding.

Ald. McKay, chairman of the Roads
and Streets Committee said he was
favorable to making improvements
for these citizens. A grant should be
given. The giving of such a grant
would not make the road a public
street.

Ald. Cooper said that streets in the
outportions of the city should be
regularly laid out.

City Clerk Perkins said that the
understanding when the citizens lo-
cated there was that they must pro-
vide their own means of access to an
extension of St. John Street should
it ever be made.

Ald. Reid quoted the city bylaw and
claimed that the expenditure of a city
grant would not make the road a pub-
lic street and that any citizen could
prevent the expenditure by legal ac-
tion.

Ald. Wilkinson drew attention to the
fact that it would be illegal to grant
any money.

Ald. Reid suggested delaying ac-
tion till legislation could be secured.

Ald. Cooper suggested a committee
to investigate the matter and report.
Deputy Mayor McKay appointed a
committee composed of Ald. Cooper,
Ald. Young and Ald. Burpee to con-
sider the matter.

Appointed to School Board

On the motion of Ald. Burpee, Mr.
P. J. Hughes was appointed member of
the Fredericton School Board for the
ensuing year.

At the request of Ald. Burpee, City
Engineer McDowell reported that he
had made progress with the plans for

the coagulating basin at the water
plant.

Women's Electoral Lists

Ald. Wilkinson drew attention to
the fact that electoral lists containing
the names of all women over twenty
one years of age and British subjects
must be prepared in addition to exist-
ing lists.

There was discussion concerning
this matter the opinion being that
the revisors should take whatever
steps may be necessary.

Ald. Wilkinson pointed out that
the task would be a heavy one and
the revisors should be given some
leeway in the matter of expenditure.

The opinion was expressed that
women voters would take steps them-
selves to have their names placed on
the lists.

On the motion of Ald. Reid it was
decided to defer action on the matter
of compensating the revisors until
after the completion of the work.

Coagulating Basin Extension

The plans of City Engineer Mc-
Dowell for the extension of the co-
agulating basin were considered.

Ald. Burpee stated that the estimat-
ed cost was \$7,000 or \$8,000.

Ald. McKay wanted to know where
the money would come from.

Ald. Burpee said that at the time the
estimates for the year were prepared
Mayor Hanson had said that the cost
could be met out of current revenue.

Ald. Burpee moved that the City
Engineer be instructed to complete
the plans and specifications for this
extension and that tenders for the
construction of it be called. The mo-
tion was seconded by Ald. Young.

Ald. Baxter objected to the work
being undertaken this year. The su-
perintendent of the Water Department
had said it was not necessary.

Ald. Wilkinson objected that this
was too hasty a jump into this matter.
One alderman had stated that the
work was not necessary.

Ald. Young said he seconded the
motion on the understanding that a re-
port to the council must be made be-
fore any action could be taken. The
motion was carried on the following

Ald. Cooper said he opposed this

Ald. Wilkinson said that it would
be no way to do business, to call for
tenders and take no further action.

Ald. Burpee said that a recom-

Ald. Reid said it usually took a year
for anything of this kind to come to a
head and nothing in the way of con-
struction could be done this year.

Ald. Baxter said he opposed the
motion on grounds of economy.

Soldiers' Taxation

Consideration was given to the
question of taxation of returned sol-
diers which had caused some protest.

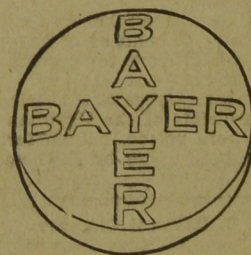
City Clerk Perkins reported that he
had been in communication with
Chamberlain Lingley of the City of
St. John to ascertain what that city
did in the matter of taxing returned
men. Mr. Lingley had informed him
that all returned soldiers were requir-
ed to pay a poll tax of \$5.21 and a tax
on income if the latter was sufficiently
large. He had asked Mr. Lingley if any
length of time was allowed to elapse
between the arrival of a returned man
in the city and the imposition of the
tax and was told that one soldier had
arrived day before yesterday and had
been presented with a tax-bill the
next day.

Ald. Reid recommended that the
Assessment Appeals Committee be
asked to consider this matter and re-
port at the next meeting. The motion
was carried.
