CAVELL TRAITOR SITS COWERING IN COURT

Women Shudder at Sight of Man Who Betrayed English Nurse
to the Germans—His Hour of Accounting Has Come at Last
—His Unfavorable and Crafty Appearance—Was Serving
a Sentence for Crime When Germans Occupied St. Quentin
and Released Him for Their Own Purposes.

Paris, France, Aug. 25—In a remote courtroom of the immense Palais de Justice fourteen military judges began today the trial of the wretched being who perhaps has earned the title of the "world's meanest man." He is Georges Gaston Quien, who is accused of having betrayed Miss Edith Cavell, the English nurse, to the Germans. He is the man who through a sort of genius, learned the secrets of Miss Cavell's organization for assisting entente prisoners to escape to Holland and denounced her.

His uncanny faculty of deceiving women and winning the favor of high born people availed him nothing when his hour of accounting came.

Today he sat cowering before an immense crowd, held back by the bayonets of a military guard. His form, so tall that he is nicknamed "the double man," was bent. He wore an old corduroy uniform and his crafty eyes blinked sheepishly, though sometimes they flashed back the hatred of the spectators. With his shaven head, hollow cheekbones and retreating chin, he sat rigid among his guards at one

side of the long dusty room.

Woman Spectators Shudder

In brilliant uniforms the judges confronted him. The woman spectators among whom were reported to be several friends of Miss Cavell, eyed him with shudders. Meantime, the voice of the military advocate rose shrilly as it uttered, hour after hour, the voluminous charges, setting forth that the prisoner had conveyed intelligence to the enemy. The details of these charges revealed one of the most tragic stories of the war.

America has heard of Miss Cavell's organization and the assistance given it by the prince de Croix and his sister, Marie at their Chateau of Belignes. The system was protected by every safeguard of secrecy. To effect an exposure it was necessary for some beneficiary to turn traitor.

Here enters Quien. Four times he had been sentenced for theft and other crimes and was in the prison of St. Quentin, when the Germans occupied the town. Quien, although French had never dreamed of joining the French lines, but, no doubt already in German pay he became a

Recommended to Prince

Thus he came to be recommended to the prince de Croix and was accepted as one whom the Cavell organization should help. After obtaining several hundred francs from the prince and fifty francs from his sweetheart, Quien was recommended to another prominent helper, Mdlle. Thuelliez under whose protection he was sent to Brussels.

In that city he met Miss Cavell and an opportunity was given him to proceed to Holland. He showed no haste but caroused in the cafes and kept up his gallantries. At last Miss Cavell persuaded him to go with six other fugitives and he reached The Hague June 30, 1915.

He had completed the first part of his traitorous task. He had gone through all the intricacies of the Cavell system; he knew all the passwords and agents.

Now he must return to Belgium and report. Quien presented himself before the French military attaché at The Hague and convinced that official that he had been a lawyer and a doctor and now was a good man for the work of counterespionage.

On the strength of this he received 500 francs and he started for Belgium where he was arrested by the Germans and sentenced at Antwerp to six weeks in prison.

Miss Cavell Arrested

The arrest was a ruse. On July 28 Miss Cavell was seized and later her friends including the Princess de Croix and Mdlle. Thuelliez also were arrested. Their fate is a matter of well known history.

As for Quien, a Brussels prison saw him next, and then in Switzerland he resumed underground work for the Germans. At last returning to France he was taken for felonies committed before the war and the present charges were brought.

The trial, if proceeded with, promises to furnish Paris with many sensations. The list of witnesses includes notable names, that of Brand Whitlock, American minister to Belgium, being among them. The hearing may last weeks. But it is possible that the counsel for the defense may win his plea and the case may be delayed until Gen von Bissing and others have been tried by an international court.

If this plea does not prevail, it is possible that the execution by shooting of this alleged traitor to France and the kind hearted Miss Cavell will furnish one of the events of the Paris autumn season.
