**LIVE STOCK SUPT. FOR
N. B. FOR TWO YEARS**

**Will Take Position in Toronto
Stockyards Under Domin-
ion Live Stock Branch—
Grading Rams.**

Mr. Thomas Hetherington who has occupied the office of Live Stock Superintendent in the New Brunswick Agricultural Department for about two years, will sever his connection with that department in the near future. He will remove to Toronto where he will take a position in the Toronto Stock Yards under the Dominion Live Stock Branch.

While occupying the office of Provincial Live Stock Superintendent Mr. Hetherington has made numerous friends throughout the province who will greatly regret his removal to Ontario. Mr. Hetherington is well qualified in his profession and all wish him great success in his new sphere of endeavor.

Mr. Hetherington's resignation has not yet been tendered but it is expected that it will be in the course of a few days. He is to take up his duties at Toronto in the latter part of the present month.

Grading of Rams

Prof. Sackville of Ontario Agricultural College, Guelph, will arrive here tomorrow to begin his work of grading the pure-bred rams of New Brunswick in accordance with the scheme recently prepared by the Dominion Live Stock Branch. Prof. Sackville will visit twenty-four breeders of pure-bred stock and grade their rams. He will start at Sussex.

Carleton County Visitor

Mr. Amos Downey of Centreville, Carleton County is a visitor to the city having accompanied his daughter here to Normal School. Mr. Downey is a member of a well known Cumberland, N. S. family, but has been making his home in Carleton County for twenty-five years. He is a brother of Mr. Wallace Downey, head of the Downey Shipbuilding Corporation of New York, one of the leading concerns of the kind in the United States.

Apples Plentiful

For the first time in several years the local market on Saturday was completely gutted with apples. They were all of early variety such as Astrakans and Maiden's Blush, and it was up to the growers to either get them to market or have them spoil on their hands. The first arrivals sold at \$4 per barrel, but along towards noon they dropped to \$2 and moved slowly at that figure. The apple crop is said to be exceptionally good in most districts this year.

For Fire Protection

Mr. R. L. Phillips has been given permission by the City Council to tap the water-main in Phoenix Square and lay a three-inch service to the new Ford garage being built by him. The service is to supply a stand-pipe with hose connection on each of the two floors of the building for fire-protection. The installation is to be under the direction of the City Engineer and is to be at the expense of the applicant. The water from this service is to be used for fire only.

Meeting This Evening

A meeting of the executive of the Board of Trade will be held at the Board of Trade rooms to consider several important matters of business. OLD COUNCILLORS DEFEATED IN SEVERAL PARISHES YESTERDAY IN YORK MUNICIPAL ELECTIONS

Councillors, Thompson, Pat Graham, Thomas M. Brewer, Inch and Fox Not Elected—Several Former Councillors Return to the Council—Unusual Canvasses Used in Some Cases—Feeling Against Men Who Served on Exemption Tribunals Under the Military Service Act.

As the result of the biennial municipal elections in York County yesterday there will be a number of new faces in the council chamber when the council begins its two-year term next January. Some prominent members of the present council are numbered among the slain in the contest. Included in the number are Coun. Patrick Graham of Southampton, Coun. B. W. Fox of Kingsclear, Coun. T. M. Brewer of Dumfries, Coun. John Inch of Bright, Coun. Robert Thompson of Manners-Sutton.

The election was the first in which a deposit was required of candidates on condition of forfeiture if the losers failed to poll half the vote of the leading candidate. In yesterday's contest one deposit was forfeited in McAdam, the unsuccessful candidate being Major H. Priestman who recently returned from overseas.

Elections by Acclamation

Elections by acclamation took place in Douglas, Canterbury, New Maryland, Prince William, Queensbury, St. Mary's, Stanley and Marysville. In Devon the councillor is appointed by the Town Council, Coun. H. H. Pickard having been reappointed. In the other seven parishes there were contests.

Canvasses Used in Contest

Unusual canvasses are reported to have been used in the contest against some candidates. Both Coun. T. M. Brewer and Coun. Stairs were opposed because they had served on exemption tribunals under the Military Service Act. Coun. Brewer also was opposed for supporting the Movement for a Municipal Home and the taxation of motion pictures. Coun. Stairs led the poll in Southampton in spite of the canvass but Coun. Brewer was defeated. Both parishes strongly supported Union Government in spite of the feeling now shown against compulsory military service.

Close voting was a feature in more than one parish but it is said that recounts will not take place.

Former Councillors

Among the new members of the council will be several who served previously as councillors. Among them are Councillors-elect Lawson, Noble, and McMullin.

Soldier Candidates

Two soldier candidates were in the field. Major Priestman defeated in McAdam and Lieut. Kelly elected by acclamation in Stanley.

In Manners-Sutton the defeat of the veteran Coun. Thompson by Highway Commissioner Frank Coburn was a feature. The vote in that parish was the largest ever polled.
