SOME MINOR BILLS DISCUSSED IN PARLIAMENT YESTERDAY

Proposal to Amend the Dominion By-Elections Act — Would Disqualify Oriental Voters — Montreal Member Makes an Enquiry in Regard to the Kind of Seal Used by Canada's Statesmen in Signing the Peace Treaty.

Ottawa, Sept. 26—In a sitting which lasted for about two and a half hours the house of commons discussed a number of minor bills, standing on the order paper. A bill to amend the dominion by-election acts, so as to provide for disqualification of Oriental voters in federal by-elections, threatened to raise the vexed question of Chinese, Japanese and Hindu immigration into British Columbia.

When the bill was in the committee stage A.R. McMaster took strong ground that any person who was admitted to Canada, Oriental, or otherwise should be allowed the franchise. H. H. Stevens in reply, suggested that if Mr. McMaster had seen thousands of coolies arriving at Montreal, he would perhaps be less anxious to give such persons votes.

Hon. Rodolph Lemieux speaking as one who had been in Japan, declared that the Japanese as a race were up-to-date, highly cultured and clean, and neither they nor the Hindus should be deprived of their votes.

The bill was finally reported and new stands for the third reading.

Third reading was given to a bill to amend the naturalization act by providing that foreigners in Ontario seeking naturalization might come before a judge of the court of general sessions.

Hon. Arthur Meighen introduced a bill to amend the dominion lands act which provides for the continuation in effect of orders-in-council giving prior

What Seal Used

Dr. H. Deslauriers (St. Mary's) Montreal, has given notice that he will ask in the house on Monday: "What kind of seal did Hon. Mr. Doherty and Hon. Mr. Sifton use at the signing of the peace treaty at Versailles on behalf of Canada, and what did it signify?"

Sir George Foster has given notice that he will move in the house on Monday a resolution providing for the continuance of the powers of the Canadian wheat board for a period of eighteen months after the passing of legislation and for the making of any regulations concerning the board by the governor-in-council. Another proposed resolution provides that the powers, rights of the board of grain supervisors for Canada "be continued in full force and effect insofar as it may be necessary or convenient for winding up and concluding the unsold business."

It also provides that the guarantees and undertakings given by the governor-in-council to banks and grain dealers respecting payments, be ratified and confirmed and continued in force. This action is necessary because the Canadian wheat board was created under the provisions of the war measures act.

Re Bulgar Treaty

There were further questions in the house of commons today in regard to the peace treaty. Mr. Archambault asked if it is true that Canada was a party to the treaty with Bulgaria and if the treaty had yet been signed.

The minister of justice replied that he was as yet unaware if the treaty had been signed. As to whether it would be submitted to the house for approval that would be a question for consideration later. It would however no doubt be dealt with in the same way as the Austrian treaty.

W. F. MacLean asked whether Canada was a party to the treaty between Great Britain and France, and whether the treaty would come before the house.

Mr. Doherty—"That treaty differs from the others in that it is just a treaty between France and Great Britain. As to what may be the action of the dominion on the question, that is a separate and distinct matter."

Revisiting Old Home-town

Mr. J. G. Connolly of Ottawa is a guest at the Barker House revisiting Fredericton his old home-town for the first time in twelve years. Mr. Connolly at one time was collector of customs at McAdam but some years ago was transferred to Ottawa where he is now in the customs service. He is being warmly greeted by old friends many of whom remember him as a boy living in King Street.

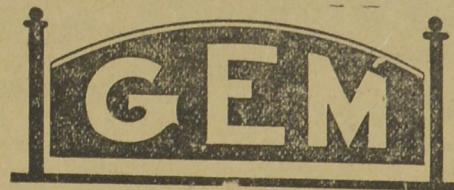
