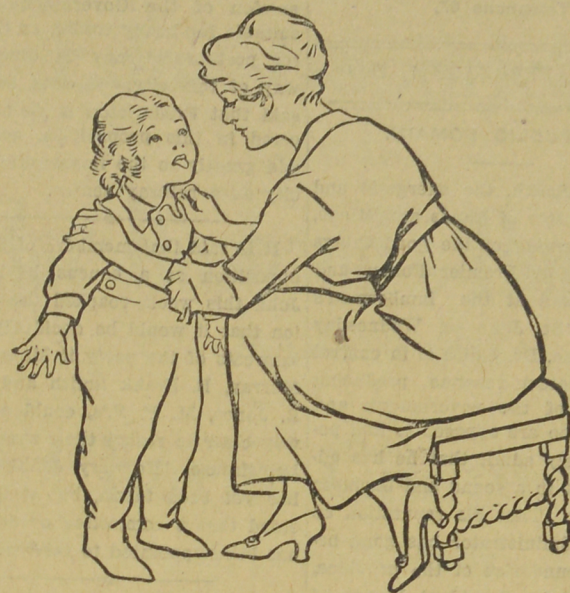

Capt. Manion has served with the French army in the early months of the war and presumably, has some knowledge of that language but it is doubtful if he proposes to depart from his native tongue in making a speech in the house.

This unusual session is due entirely to the fact that Dr. Chabot, Junior for Ottawa was the only French Canadian speaker of the Unionist government elected, and he seconded the address last session.

## CONFERENCE AT PRINCES ISLAND ON FEBRUARY 15

The Islands are a Group of Ruddy Rocked Gems in the Sea of Marmora—Have Connection by Ferry with the City of the Golden Horn—Once Used as a Place of Banishment—Shaken by an Earthquake in 1894.

In the sun soaked, azure belted Princes Islands, in the Sea of Marmora, representatives of the associated Powers will meet representatives of all Russian factions on February 15, and, if nature in her mildest and most beautiful mood can aid the councils of man, much should be accomplished toward solution of the disquieting problem of Russia.

The Princes' Isles are a group of ruddy rocked gems set into the Marmora Sea about thirteen miles southeast of Constantinople and connected with the city on the Golden Horn by ferry. They are nine in number, four of them being inhabited. Throughout history these islands have been play

places for the rich and powerful and remain to-day a favorite summer resort, noted for the mildness of their climate.

### Was Place of Banishment.

In the days of Byzantine Empire the Princes' Isles were used as places of banishment for kings and queens and high leaders in conquered factions. Many a high, brocaded figure, known over the world of his day, has passed, as a prisoner, a restless life on these islands, filled with longing to return to power and place in the city across the water—wicked, wilful, treacherous Byzantium.

Prinkipo, Khalki, Prote and Antigone are the four large and inhabited islands. In Prinkipo the Emperors Irene, Euphrosyne, Zoe and Anna Dalassena lived out their exile, confined to the convent at Kamarea, which is now a mouldering ruin. The Patriarch Methodius was banished to the Island of Antigone, while the monasteries on Prote housed such prisoners as Michael I., Bardanes, Romanus I., Rhangabes, Lecapenus and Romanus IV.

The conference will probably be held on Prinkipo or Khalki. There are monasteries, salt ruins, an Ottoman naval school, and Greek theological and commercial colleges on Khalki and many summer cottages. Prinkipo the largest of the islands, has its ruins and cottages, and here is the ruin of the old prison of the emperors. There is a large monastery on this island.

### Shaken by Great Quake.

These islands were severely shaken by earthquake in 1894, and all the buildings were injured especially those which were memorials of the Byzantine past. About 10,000 people live here, a population largely Greek, but owing to the down at the heel spirit and grasp of Turkish administration nothing has been done in later years to restore the fame of the islands as pleasure resorts for southern Europe.

There is a last bit of the appropriate in the choice of these islands for the proposed conference with Russia's envoys, and that is the fact that the Turks call them the "Red Islands."

### Profit was Small.

The annual report of the Fredericton Experimental Farm for the year ending March 31st, 1918, shows that 180 head of poultry were kept at the farm during the year. The breeds used were B. P. Rocks, R. I. Reds, White Wyandottes and White Leghorns. They produced a total of 17,670 eggs, an average of 97.6 per bird. The average yield per hen was \$3.23, and the cost of feed was \$2.65, making a profit of 55 cents per bird, disregarding labor and interest on capital.
