WILL IMPOSE ON GERMANY THE FULL WILL OF ALLIES

Supreme War Council is Meeting at Versailles Today—Change in the Attitude of Germany is Being Manifested by Arrogance Towards the Entente—Progress Being Made in Draft of the Peace Treaty.

Paris, Feb. 6—The supreme war council will meet at Versailles on Friday to take measures to impose on Germany the "full will of the Allies" says the Matin, because of the unwillingness of Germany to carry out the armistice terms except under certain conditions.

There has been a change in the attitude of Germany, according to the newspaper, and it is being manifested by arrogance toward the Entente.

Third of Task Completed
Paris, Feb. 6—The Society of Nations committee of the peace conference has virtually covered one-third of its task, it was officially announced this afternoon.

Agreement, the statement adds, has been reached on the principles underlying the whole draft for a Society of Nations.

At its session the committee discussed articles dealing with the motives behind the formation of a Society of Nations, the objects which will safeguard the constitution of its chief organs and the qualifications for membership.

Borden Acting for G. B.

Ottawa, Ont., Feb. 6—Official advice have been received here that the British government has offered to Sir Robert Borden, and that Sir Robert has accepted, the post of chief representative of the Empire on a commission consisting of two representatives of each of the five great powers to define future boundaries of Greece and Rumania. It will not be necessary for Sir Robert to visit either of the countries. It is stated that he will be engaged in the work for two or three weeks time.

Official Statement

Paris, Feb. 6—An official communication issued today says:

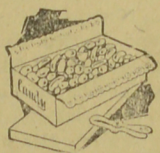
"The president of the United States the premiers and foreign ministers of the allied and associated powers, and Japan's representative on Feb. 6 heard Prince Feisal, who presented the case of the Arabs.

"The commission on international labor legislation under the chairmanship of Mr. Gompers, also met. The commission commenced a detailed examination of the draft of a convention which provides for the creation of a general organization with a view to securing the progress of the international labor legislation. Small states members of the league of nations, would necessarily be members of this organization. The two first articles of the draft were adopted."

The official communication on peace matters issued this afternoon says:

"The commission on the league of nations held its third meeting last night. Appreciable progress was made in the consideration of the draft. It was further unanimously agreed, in accordance with the decision of the conference at the Quai d'Orsay yesterday that representatives of Czechoslovakia, Greece, Poland and Roumania should be associated with the commission in its deliberations.

"In their second and third sessions the commission have covered practically one-third of their task. They have discussed those articles which deal with the motives behind the formation of a league of nations and the objects which would safeguard the constitution of its chief organ and the qualifications for membership in the league. "While the decisions of the commission with regard to each article are provisional, many apparent difficulties have already been solved and a general agreement has been reached on the principles which underlie the whole draft. It is therefore to be expected that the remaining articles will be covered quickly."

Labor Recommendation

Paris, Feb. 6—The international labor commission of the peace conference at a meeting today decided that all states which are members of a society of nations shall be members of the international legislation committee.

The meeting which was presided over by Samuel Gompers, drafted and adopted the first two articles of an international convention on labor.

COL. LABATT PASSES AWAY

Hamilton, Ont., Feb. 6—Col. Robert LaBatt one of this city's best known military men, died at his home here tonight. Col. LaBatt had been in ill health for a considerable time. He was born in London, Ont., in 1866.

When the great war broke out he volunteered his services and was appointed to command the Hamilton men who were attached to the 4th Battalion, C. E. F., at Valcartier. Later he was appointed to the command of that unit and took it to England and France. He fell ill in France in June 1915 and had to relinquish the command.

Col. LaBatt was a member of the Dominion Pension Commission for some time, but resigned.

HUNS STILL ARROGANT

Paris, Feb. 6—Le Matin drew attention to the arrogant condition of Germany, which it says among other things is refusing passports to delegates of the Allied armistice commission at Spa, who were to have gone to Berlin to draw up a list of sequestered allied property. Le Matin attributes this to the illusion on the part of Berlin that there are grave dissensions between the Allies and the German governments triumph over the Spartacans. Le Matin says that the Allies, however, will not permit the enemy to take advantage of their leniency. The supreme war council at Versailles will take all necessary steps to impose the will of the Allies upon Germany.

LEAVING FOR NEW ZEALAND

Montreal, Feb. 7—The engagement between John H. Roberts and the province of Quebec Branch of the Dominion Alliance, of which he was secretary has terminated, and Mr. Roberts left last night for Vancouver, enroute for New Zealand where he will begin a lecturing engagement.
